Ellis Turns In No-No Effort For League Leading Padres

Sam Ellis of San Diego was in top form the last time he pitched but he was even sharper in Tuesday night's Pacific Coast League play with a 4-0, no-hit, no-run victory against Tacoma.

Ellis, a 21-year-old righthander down from Cincinnati, fanned seven and allowed six walks in registering his tenth victory of the season.

Salt Lake City topped Spokane 6-3, Portland took Vancouver 5-3 and Seattle blanked Hawaii 2-0 in other games.

San Diego, which still leads the loop by 11 games, got all it needed when Jim Pisoni hit his 14th homer in the third. The Padres got another in the fourth when Ron Samford's sacrifice scored Tommy Harper from third and added single runs in the fifth and ninth.

Tacoma has now gone 30 long innings without scoring a run. Seattle's Pete Smith wasn't far behind Ellis with a three-hitter over Hawaii. Smith fanned three and walked three for his eighth victory.

Seattle got both its markers in the third on a single by Ted Schreiber, a walk, an error, a sacrifice fly and a single by Jim Rivera.

Hal Jones banged a two-run homer in the seventh to carry Salt Lake City to its win. Dave

Tyriver picked up his victory in relief and Bobby Prescott had a two-run homer for the losers.

Jones' homer came behind a single by Ken Kuhn and the Bees got an insurance run during the inning on Walt Bond's single and Gordy Lund's double.

Portland scored a pair in the sixth and three more in the seventh to top Vancouver. Ray Looney and Joe McCabe each hit solo homers for the losers.

Jay Hankins with four hits led Portland's 10-hit attack and drove in a pair of runs to give the win to Bob Giegler although he left in Portland's big inning for a pinch hitter.

PORTLAND (UPI)—Minnesota Vikings quarterback Fran Tarkenton was flown home sick Tuesday night.

Dr. Donald Lannin, Viking physician, said Tarkenton was sent back to Minneapolis for treatment of an inflamed throat. "He has a swollen windpipe and a possible infection. An allergy may be involved," the doctor said.

Tarkenton played nearly the entire game in the Vikings 30-24 loss to the San Francisco 49ers last Saturday. He had difficulty breathing and nearly collapsed in the third period.

"If I had known it was that bad he wouldn't have gone on," said Viking coach Norm Van Brocklin.

The loss dropped the Lumberjills into the losers bracket where they faced the Eagle Point Dairy Maids. The Dairy Maids scored in every inning except the fifth to eliminate the 'Jills with a 13-2 triumph.

Against the powerful Eugene team, centerfielder Sue Weber spoiled Miss Welborn's bid for a no-hitter when she rapped out a single. Against the Dairy Maids the Roseburg crew managed to pick up five hits and two runs, but could not match the 13-run output of the Eagle Point nine.

A large field of golfers from the 7,000 attorneys attending the convention took part in the tournament.

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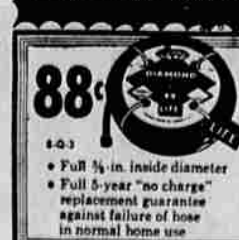
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
