# Birth Total Is Lower For First Half 1962

PORTLAND (UPI)—The State Board of Health said recently that births in Oregon for the first six months of the year totaled 18,549, a rate of 20.6 infants per 1,000 population.

It is the second lowest half-year figure in the past five years. It was lower in 1959 with a 19.9 rating. The national birth rate is 22 per 1,000 population.

The report said death took 8,548 persons in the first six months, a rate of 9.5 per 1,000 population.
