## Water Shutoff Is Due Tonight

Residents of NW Dogwood St. and NW Estelle St. off Garden Valley Blvd. were advised by the Oregon Water Corp. that an interruption in domestic water service is slated tonight from 11 p.m. to 2 a.m.

The shutoff is in connection with water facility adjustments the company must make in connection with construction on NW Garden Valley Blvd., a company official said. The U.S. Veterans Administration Hospital will also be affected.

Home occupants were advised to shut off electricity to hot water heaters as a precautionary measure. In some instances, the company pointed out, hot water tanks drain during shutoffs, causing elements to burn out.

This is one of several interruptions of service which has occurred or will occur in northwest Roseburg during the next few days. The official said the company is making \$7,000 worth of facility adjustments in conjunction with the road improvement.

The company said its overall costs for facility adjustments within the city for various street projects this summer is \$10,000. Facility alterations were required for West Roseburg and North Roseburg street improvements and the Washington Ave. bridge access.

## Nikolayev Now Holds Record With 67 Orbits Around Earth

Completion of the twin flights left the Soviet Union with four astronauts and the United States with two who have orbited the earth. Nikolayev holds the record with 64 orbits, while Popovich made 48. Gagarin, the first man in space, made only one orbit. While Titov completed slightly more than 17. For the United States, Marine Lt. Col. John S. Glenn and Lt. Cmdr. Scott Carpenter made three orbits each.

Soviet space scientists indicated the pioneer twin flight paved the way for the erection of space stations from which manned rockets could take off for the moon and even beyond.

Nikolayev, a bachelor and former lumberjack who rocketed into space in Vostok III last Saturday, was in orbit just less than four full days. Popovich, 31, father of a 6-year-old girl, was in a parallel orbit in Vostok IV just under three days.

Moscow radio said Nikolayev made more than 64 orbits of the earth and covered 1,615,600 miles. Popovich completed more than 48 orbits and traveled about 1,243,000 miles.

10 Trips to Moon

Their combined mileage was about 2,858,600 miles or more than 10 times the 238,571-mile distance from the earth to the moon. The feat exceeded all previous records for extended flights in orbit.

The cosmonauts spun around the earth at 17,500 miles an hour at an altitude of more than 100 miles. For almost three full days they orbited within sight of each other.

The two spacemen set off their retro-rockets at precisely fixed intervals and began the perilous descent from space through the "heat barrier" of the friction-producing atmosphere.

Moscow radio said Vostok III and Vostok IV "landed normally."

which meant the cosmonauts rode safely down to the surface, suspended on the last portion by giant parachutes.

Moscow Radio broke into a regular program at 10:35 a.m. (3:35 a.m. EDT), just one minute after the Tass announcement, to report the news to the Soviet nation. The announcement triggered a burst of rejoicing by Russian citizens and set the stage for a mammoth welcome for the cosmonauts.

Tass said Nikolayev landed at 9:55 a.m. (2:55 a.m. EDT) and Popovich followed him at 10:01 a.m. (3:01 a.m. EDT).

Both men landed inside their spaceships, Tass said, with the last part of the hazardous descent presumably cushioned by parachutes.

"The spaceships Vostok III and Vostok IV landed normally," Tass said.

The perilous trip down back through the atmosphere — while friction can turn a spaceship white-hot — was not disclosed by Soviet authorities until the cosmonauts were safely on the ground.

Flight Programs Fulfilled

Tass said the flight programs of the two spaceships "have been completely fulfilled."

Nikolayev and Popovich maintained radio contact with each other and at times their capsules were so close that the men could see each other, Soviet authorities reported.

Periodically since they were

rocketed into space, the cosmonauts were shown on television on sets in the Soviet Union and in Europe. Pictures showed them threading needles, doing calisthenics and eating.

One of the stated purposes of the cosmonauts' "group flight" was to perfect rendezvous techniques necessary for an eventual trip from the earth to the moon and return.

While the men were in flight, Soviet authorities released no information to indicate that Nikolayev and Popovich had rendezvoused in orbit. Monitoring stations abroad had reported the distances between the spaceships ranging from six miles to 125 miles, with the distance increasing in the latter part of the flight.

American Hopes Shattered

Announcement of the dual flight last weekend shattered American hopes of surpassing the Russians in the race to reach the moon. President Kennedy said the Soviet feat definitely put Russia ahead of America in the race, and American scientists said the United States will be unable to match the achievement until 1964—if then.

According to official information Nikolayev spent 94 hours and 25 minutes in space. His "space brother" Popovich was in orbit 70 hours and 59 minutes.

## District Chamber Manager Speaks To Kiwanis, C of C

The importance of an effective organization to promote better community, state and federal government was stressed Tuesday by James C. Schill, district manager for the United States Chamber of Commerce, serving Oregon and Washington.

Schill addressed a joint meeting of the Roseburg Kiwanis Club and Roseburg Chamber of Commerce at noon in the Umpqua Hotel.

The speaker geared his talk to the importance of businessmen getting into government, because government, he said, is here to stay and is big business in itself. How the government is run affects everyone, he noted.

Political parties no longer are Republicans against Democrats, but organized labor against the public community. Labor has effectively organized to the point of gaining a great amount of authority in electing candidates for various positions it has backed. He cited the "Louisiana Story" as an example as to how labor has done

what he termed a "magnificent" job in making its weight felt.

The importance of profits to business was stressed by the speaker. "Only profits can create jobs in your community," said Schill.

But making money and going after industry should be only a part of the businessman's job. He should also be willing to face the problems created by community growth, such as school needs, streets, parks, sanitation and other

This is the second fire in several weeks on the roof of the depot. The first was suspected to have been caused by sparks from an engine too.

## County Firm Seeks Tri-County Rights

SALEM (UPI) — Douglas Electric Cooperative is seeking exclusive authority to operate in areas it presently serves in Douglas, Lane and Curry counties.

In a request to the public utility commissioner, the co-op also asks for exclusive rights in two areas of Lane and Douglas counties that presently are unserved by any electric utility.

Largest communities within the co-op's service area are Seaside, Yoncalla and Elkton.

The application excludes the city of Drain which has its own municipal electric system.

The co-op is the ninth of federally financed electric cooperatives to apply for certification of serving areas under the law passed in 1961.

## Second Accident Victim Succumbs

Peter Nygard Bellum, 63, 8108 Haron St., Oakland, Calif., died this morning at a local hospital from injuries received in a three-car collision north of Oakland on Interstate Highway 5, Sunday.

Bellum was born Aug. 25, 1899 and is survived by a son, Donald, Cedar City, Utah.

The body was taken to Sutherland-Oakland Mortuary, which is in charge of local arrangements. Announcement of funeral arrangements is pending arrival of family members from Fresno, Calif., and Utah.

The accident involving Bellum's car also claimed the life of his sister, Rena Meta Bellum, 67, River Falls, Wis. She was killed instantly when she was thrown from the car, it was reported.

The collision occurred Sunday morning five miles north of Oakland. Investigating officers said Bellum was apparently traveling north in the wrong lane of traffic when another vehicle driven by James Robert Wiemers, Fall Creek, traveling south, swerved to avoid a collision. Bellum's car struck the rear corner of the Wiemers vehicle and continued on to collide with a third automobile driven by William Cole Nichols of Raleigh, N.C.

None of the passengers in the other two cars was seriously injured.

Bellum's death raises the Douglas County toll to 19 traffic fatalities for the year.

## Logging Mishap Victim Is Home From Hospital

Jack R. Salberg of 428 Carey St., Winston, is home from the hospital but faces a long convalescence after breaking his leg in a logging mishap last Thursday morning.

An employee of Burkenfield Logging Co., Salberg was injured from the kickback of a tree he was bucking. The accident occurred in Dead Horse Canyon in the Reston area.

Salberg suffered a compound leg fracture. It is expected he will be off his feet for several months. The Winston man was released from the hospital Monday and is now home, the family reports.
