

Elder Logging Wins Tree Tract

The Elder Logging Co. of Shady Cove almost doubled the appraisal in a successful bid to win an Umpqua National Forest timber sale Friday in the Roseburg supervisor's office.

The company paid \$36,095 for 880,000 board feet of timber appraised at \$18,325. The tract contains 78,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$22.50 and 100,000 feet of white fir and other species appraised at \$7.75 a thousand.

Elder more than doubled the appraised price on Douglas fir by bidding \$45.25 per thousand. It paid \$8 per thousand for the other species groups.

Other bidders were Fir-Ply, Inc. of Medford, Everett W. Cushman of Shady Cove, Superior Logging Co. of Glendale, Paul B. Hult Lumber Co. of Dillard, Herbert Lumber Co. of Riddle and Fitzgerald Logging Co. of Roseburg.

The timber is located in the Cow Creek Ranger District 12 miles south of Tiller.

Another tract in the same area on 100 acres sold for \$3,000 above the appraised price. High bidder was Hoot Owl Logging Co. of Central Point which bid \$20,471.15 for 775,000 feet appraised at \$17,413.55. The 728,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$23.40 sold for \$27.60, and the 47,000 feet of western hemlock and other species sold at the appraised \$8.05 price.

The next Umpqua National Forest sales are scheduled Tuesday.

Soviet Union Explodes Third Nuclear Bomb

UPPSALA, Sweden (UPI)—The Soviet Union today exploded the third nuclear bomb in its latest series of tests in Siberia, the Uppsala Seismological Institute announced.

The institute said it registered the explosion of a 3-megaton bomb at 2:26 a.m. PDT. A megaton is equivalent to 1 million tons of TNT. Today's blast was small compared to the first explosion of the current series, estimated at between 30 and 40 megatons.

Youthful Detectives On Watch In New York-Based Chain Store

NEW YORK (UPI)—A steady increase nationally in the number of teen-age shoplifters had led one New York-based chain of stores to install a "little brother" system of watching out for them.

Carefully chosen teen-agers are hired to spot shoplifters among their own age group, because as Arthur Riley, head of security for the department store chain said, "Who knows better than a teen-ager how another teen-ager operates?"

Riley believes his is the first protection office to hire the youth detectives as one means of combating juvenile delinquency. Various industry sources estimate teen-agers make up to 40 to 50 per cent of the shoplifter total.

Teen-Agers a 'Major Threat'

One report circulated among retailers said this age group "in the past few years has become a major threat to the retail store. These young delinquents are a big problem for food chains, variety stores, drug stores, hardware stores and department stores."

Just how much the overall loss from the shoplifter is hard to determine. Riley said most estimates run into the millions.

The National Retail Merchants Association had no estimate of losses especially due to shoplifting. But it said all types of store "shrinkage"—from breakage, carelessly kept records, thievery by in-store personnel as well as by outsiders—averages 1.5 per cent of total retail sales.

"The teen-age thief is our great problem the year round, not just during the summer vacation from school," said Riley. "Last year, of the 5,700 apprehensions in our four stores, 2,700 were youngsters." This year, with the chain growing to six, he expects the teen-age total to be higher.

Riley has been head of protection at Alexander's for 15 years. He is employing both male and female college students as a pilot plan in one store to be instituted in the rest of the chain if it cuts into the shoplifting. The students will go on a part-time basis when school resumes in September.

Riley said they were hired on the basis of maturity, interest in the protection field, and department store experience. Most of them after graduation hope to become criminologists, sociologists or social workers.

"They have a psychological effect too," said Riley. "We hope to discourage the would-be thief by his knowing that another teen-ager may be watching..."

Cyanide Gas Denies Slayer's Last Wish

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI)—The cyanide pellets that caused the death of condemned killer Luis Moya also denied Moya his last wish—that his eyes be used by Stanford University for a transplant operation.

Moya, 23, was executed Wednesday in the San Quentin prison gas chamber as one of the hired killers who murdered the daughter-in-law of Elizabeth (Mother) Duncan.

He had tried while he was alive to give his eyes away, but state attorneys refused his request because of the possibility of legal liability in the event his death sentence was commuted.

So he willed his body to Stanford in the hope his eyes would be used for transplants.

"We were afraid to take a chance," a spokesman said. "We felt that possibly this would prevent a graft from taking in the recipient."

The Stanford Medical Center said that doctors have used the eyes of electrocuted men, but this was the first experience with the eyes of a man executed in the gas chamber.

Senate Leaders In Try To Halt Satellite Debate

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate leaders today filed a cloture petition in an effort to halt debate and force a vote on the administration's long-stalled space satellite communications bill.

The cloture petition automatically comes to a vote one hour after the Senate meets Tuesday. Two-thirds of all senators present and voting must vote in favor of the motion before debate can be limited.

The petition was filed by Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., for himself and Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., after opponents of the bill had blocked an attempt to limit debate by unanimous agreement.

The move came shortly after the Senate began an early and unusual Saturday session with Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., prepared to talk all day against the bill.

The petition contained 23 signatures, well above the minimum of 16 required. If the move is successful, debate on the bill will be limited to one hour for each senator before a final vote.

Mansfield said in a speech announcing the cloture move that it was the "only rational outlet" for the leadership in its efforts to open the way for the Senate to "get on with its constitutional responsibilities."

Similar attempts to shut off filibusters have not been successful in the Senate for 35 years. But Mansfield resorted to the drastic measure after a handful of Democratic liberals gave every indication they would carry on their talkfest indefinitely.

In his prepared remarks, Long, recently renominated Louisiana Democrat, denounced the communications measure as "the most wanton and the most inexcusable piece of folly ever perpetrated on this country."

In his speech, delayed an hour by the cloture move and comments by other opponents, Long aimed his fire in large part at American Telephone & Telegraph Co., which opponents contend would gain monopoly control of the proposed space communications system under the bill.

Plaintiffs ask award of \$1,600 plus costs and disbursements in suit in which plaintiffs allege defendant on June 21, 1962, came upon plaintiff property in North Myrtle Creek Rd. area and destroyed 20 prune trees, a septic tank and a concrete house trailer parking slab.

The estimated cost of such improvements, including taxiway and tie-down areas is \$16,800.

It also decided to investigate the possibility of Pacific Power & Light Co. helping set new poles for obstruction lights along the east side of the runway instead of contracting the job. City Engineer Ken Meier reported at the meeting that six poles needed to be replaced. He estimated cost would be \$780.

Turning to the subject of the West Coast Airlines lease which terminates Oct. 31, the commission decided to take action at the next meeting. Meanwhile, a survey of fees at other airports in the state will be made.

West Coast's Roseburg manager, Leroy Scott noted that the commercial planes have about six boardings a day, a decline from previous years.

In conjunction with the subject of the lease, the commission will consider a "traffic stimulation program" at the next meeting. Members expressed the hope the Chamber of Commerce would help work out such a program.

The lease involves agreements for the public terminal and land fees for use of the airport.

The commission also reviewed gas pump improvements being made by Roseburg Skyways Manager Bud Good at the airport. Good will finance the project at the cost of about \$3,500. No work has started but plans have been drawn up.

Orval Peterson, the commission's member of the City Council, automatically became chairman at this organizational meeting. The commission will meet on the first Friday noon of each month. Friday's meeting was at the city offices.

Railroads Map Appeal Strategy

CHICAGO (UPI)—The nation's railroads and five big unions mapped appeals strategies today in their court battle over some 65,000 jobs that have threatened to erupt in a nationwide train strike.

The latest maneuver came Friday when U.S. District Court Judge Joseph Sam Perry issued a temporary injunction barring 180 railroads from imposing "anti-featherbedding" work rule changes next Thursday.

The conductors, trainmen, switchmen, engineers and firemen unions had threatened to call their 210,000 members off work if the carriers imposed the rule changes unilaterally.

At least 65,000 jobs eventually would be eliminated under the proposed changes.

Perry said his restraining order, requested by the brotherhoods, would remain in effect pending their appeal of one of his earlier rulings to the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

In that case, the unions have objected to his decision that the railroads had the legal right, under the Railway Labor Act, to put the sweeping work rule changes into effect.

James E. Wolfe, chief bargainer for the carriers, said after Perry's ruling Friday that they would try to persuade the appeals court to vacate the restraining order.

Railroad attorney Howard Neitzert said "we hope to be in the appeals court by the first of next week."

If Perry's injunction is lifted, the railroads would be free to impose the work rule changes next week. The changes are stiffer versions of those recommended by a presidential railroad commission.

Hoover Party Reaffirms A Man's Love For Freedom

WEST BRANCH, Iowa (UPI)—Kennedy and former President Harry S. Truman.

He gave hope and suggestions for a better world in a speech to more than 25,000 persons at the dedication of the Herbert Hoover Presidential Library.

Hoover, speaking "as the shadows gather around me," took a long look at the world situation and urged the free nations to take a new approach to attain peace.

He proposed the creation of a super-alliance of countries "willing to stand up and fight for their freedom."

The council, he said, would augment and, if necessary, act without the approval of the United Nations in combating world communism.

And the elder statesman called for a "new appraisal" of the world organization which either has failed to act for peace or is prevented from doing so by communists vetoes.

Among them was Truman. He recalled Hoover as "one of the greatest men in the world" and recalled his work in food relief programs in foreign countries.

"Mr. Hoover did a job for men that no other man could do," Truman said. "He saved the lives of millions of people after World War II just as he did for President Wilson after World War I."

A message from Kennedy described Hoover as a man "whose name has been synonymous with selfless devotion to public service and the relief of human want and suffering" for nearly 50 years. It was read by Dr. Wayne C. Grover, archivist of the United States.
