

Drysdale Gets 21st Win; Shrine 11s Set For Annual Battle

Yanks Dump Twins 14-1

Can Don Drysdale overcome the 30-game jinx and succeed where Bob Feller and Hal Newhouser failed?

If so, he'll be the major leagues' first 30-game winner since Dizzy Dean in 1934. And, if not, he'll have only to study the records of Feller and Newhouser to realize that those last hurdles enroute to the 30-game plateau can be mighty big ones.

With No. 21 of the season sailed away Tuesday night in the Los Angeles Dodgers' 7-5 victory over the New York Mets, Drysdale's timetable toward 30 is identical with the pace Feller set in 1946. Feller also had 21 victories on Aug. 6 of the '46 season but suddenly talled off and wound up with a 26-15 record.

Newhouser also made a strong run on 30 in the same season, achieving his 20th victory on July 27 and gaining No. 21 on Aug. 15. But, he too talled off, and wound up with a 26-9 mark for the season.

May Have Felt Pressure
Drysdale may have been feeling some of the pressure Tuesday night when he scrambled to his 11th straight victory and raised his record to 21-4. The sidewheeling, right-hander was tagged for 11 hits by the rag-tag Mets and might not have finished the game except for his hitting—he belted a two-run triple in his own behalf in the sixth inning.

The loss, incidentally, officially eliminated the Mets from the NL pennant race.

Pollard Tries For Repeat Victory In Gold Cup Race

Art Pollard, ex-Roseburg racing star, currently holds fast time in the qualifying runs for tonight's Gold Cup spectacular to be staged at the Edmonton Speedway, Edmonton, Alberta, Canada.

In timing in Pollard was clocked at 14.20 seconds on the quarter mile asphalt track. The fast time set by Pollard breaks the old track record of 14.25 seconds.

Norm Ellison, Edmonton, is second to Pollard in the qualifying times, with several drivers still to take their time runs. Among those still to qualify are Bill Crow, Broise, and Eldon Rasmussen, Edmonton.

Rasmussen finished second to Pollard in last year's Gold Cup race.

Tonight's finale, set for 9 p.m. (mountain time), will find Pollard

to defend his championship. The Gold Cup will be a 200-lap event. Pollard will be heading "Ken's Martinizing Special" around the track. The powerful racer is sponsored by Ken's Dry Cleaning of Roseburg, Eugene and Coos Bay.

The winner of tonight's racing classic will receive the Gold Cup trophy and a purse of \$2,500. Second place winner will get \$800 for his efforts.

Oiler owner K.S. (Bud) Adams announced the contract today and said Cannon "is worth every dime of it."

Cannon, 1959 Heisman Trophy winner from Louisiana State University, led the AFL in rushing last year, carrying 200 times for 948 yards. He also caught 43 passes for 588 yards and nine touchdowns.

Stalers Ready For Tilt With Top Metro Stars

Practice time is rapidly running out for the State and Metro All-Star teams set to battle it out in the 15th annual Shriners' Hospital All-Star game Saturday on the turf of Portland's Multnomah Stadium.

Kick-off time for the annual classic is set for 8:30 p.m. (PDT). The gridiron war will be preceded by an hour of pageantry, featuring marching units from throughout the state.

The game will pit outstanding graduating high school players from last fall on a State vs. Metro basis.

Down through the years the two teams have managed to come to this year's game on an even keel. Each team has posted six victories, with all of State's wins coming prior to 1956, and two games have ended deadlocked, including last year's 19-19 thriller.

Thompson Coaches State
Coaching the State squad will be Roseburg's Roy Thompson, who took his charges through an undefeated season in 1961. Under the direction of Thompson the Indians won the state A-1 championship by beating Beaverton 25-0 in the finals.

Assisting Thompson will be E. L. "Spike" Hillstrom of North Salem and Doug Hogland of Tillamook.

Beaverton's Duke Moore heads the Metro coaching staff. Moore is assisted by Tom DeSylvia of Jefferson and John Allen of Jesuit.

Roseburg's state champions will be represented by four players on the State team — end Ray Palm, fullback Mike Flury, center Bob Roark and guard Kenny King.

King and North S. slalom'd Casey were rated as the two top linebackers in the state, and King also proved effective at opening holes in the line from his guard position on offense. Roark worked as offensive center for the Indians, and doubled up as a defensive end. On defense Roark led the state in blocked punts and was seldom taken out by the opposition.

Familiar Backs
A pair of prize backs from the Metro team familiar to Roseburg fans are Brian Sinnerud and Tim Casey. Sinnerud led the Beaverton chargers to the state finals, while Casey put on a one man show for the Jesuit 11 in the semi-final game against Roseburg. Both will be out to gain revenge for losses suffered at the hands of Thompson's team last year. Beaverton was jolted 25-0 in the finals and Jesuit lost a 19-0 decision in the semifinals.

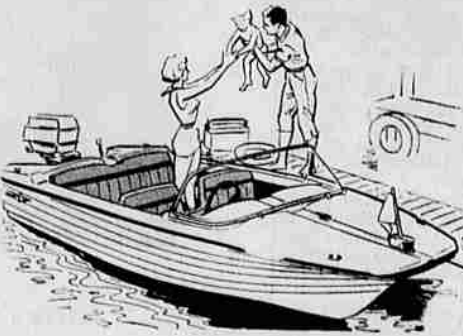

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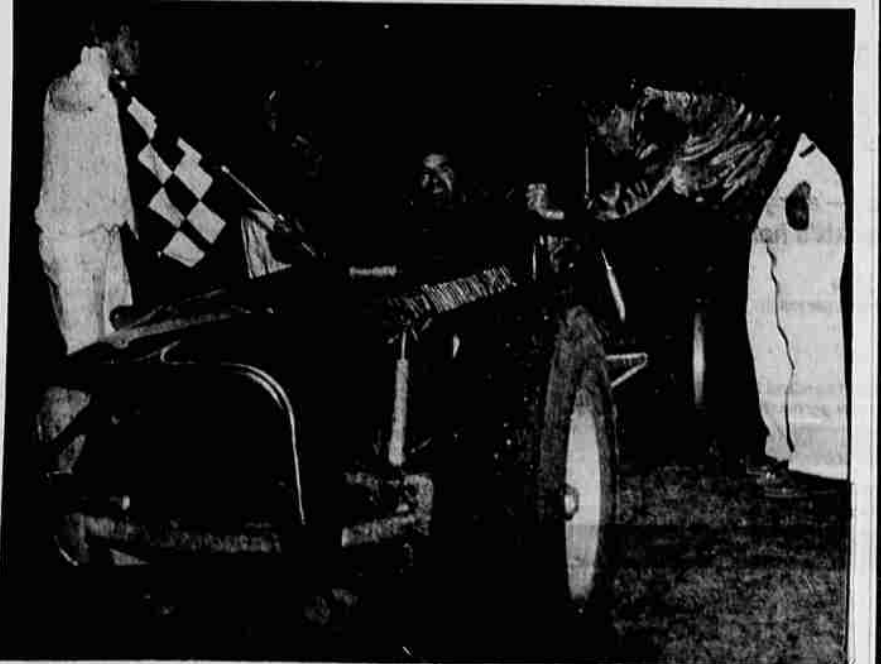
