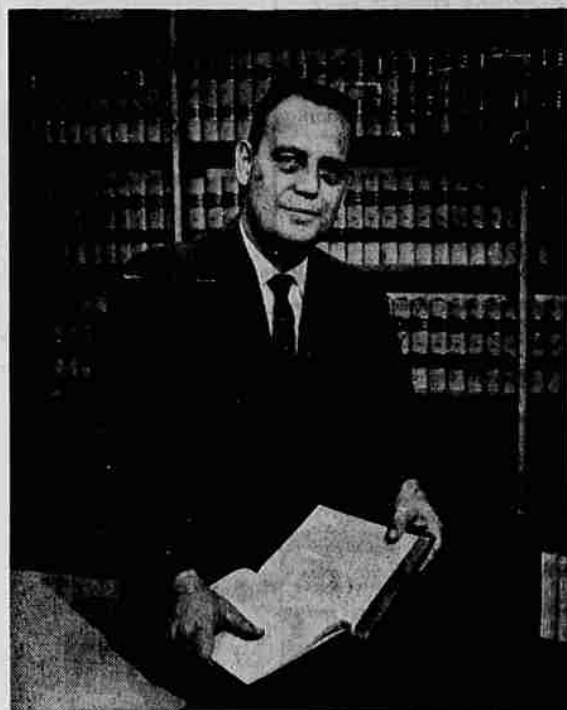

Roseburg Area Employment Picture Reported Favorable

The Roseburg area reflected a favorable rise in employment during July over June, as indicated by activities of the local office of the Oregon State Employment Service.

The monthly report of Manager F. C. Riley, shows 278 new job applications, compared with 442 in June and 419 in July of 1961. Job placements, non-agricultural, numbered 209 as against 183 in June and 150 for July the previous year.

Initial claims stood at 225, where as June's numbered 321 and July a year ago 628. The average weekly number claiming a week of joblessness was 384, as against 470 and 604 for the previous periods.

The percentage of unemployment

as compared to the average covered employment for the Roseburg area remains at a low level, again being slightly lower than the state average. It is listed at 3.0, compared with a 3.5 four weeks ago, 4.3 a year ago, 2.2 two years ago and 4.8 four years ago. The state average has been 3.3, 3.4, 4.0, 2.7 and 5.0 for the same periods, respectively.

Reports indicate the volume of wholesale and retail trade sales held fairly consistent with that for June, but an increase was noted during the latter part of the month.

The green bean harvest is now in progress in most fields in the area, and is approximately 20 per cent complete. The picker supply so far has been adequate.

Employment is expected to continue at a seasonal high for the next 30 to 60 days. However, some industries have scheduled vacation shutdowns which will result in a temporary increase in the number of unemployed.

Real Estate Honorary Will Hear Healy Speak

Roseburg Lumber Adding To Its Office Building

Roseburg Lumber Co. currently is adding to its office building to provide needed office expansion.

Manager Jack Snodgrass said a wing is being added to the south part of the building, which contains 3,800 square feet of floor space.

The work will require another three to four weeks to complete.

New Air Strip Built At Local Auction Market

Livestock buyers have joined the swing to air transport, and a local auction market owner has decided to make it easier for them.

The Douglas Livestock Market at Wilbur is just now completing construction of a 2,200-foot-long air strip alongside the market properties to the east, which will make it possible for livestock buyers to fly in from distant places, land their planes and walk the few feet to the market.

A spokesman for the market, which is owned by Jim Lewis, said livestock buyers are busy men, and time saved by air travel gives them a big advantage.

Henry Miller Construction is doing the work on property, part of which is owned by Miller and the remainder owned by Lewis.

The strip, lying along the railroad track, has been graded and leveled with heavy equipment to give the necessary length. It was necessary to tear out some high ground, but landing and takeoff will be possible from either north or south. A turf surface, rather than gravel is planned. The air strip should be ready to use in another week or so.

Douglas Livestock Market, started here about seven years ago, conducts auctions all day every Saturday. Cattle and sheep are the principal animals, but all other livestock is handled too. About a year ago, additions of pens and other facilities were made to the yard.

Between 35 and 40 men currently are employed. Wilbur Lumber, built in the early 1950s, was operated continuously up until the recent closure.

U. S. Plywood To Operate New Stud Mill After Plant Vacation Closure Aug. 27

United States Plywood Co. will close its plywood plant Monday for two weeks during the plant's annual vacation period for employees. Then when it re-opens Aug. 27, a new stud mill will open with it.

Manager William W. Wells said the stud mill will be capable of cutting about 60,000 board feet of 2x4's per shift, using about 30 men, and plans are to operate on a one-shift basis temporarily, possibly adding another shift later.

A part of the former sawmill operation, which was closed a year ago in July, has been converted for the new stud mill. But the manner of operation will be entirely different from that of the former plant.

More and more timber is being converted into plywood, and only logs not suitable for plywood manufacture and peeler cores will be cut in the stud mill, said Wells. To keep the former sawmill running it was necessary to feed through it great numbers of logs that might be suitable for plywood, and so could not be continued on an economical basis. That mill had a 40-foot carriage.

Roseburg Woman Selected Oregon Dairy Wives Head

Oregon dairymen have a powerful ally—it's their dairy wives, who have formed the Oregon State Dairy Wives group to promote dairy products.

Oregon is the second state to have such an organization. The Dairy Wives organization originated in Washington state where 16 county or regional units are established and working to promote the sale of more dairy products.

A group of wives from the Willamette Milk Producers group started the ball rolling recently when they set up the Oregon State Dairy Wives and elected a slate of officers headed by Mrs. Peter Pon, Roseburg, president.

Other officers are Mrs. Bertil Nelson, Bend, vice president; Mrs. Ralph Benter, Creswell, 2nd vice president; Mrs. Howard Gibson, Junction City, secretary; Mrs. Herbert Northcraft, Winston, treasurer; and Mrs. Floyd Smith, Grants Pass, publicity chairman.

First county unit to be organized in Oregon was the Polk county Dairy Wives.

What will the Dairy Wives do? One of their main tasks will be to help with the county dairy processing contests. This annual promotion, part of June-Is-Dairy Month, is one in which the women do an especially fine job.

The Dairy Wives have a flair for conducting county princess contests, coronation luncheons—sometimes cook and serve banquets themselves, sell tickets, decorate halls, calm nervous candidates and handle all the myriad jobs connected with such affairs, including the arrangement of appearances for the princess who is selected.

Activities Voiced

The many other activities of June Dairy Month also provide opportunity for the talents of the Dairy Wives. They can arrange window displays, set up milk dispensers in stores, decorate and distribute promotional materials.

Other activities include staging of such events as recipe contests and setting up milk bars at fairs.

Calvin Crandall, executive secretary of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission, and Oscar Hagg of Oregon State University, commended the Oregon Dairy Wives on their objectives.
