Group Claims Oil Exploration Blasts Are Damaging Sea Life

PORTLAND (UPI)—A member of the Oregon Fishermen's Marketing Association said here Wednesday that underwater oil exploration explosions were doing "a lot of damage" to commercial fishing on the coast.

Arthur L. Anderson of Astoria was one of several fishermen who appeared before the Oregon Fish Commission to complain about the explosions.

Anderson cited bottom fish as an example. He said canneries in Oregon were finding an increasing number of the fish ruined for the market because of flesh loosened from their bones and bruised flesh.

He said a 10,000-pound catch of English and Dover sole was flushed out of a cannery without processing when such damage was discovered.

However, Robert W. Schoning,

state fisheries director, said state records did not indicate any damage to the fisheries resource off the state's coast.

Boat Asked
Anderson and other fishermen asked the commission to engage a boat to follow 30 to 40 minutes behind oil survey vessels following explosions.

They said the action would allow the commission to determine the effect of the submarine explosions on fish life with more accuracy.

Schoning said he had written to Shell and Standard oil companies on July 30 outlining such a program which would involve chartering an other trawler, equipped with nets and sound devices and manned by experienced fishermen and observers.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton attended the hearing.

In other action, the commission set Oct. 3 for a public hearing on commercial crab regulations.
