

Auto Insurance Cost Shows Large Gain In Past Decade

NEW YORK (UPI)—American motorists, buying cars this year at a boom rate, upped their spending for insurance premiums by nearly 58 per cent in a 10-year span to \$5.9 billion, insurance information institute figures showed today.

The institute in its 1962 book, let, also was ready to tell why insurance rates have changed and even how some motorists can reduce their spending on premiums. In its report on premiums writ-

ten for 1961, the institute divided spending into three categories: automobile liability insurance, \$2.8 billion on bodily injury policies, \$1.16 billion on property damage, and \$1.95 billion on physical damage.

The total, just over \$5.9 billion compares with approximately \$1.27 billion, \$64 billion and \$1.5 billion in the same classifications for 1952, or a total of more than \$3.4 billion in premiums.

If you are one of the millions of Americans who have recently paid up your insurance so that you can drive with some peace of mind, you may have asked your agent what keeps the price of insurance up.

According to the institute, there are three principal factors for changes in rates. They are —The frequency of traffic accidents, the costs of repairing "both vehicles and people" after accidents and the costs of claim settlements and court awards.

The traffic accident figure is climbing year after year on streets and highways, said the institute, at times reaching a frequency of one every three seconds.

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI)—Actress Betsy Drake today divorced Cary Grant after a four-year separation, although she said "I still love him very much."

Miss Drake, 39, testified the suave actor appeared bored with her, and "preferred watching television to talking to me." She said he would "absent himself from home for weeks at a time even when he was not working on a picture."

Although Grant, 58, and his wife separated nearly four years ago, she did not file for divorce until this year. A property settlement dated May 31 met with Miss Drake's satisfaction, she said, but no terms were disclosed. There were no children.

Transcript Of Appeal Filed In Driving Case

Transcript of an appeal from a drunken driving conviction in the Canyonville Municipal Court of Laura Goodell has been filed in Circuit Court by Orville J. Benson.

The original complaint was filed July 5, when Benson pleaded innocent. He was found guilty on jury trial July 25 and sentenced to five days in jail and fined \$150. He filed oral notice of appeal at that time.

Richard Behrendt, 18, Calgary, Alberta, Canada, and Helmut Bisiak, 20, Vancouver, B.C., have been bound over to the Douglas County Grand Jury from the District Court of Gerald R. \$162 Million Asked For Basic School Support

SALEM (UPI)—The State Board of Education has decided to ask the 1963 legislature for a \$162,231,560 budget for basic school support during 1963-65.

The board wants the state support per child raised from its present \$120 a year figure to \$135 in 1964 and \$150 in 1965.

The proposed budget still faces study by the Department of Finance and Administration and the governor's office before it is sent to the lawmakers.

Also approved by the board today was an operational budget for the State Department of Education of \$13,320,000, which is triple the amount of its current expenditures.

Included in this total is \$9 million for community colleges of which \$4,070,000 is for construction.

Ronald E. Jones, Brooks, new chairman of the board, said that a conservative estimate of the needs of elementary and secondary education over the next two years is \$475 million, \$50 million more than the current biennial spending.

Cause of the increase will be 12,000 more pupils, construction of 1,000 classrooms and salary increases.

The board will continue its meeting through Tuesday.

Oregon Names New Architecture Dean

EUGENE (UPI)—Appointment of Dr. Walter L. Creese, 43, a professor of architecture at the University of Illinois, as dean of the School of Architecture and Allied Arts at the University of Oregon, was announced today.

The appointment will be effective July 1, 1963, according to an announcement by Dr. Arthur Flemming, president of the university. Acting Dean Mario D. Ross will continue as head of the school the coming year.

Dr. Flemming also announced appointment of Dr. John E. Lallas, 38, as director of planning and institutional research. It is a new office having to do with long-range planning. Lallas is a current member of the school of education staff.

Woman Pleads Guilty To Bad Check Charge

Alberta Bryant, 21, Eugene, Monday was sentenced to serve one year in the Douglas County jail for obtaining money by false pretenses by Circuit Court Judge Don H. Sanders.

She pleaded guilty to a grand jury indictment charging obtaining money by false pretenses, in connection with worthless checks passed in the Roseburg area.

The charge specifically pertained to a worthless \$21.62 check passed May 31 at the Safeway store for which she received \$20 cash and \$1.62 in merchandise.

Veterans Administration Draws Portrait Of World War II GIs

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Veterans Administration drew a portrait of Oregon's 172,000 World War II veterans today on the 17th anniversary of VJ-Day.

Regional Manager R. J. Novotny said the average ex-GI of World War II, based on national figures, is 44, married, has three children, and earns just under \$8,000 a year.

Nearly 98 per cent of the veterans are employed, most of them in manufacturing, trade, transport and construction. Ten per cent in the nation live on farms. Almost 88 per cent still are married to their original wives.

Those that made use of the GI Bill's home loan plan are living in homes costing an average \$14,500.

In Portland, Novotny said, 509 veterans daily can be found in

the city's VA Hospital. The hospital treats some 6,000 individuals a year. Another 17,000 receive VA outpatient clinic treatment.

The VA conducts a \$471 million insurance program for Oregon veterans. An educational and training program already has more than 84,000 alumni, including 4,600 engineers, 3,600 teachers, and 1,300 doctors, dentists and nurses.

Oregon ex-GIs have received more than 39,000 loans worth more than \$226 million. More than half of the loans have been repaid.

More than \$34 million a year in compensation and pension payments goes to some 49,000 Oregon disabled veterans, and widows, children and dependent parents of deceased veterans.

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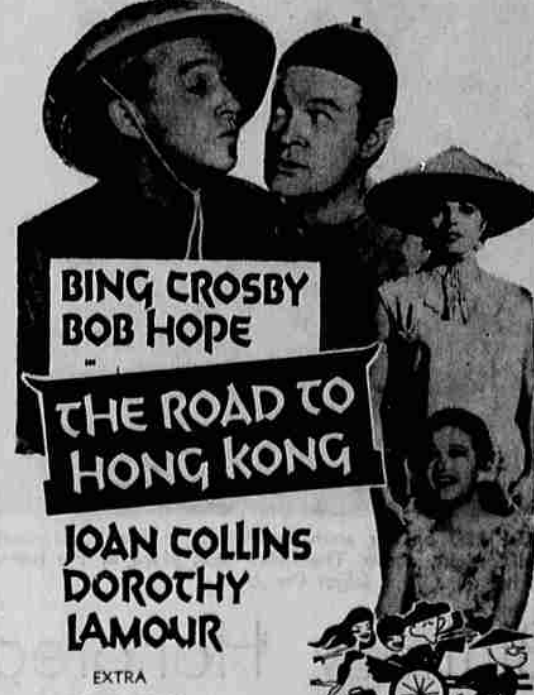
