

Mexico Net Stars Top U.S. Davis Cup Team

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—Mexico, the latest country to take advantage of the United States' ever-declining tennis prowess, eagerly awaited its final round challenge today for the American Zone Davis Cup finals.

The Mexicans defeated the U.S. for the first time ever in Davis Cup play Monday when American collegiate champion Rafael Osuna overcame fatigue and a diaphanous effort by Jon Douglas of Santa Monica, Calif., to beat the former Stanford football star, 9-7, 6-3, 6-8, 3-6, 6-1.

Osuna's triumph gave Mexico an unbeatable 3-1 lead in the American Zone semi-finals and clinched its first victory over a U.S. team after 14 fruitless Davis Cup attempts dating back to 1928.

Chuck McKinley of St. Ann, Mo., who had scored the United States' only other point with a singles victory over Osuna on Saturday, staved off an embarrassing Mexican romp when he beat Mario Llamas, 2-6, 4-6, 7-5, 6-3, 6-2 in the meaningless final singles match to end the competition with Mexico the winner, 3-2. Llamas was a last minute substitution for Antonio Palafox.

Mexico now is scheduled to meet the winner of the Yugoslavia-West Indies series here from Aug. 17-19, with the winner of that series moving a step closer to the challenge round.

Angels' Fate Rides On Bat Of Wagner

BOSTON (UPI)—When the Los Angeles Angels were shocking the nation's baseball critics by remaining in first place earlier this season much of their success was due to Leon Wagner.

Then when the Angels fell from the heights because of frequent losses and infrequent wins much of their failure was due to the same Leon Wagner.

Wagner, flailing grip with his open-handed intrepid, held onto the American League lead in both home runs and runs batted in for many weeks—the same period of time the Angels were accused of playing over their halos, so to speak.

However, he had hit only one more run on the current road trip which began July 26 and his RBI output also fell off. And the Angels lost 7 of their initial 11 games on the trip.

Then Monday night Wagner whacked three hits, one a double, and drove in two runs as the Angels snapped out of a three-game losing streak by whipping the Boston Red Sox, 5-2, at Fenway Park.

Los Angeles also got an excellent job of pitching from improving rookie Dean Chance who went the full nine innings for the second time this season and ran his record to 9-6.

Solid pitching, of course, is important. But with the Angels totaling only 15 hits in their previous three games Los Angeles manager Bill Rigney probably was most gratified by the team's 14-hit spurge Monday night against the Red Sox—especially the three by Wagner.

The clubs closed the brief series here this afternoon with Bo (no hit) Belinsky pitching for the Angels and Earl (no hit) Wilson pitching for the Red Sox. Wilson hurled his no hitter against the Angels and pitcher Belinsky in June. But the last time they faced each other in Los Angeles, each was relieved early.

In addition to Wagner, Albie Pearson, Billy Moran, Lee Thomas and Felix Torres were the hitting stars Monday night with two apiece. Pearson and Thomas each had a double.

Chance, who allowed six Boston hits, struck out four and walked four.

Dodger Base Thief Ups Total To 58 In 2-1 Win

It'll be no idle cry if the Los Angeles Dodgers' rivals claim the National League pennant was stolen from them this year.

The Dodgers have everything—offense, defense, pitching—plus Maury Wills. If it's true that an Army travels in adversity on its stomach then it's equally true that the Dodgers move on Maury's legs.

The fleet little shortstop—a popgun hitting pygmy in an era of muscular home run hitters—showed his game-winning base-stealing ability again Monday night when the Dodgers retained

their 4½ game NL lead with a 2-1 triumph over the New York Mets. And in the bargain, his season total of 58 stolen bases matched the highest total in the league in 44 years.

Wills now is shooting at the NL mark of 80 steals set by Bob Beshar of Cincinnati in 1911. Ty Cobb, the old Georgia Peach of the Detroit Tigers, set the major league record of 96 steals in 1915.

Provided Winning Margin

Wills provided the Dodgers with their winning margin in the sixth inning when he beat out an infield single, stole second, went to third on a wild throw by catcher Chris Cannizzaro and scored on an infield hit by Willie Davis.

Johnny Podres, aided by Ron Peranoski's ninth-inning clutch relief, scored his ninth win of the season for the Dodgers.

The San Francisco Giants butchered the Philadelphia Phillies, 9-2, the Cincinnati Reds scored a 1-0, 13-inning victory over the Houston Colts and the Milwaukee Braves downed the Chicago Cubs, 4-1, in other NL games.

In the American League, the Minnesota Twins beat the New York Yankees, 5-4, and moved to within four games of first place; the Los Angeles Angels topped the Boston Red Sox, 5-2; the Cleveland Indians shaded the Detroit Tigers, 6-5; the Kansas City Athletics defeated the Washington Senators, 1-0; and the Chicago White Sox gained a 5-4, 11-inning triumph over the Baltimore Orioles.

Mays Homered Twice

Willie Mays had two homers and three singles and drove in five runs to lead a 17-hit San

Francisco attack that brought Billy Pierce his 10th win of the season and the 199th of his career. Chuck Hiller contributed three hits to the Giant attack and Harvey Kuenn, Flippe Alou, Jim Davenport and Jose Pagan had two each.

Relief pitcher Johnny Klippstein homered in the 13th inning to break up a brilliant pitching duel at Houston. Klippstein's blow came off reliever Don McMahon after Dick Farrell had pitched 12 scoreless innings, yielding six hits and striking out nine. Bob Purkey went the first 10 innings for the Reds.

Bob Shaw pitched a four-hitter to win his 13th game for the Braves. Eddie Mathews singled home two Milwaukee runs in the first inning and Lou Johnson doubled home two more in the eighth. George Altman homered for the Cubs' run.

Frank Sullivan's gilt-edged relief pitching preserved Minnesota's win that handed the Yankees their third straight one-run loss. Roger Maris and Bill Skowron homered for the Yankees while Bob Allison and Zoilo Versalles had two hits each for the Twins.

Chance Won Ninth

Dean Chance pitched a six-hitter to win his ninth game for the Angels, who now trail the Yankees by 5½ games. Leon Wagner had three hits and Albie Pearson, Billy Moran, Lee Thomas and Jose Torres each had two to pace the Angels' 11-hit attack.

Steve Boros hit three homers for the Tigers but the Indians won out in the ninth inning on Ty Cline's sacrifice fly—the first run batted in by Cline since June 20. Hank Aguirre shut out the Indians until the eighth when they scored five runs with the aid of the pitcher's throwing error and a two-run single by Chuck Essig.

Benton Wants Fight With Top Contender

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Jubilant George Benton said Monday night after his unanimous decision over Joey Giardello here, "I want Paul Pender or the winner of the Gene Fullmer-Dick Tiger fight next."

The 29-year-old veteran of 13 years in the ring said Giardello did not hurt him during the 10-round bout but called it his "biggest victory." The \$10,000 purse was also the most money he ever made for one fight. Benton said he lied about his age to turn professional at 16.

The 160-pound middleweight said "If the offer is big enough" he would fight Giardello again. "He is about the toughest and smartest boxer I have encountered, including Henry Hank and Dick Tiger," Benton said.

The disappointed Giardello said he felt "I might have outsmarted myself by being cute." The South Philadelphia, who weighed in at 160 also, said he would like to fight Benton again.
