

Lockwood Nine Travels To Tigard To Battle For State Championship

Best-Of-Five Series To See Top Pitchers Start Tuesday

The lineup for the state American Legion baseball championship finds Lockwood Motors of Roseburg battling Tigard for "all the marbles," and a trip to Las Vegas, N.M., to compete in the Western Regionals.

Tuesday the two teams will open the best-of-five series at 8:30 p.m. (PDT) on the Tigard diamond. The second game will also be played at Tigard Wednesday at 8:30 p.m. (PDT).

Thursday the two teams will invade Legion Field in Roseburg for the completion of the series. The game, or games, in Roseburg will be played at 8 p.m. standard time.

Not First Time

When Roseburg and Tigard square off in the state championship playoff it will not be their first meeting of the year. During the July 4th tournament at Roseburg the two squads met in the opening round, with Tigard coming out on top, 3-1.

Roseburg will be out to avenge this earlier loss to the Area II champions.

In the holiday tournament game Tigard's left-handed ace, Lee Helstrom, limited the Lockwood Motors crew to just four hits — one

Roseburg went on to win the Area IV championship by besting the Klamath Falls Falcons in a three game series, then dumping Bandon two straight. In the state semifinals the Lockwood Motors team handled Bend, 8-5 and 5-2.

Dick Williams and Hobbs posted the wins over Bend to put the defending state champs in the finals for the second consecutive year.

Tigard edged Madison, 8-7, and rallied to win the Area II (Portland) championship. In the state semifinals Tigard followed the example set by Roseburg and earned a berth in the finals by winning two straight.

Beat David Douglas

Tigard squeaked out a 1-0 win over David Douglas behind the one-hit pitching of Helstrom in the opening game of the semifinals. The second game of the best-of-three series saw the Tigard crew come through with a 2-1 victory. Joe Podbielniak hurled a nifty four-hitter for the second triumph over David Douglas.

Roseburg is a perennial contender for the state crown under the direction of Bill Harper. The Lockwood Motors team won three state titles under Harper. In 1956 it placed third in the nation. Last year Harper's team won the state championship by winning three of four games against Watco Electric (Cleveland) of Portland. In the Western Regionals the local team finished third.

Tigard is a newcomer to the list of champions, and will be after its first state title. The Tigard crew is reported to have good pitching, backed by excellent fielding. Tigard is coached by Lou Jerod.

Corvallis Tops Mock For District Crown

Mock Motors, YMCA Twilight League champs, found the going rough against the Corvallis entrant in the district softball playoffs.

Corvallis won the playoff in two straight — dumping the Roseburg contingent, 7-0, Friday night at Corvallis, then winning a 7-4 decision Sunday afternoon at the Veterans Administration diamond in Roseburg.

Mock Motors was limited to just one hit, a single by Pete Armorde in the top of the fifth of the opening game of the playoffs. Corvallis' Buettelbach gave up two walks during the game and his teammates did not commit any errors.

Early Score

Corvallis scored twice in the bottom of the first, then added two insurance runs in the fifth. A home run by Dan Poling in the sixth with two teammates aboard completed the scoring for Corvallis.

While Buettelbach was silencing the Mock Motors bats, Dick Blehm was being tagged with the loss. Blehm was tagged for only four hits during the game.

Sunday the one fleeting moment of glory for the local softball team came in the bottom of the seventh inning when Armorde and Jack Myers collected back-to-back hits — with Myers' rap going for four bases.

Corvallis had started out with single runs in the first three innings. The visitors added two in the fifth and two in the sixth to give them a total of seven.

Plate Power

DeHaas and Applegate provided

Corvallis with the power at the plate with a triple and a double respectively. Applegate ended the game with three hits for four at-bats.

Myers was the top batter for Mock Motors with a 2-3 record, including his home run smash in the seventh. Armorde and Don Wells had the other hits for the Roseburg team.

Blehm gave up seven hits and seven runs to get charged with his second loss of the series, while Corvallis' Wehmier gave up two runs and four hits to get the win.

As a result of the triumph over Mock Motors, Corvallis will represent the district in the state softball tournament scheduled for Medford.

Mock Motors ended the year with an impressive 13-6 record after winning the league championship in a playoff game with Jackson Wholesale.

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Bevos Beaten In Twin Bill

That rumbling in the lower strata of the Pacific Coast League standings may be attributed to the Seattle Rainiers who are acting as if they'd like to pressure their way back into the first division.

The Rainiers, who earlier this season were battling for first place before hitting a disastrous slump, Sunday night erupted for a total of 26 hits as they beat Portland, 7-4 and 7-3, in a double-header. The wins gave Seattle a 3-1 series victory and left the Rainiers two-and-one-half games behind the Hawaii Islanders who are in fourth place.

Seattle was the only double winner of the day. All the others teams halved doubleheaders. San Diego beat Tacoma, 10-5, then lost, 6-0; Salt Lake topped Spokane, 3-2 and then was beaten, 5-0, and Vancouver trimmed Hawaii 12-5, before losing, 6-4.

The Rainiers needed 10 innings to win their second game with the Beavers, grabbing the win with a four-run spurt in the first extra frame. Seattle bats connected safely 17 times in the contest and young Dave Morehead, who needed relief help in the 10th, was credited with his seventh win in 13 decisions. A five-run third inning spelled the difference in the opener.

San Diego rattled out 15 hits in the first game to win it going away. But Tacoma got two-hit pitching from Dick Lemay in the nightcap and picked up its third win of the four-game series.

Howie Reed fanned nine Salt Lake batsmen as he pitched a six-hitter to lead Spokane to its shutout triumph. Al Ferrara's two run homer helped in the run gathering department. Salt Lake's win in the opener was the only victory for the Bees in the four-game set.

Joe Christian hit two homers to lead an 18-hit Vancouver attack which was just too much for Hawaii in the Islander-mountie opener. However, Lou Jackson answered with a pair of round trippers in the second contest to give the Islanders the edge.

Muncey Guides Miss Century 21 For First In Wild Gold Cup Race

SEATTLE (UPI) — Baby-face

Bill Muncey, a man with a lead foot and nerves of steel, had his fourth Gold Cup victory in the record books today after driving the classy Miss Century 21 in front of the pack every lap for 90 miles in the 54th running of the hydroplane classic here Sunday.

It was a wonder the race was completed before sundown. One boat was demolished, another burned, four conked out and strong winds and rain caused several delays.

Muncey's successful defense of the top speedboat title came as night's shadows began descending through the rainy gloom that had hung over Lake Washington's three mile Gold Cup course all day.

Average Speed

His average speed for the final 30-mile heat of the three-heat race was 93.614 m.p.h., considerably slower than his average of 101.448 and 101.028 m.p.h. registered in his first two heats.

The victory netted the Century 21 camp first prize of \$11,000 and the Seattle Yacht Club possession of the Gold Cup, speedboat's symbol of supremacy, for at least another year. Miss C-21, named for the theme of the Seattle's World's Fair, made 1,200 points, the maximum.

Second place, based on points, went to Miss Bardahl, Seattle, driven by Ron Musson; Notre Dame of Detroit, driven by Air Force Lt. Col. Warner Gardner of Wurtsmith, AFB, took third; Such Crust IV, Detroit, driven by Fred Alter, was fourth; and Miss U.S. I, Detroit, driven by Don Wilson of Palm Beach, Fla., was fifth.

Disqualified

Miss Dadison of Madison, Ind., driven by Marion Cooper of Louisville, Ky., finished fifth in the final heat ahead of Miss U.S. I, but was disqualified because she wrecked a corner buoy in the sixth lap.

Six other unlimited class hydros started but were out of it before the final heat got underway. Miss Seattle Too disintegrated at the first turn in the opening run but

driver Dallas Sartz of Seattle escaped with only a broken leg. Tempest of Seattle caught fire during the first attempt to run the second half of the first heat but driver Chuck Hickling escaped without even so much as a singe. A Coast Guard helicopter crew plucked both men to safety and the heats were rerun.

Ta'oe Miss, Reno, Nev., Fascination, Seattle, and Gales V and VII, both Detroit, all conked out with mechanical troubles.

Needle Award

Fascination I, driven by Bob Larsen, Everett, Wash., won the Space Needle Championship, a consolation race for slow boats that didn't make it on the 12-boat Gold Cup ladder. But he could have paddled the craft around and picked up the \$1,500 prize because neither the Bill of Lompac, Calif., nor the Miss B & I of Tacoma could get started in time to make it a contest.

Incidentally, it was the first time it had rained here on race day since this city went wild over the thunderboat sport 12 years ago.

Nothing Wrong With Giants That Some Wins Won't Cure

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—There's nothing wrong with the San Francisco Giants that a few victories won't cure.

The Giants went against seventh-place Philadelphia at Candlestick Park today nursing a tidy little two-game win streak with thoughts of more triumphs to come.

But manager Alvin Dark, who has nominated Billy Pierce (9-3) to hurl for his troops, isn't overconfident.

"The Phillies are tough," he opined as he looked ahead, "but we have been playing good ball the last couple of days."

The Giants, with Billy O'Dell

in the starring role, disposed of the pesky Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-1 Sunday, after a come-from-behind 6-5 victory on Saturday.

O'Dell Does Everything

The guess is that the Phils may lead with either Dallas Green or Art Mahaffey, the latter usually poison for the locals.

O'Dell, who usually has to pitch his heart out to win because his teammates fail to get him many runs, was a one-man show Sunday.

He set the Pirates down on five hits; struck out three and then to top off his fine day, he singled across the winning run in the seventh inning.

Billy was hooked up in a mound duel with the Pirates' Bob Friend. The Pittsburgh pitcher was nicked for 12 safeties, but the Giants hit into two double plays and left eight men stranded on base.

San Francisco got a run in the second inning on singles by Felipe Alou and Jim Davenport and Jose Pagan's double-play ball.

Billy Gets 13th

Then in the seventh, Alou opened with a single, went to second on an infield out. With two away, O'Dell lashed a single to right to score Alou. It was O'Dell's second hit of the day.

The blow brought Billy his 13th win of the campaign against 10 losses. Friend, who went the distance for Pittsburgh, suffered his 11th loss against 12 wins.
