

Only One Petition Is Filed For City Elective Offices

All's quiet on the city election front. In fact, there's been very little activity at all. City Recorder Frances Jellison said only one nominating petition has been filed for Roseburg's municipal election so far — and the filing deadline is only three weeks away.

Closing date for petitions is Aug. 29. The lone candidate to date is William T. Evans, Jr., of 1041 SE Cass Ave. Evans will seek the mayor post.

Petition forms are available at the City Hall. The recorder noted that only two other petitions have been picked up in connection with the election, and these have not been returned.

Residents in the wards interested in presenting a candidate for one of the city offices were urged to "get busy."

It was pointed out that residents in the newly-annexed areas—such as East Roseburg—now have a voice in municipal government and may be interested in sponsoring or supporting candidates of their choice.

The election is Nov. 6. Peter B. Serafin is incumbent mayor. Council positions are open in

County Receives State Liquor, Racing Funds

Two checks totaling \$18,661.52 have been deposited in county accounts by County Treasurer Bert Laurence.

The checks, from two state agencies, were to be put into accounts for mother's aid and age pensions, direct relief of the indigent and the county fair.

The largest check, for the county fair, was for \$10,000 and came from the state Racing Commission, Portland. It represents the county's share of racing funds received by the commission for the benefit of county fairs. It includes all funds available for distribution up to July 31, 1962.

Final remittance of racing funds will be made to the counties after the close of racing season, Oct. 27. The smaller check for \$8,661.52 was the county's share of revenues collected from a tax on alcoholic beverages. It was distributed to the several counties on the basis of population as determined by the state Board of Census estimate of Sept. 25, 1961.

Funds from the tax are apportioned 75 per cent to the counties less \$1,000 to the state census account. The county's share is expended by the County Court for Mother's aid, old age pensions and direct relief of the indigent.

The county's population on which its share was determined was 69,618. Multnomah County with an estimated population of 526,554 received the largest share—\$65,511.23. Wheeler County with an estimated population of 2,683 received the smallest share—\$333.81. Total amount distributed to the counties was \$225,980.60.

Sipprell To Study Oregon Road Tests

SALEM (UPI)—Ralph B. Sipprell, permits engineer for the State Highway Department, has been named to make a study on how the Illinois Road Test studies apply to conditions in Oregon.

The department has received reports of the test road studies but they have not yet been correlated with conditions here.

Results of the study could play a big part in actions of the 1963 legislature. Gov. Mark Hatfield vetoed a measure passed last year which would have reduced truck taxes and at the time said that results of the road tests should be taken into consideration before such legislation is passed.

Sipprell, who is the department's liaison officer with legislative committees, will continue in that capacity.

Doctors Warned On Use Of Oral Contraceptive

CHICAGO (UPI)—G.D. Searle & Co. has urged physicians prescribing its oral contraceptive, Enovid, "be alert to the possible occurrence" of a form of blood clotting called thrombophlebitis.

Dr. Irwin C. Winter, vice president medical affairs for the Chicago-based pharmaceutical house, said there have been "28 cases of thromboembolic disease in the more than one million users of Enovid in the United States."

"Among these were 10 cases of pulmonary embolism, five of which were fatal. In addition, there are press reports of four cases, including one death, from the United Kingdom."

Winter said "the available laboratory data neither prove nor disprove a causal relationship between Enovid administration and the occurrence of thrombophlebitis."

"Reports to a manufacturer do not reflect the accurate incidence of reactions and the available statistics are not adequate to determine whether or not there is a causal relationship, but caution requires consideration of this possibility," he said.

Winter's comments were contained in a Searle report, circulated by officials of the Federal Food and Drug Administration, that was sent to some 350,000 physicians, pharmacists and others in the United States and Canada.

Scenic Area Groups Set Hearing On Billboards

NEWPORT (UPI)—The scenic Area commission opened two days of hearings today on four proposed billboard-free stretches along the Oregon Coast Highway.

The hearings will continue Thursday at Gold Beach. The proposed scenic areas stretch roughly from Depoe Bay to Agate Beach, Yaquina Bay to Heceta Head, Elbow Lake to Gardiner, and Port Orford to Brookings, a total of 117 miles.

Incorporated towns and certain commercial areas would be exempt.

Ida, Sweet As Apple Cider, Succumbs To Heart Attack

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (UPI)—Mrs. Ida Cantor, 70, known to millions through her famous husband, Eddie Cantor's theme song "Ida," died Wednesday of a heart attack.

Cantor, who also has a heart condition, collapsed when he learned of his wife's death. He was placed under sedation at his home with a nurse at his bedside.

They celebrated their 48th wedding anniversary June 9.

Mrs. Cantor, who had a long history of heart trouble, had been confined to bed since February when she suffered a heart attack.

She had at least four in the past seven years, the physician said.

"She passed away suddenly and peacefully in bed," he said. "Despite her recent condition, her husband still was overwhelmed and went into a state of shock."

Cantor, also 70, was hospitalized for several weeks in September of 1960 after a heart attack.

When Al Jolson died, friends did not tell him for several days for fear the shock might kill him.

The popular banjo-eyed comedian also suffered a serious heart attack in 1953. He has been in semi-retirement since.

Mrs. Cantor traveled thousands of miles with her husband on personal appearances. She always remained in the background, but her name was heard by millions when her husband sang: "Ida, sweet as apple cider."

The Ida and Eddie Cantor romance, one of the best known in the entertainment world, blossomed when they were 13 years old. Mrs. Cantor's father did not approve of show business and wanted Cantor to go into the clothing business.

But Cantor stayed in the entertainment field and he married Ida June 9, 1914, when they were 22 years old.

Mrs. Cantor and their five daughters were the source of a constant flow of quips on stage.

He often turned to his wife, who was always nearby, and winked as if to ask: "How am I doing?"

Cantor rocketed to fame in Florenz Ziegfeld's "Midnight Frolics" in 1916 and later in the "Ziegfeld Follies." He became a millionaire but lost his fortune in the 1929 crash.

But again Ida and Eddie Cantor struggled to the top.

Three of their daughters were at the family home, Mrs. Natalie Metzger, Los Angeles; Mrs. Edna McHugh, Malibu, Calif.; and Mrs. Janet Gari, New York. The fourth, Marilyn Cantor, was in New York.

Their eldest daughter, Marjorie, died of cancer in 1959.



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GOP Wants No Credit If College Aid Bill Dies

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressional Republicans, proud of their ability to shut out the Kennedy administration on some issues, have served notice they want no credit if the President's college aid bill strikes out.

Rep. Albert Quie, R-Minn., a member of the deadlocked House-Senate Conference Committee that has tried since June 19 to write

a compromise bill, told the House Wednesday that if the legislation died, the blame would lie with Senate Democrats.

Quie was joined by Reps. Charles Goodell, R-N.Y., and Peter Frelinghuysen, R-N.J., also members of the House Education and Labor Committee.

Goodell said if the bill was dead, it was because the Democratic leadership in Congress "surrendered without a battle." Frelinghuysen said it would be almost "inexcusable" to let the bill die when both parties in both Houses agreed on the need for college aid.

Some House Democrats already have given up on the bill, which was considered the only important part of the Kennedy education program to have a chance of passage. The bill was conspicuously absent from the "must" list of bills announced by Democratic leaders this week, although Kennedy has been urging its approval for months.

Quie said the legislation was in trouble because Senate Democrats refused to consider the House-passed \$1.5 billion classroom construction bill, which would give direct grants as well as loans to public, private and church-connected colleges alike.

The Senate approved a construction aid plan of similar size, but offering loans only to all but publicly financed junior colleges. Senate Democrats have questioned the constitutionality of any direct grants for church schools. House conferees of both parties and Senate Republicans support the House loan-plan plan.

Quie charged that the constitutional question was "largely contrived." He said Congress already has approved "hundreds of millions of dollars in federal grants to both public and private institutions each year" without the ques-
