Shirtcliff is a hefty tackle who made the Myrtle Creek Vikings one of the stronger teams in Umpqua Valley League play, though the Glide Wildcats emerged with the conference crown. Shirtcliff is a two-year all-league player as a result of his outstanding blocking and tackling.

Though not big, the two Eagles have good speed and a lot of determination. Both are scheduled for plenty of action against time rolls around.

Spokane, the cellar club, topped the Padres 7-4 Friday night and Reed scored his fourth victory of the year over the leaders although he needed relief help from Mal McGavock.

In other games, Salt Lake City nipped Tacoma 5-4, Seattle downed Vancouver 4-2 and Hawaii won over Portland 6-4 in 10 innings.

Reed left in the seventh when San Diego got two runs on Hal Bevens' double. McGavock came in and allowed another run to cross but that was all.

Spokane had scored two in the first and added three in the fourth on two singles and two P.A.D. errors. Al Ferrera's homer with Nate Oliver aboard gave the Indians two more runs in their half of the seventh.

Walt Bond singled in Salt Lake City's eventual winning run in the seventh to erase an early Tacoma lead. The Giants had scored three runs in a first inning highlighted by doubles by Ricardo Joseph and

Bill Hain and added another run in the fifth.

Hawaii's overtime win over Portland was the result of two unearned runs. Stan Palys tallied on an error and Joe Hannah came home on a sacrifice fly.

Hawaii took a 4-3 lead in the ninth on a three-run homer by Ray Webster but Portland tied it with an unearned run in the bottom of the inning. R.G. Smith was the winner in relief.

Vancouver and Seattle were knotted 2-2 until the fifth when Curt Jensen of the Rainiers tripled and scored on a single.

Griffith, Moyer After Title Fight

TACOMA, Wash. (UPI) — Welterweight champion Emile Griffith and middleweight contender Denny Moyer — two young, fast, clever and rugged scrappers—fight here tonight in a non-title rubber match for the right to a shot at the split middleweight crown.

Matchmaker Teddy Brenner of Garden is arranging for tonight's winner to challenge middleweight co-champion Paul Pender.

Griffith of New York, 24, will not be risking his 147-pound crown in tonight's nationally televised 10-rounder at the indoor Tacoma Sports Arena because both he and 23-year-old Moyer of Portland, Ore., will weigh more than the 147-pound limit.

Each won a decision in their two fights in 1960, before sleek Emile became champion and before baby-faced Denny grew into a middleweight.

Griffith is favored at 7 to 5 because he is the champion and because he is rated the harder puncher. However, each is unusually rugged. Neither was ever knocked out.

Griffith, seeking his sixth straight victory, had three bouts this year. He outpointed Johnny Torres, recaptured the welterweight crown on a fatal 12th-round knockout over Benny (Kid) Paret in March at New York and successfully defended the title against Ralph Dupas at Las Vegas, Nev., July 13.

In his 33 bouts, Emile's 30 victories included 11 knockouts.

Moyer also had three bouts this year. He outpointed Sugar Ray Robinson in February but took a June bout with Ted Wright on four days notice and dropped a verdict to Detroit Ted. However, in a return bout with Wright on July 7, Denny won an avenging decision. His 39 fights include 32 wins and seven defeats. A comparatively light puncher, he scored only eight knockouts.

Angels Post Two Wins While Yanks Lose 7-2

Suddenly it's spring again for the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Less than 48 hours ago they were faced with the threat of a massive collapse in the face of a twin drive by the San Francisco Giants and the Cincinnati Reds. The promise of spring—when they were hailed as the strongest team in the National League—seemed to be fading away.

Now, all at once, they're back out in front by 3 1/2 games and the pressure of a closing push is back on their rivals.

The Dodgers won what may be remembered as their most important game of the season Friday night when they beat the Cincinnati Reds, 6-2, and the Giants bowed to the Milwaukee Braves, 6-4. The victory thrust the Reds 6 1/2 games off the pace meaning that only an incredible late-season drive can bring them back into the race.

Ron Fairly's three-run homer was the big blow for the Dodgers, who faced a team that had won 25 of its previous 31 games. The eighth-inning drive clinched the second victory for rookie Pete Richter, who went 2 1/3 innings and got strong relief from Larry Sherry and Ron Perranoski.

Giants Suffered Blow

The Giants suffered a severe blow to their hopes when they lost to the Braves. Relief pitcher Claude Raymond registered his fifth consecutive save and Lee Maye homered for the Braves while Willie Mays and Orlando Cepeda homered for the Giants.

The Pittsburgh Pirates routed the Philadelphia Phillies, 9-1, and the Houston Colts downed the Chicago Cubs, 3-2, in other NL

games. St. Louis at New York was rained out.

The Los Angeles Angels downed the Washington Senators, 4-3 and 3-2, and moved to within four games of the first place New York Yankees who dropped a 7-2 decision to the Kansas City Athletics. In the other AL games, the Baltimore Orioles beat the Cleveland Indians, 5-2, the Detroit Tigers defeated the Chicago White Sox, 2-0, and the Boston Red Sox topped the Minnesota Twins, 9-4, after losing the opener of their two-night doubleheader, 7-3.

Harvey Haddix pitched a nine-hitter and Bob Skinner, Donn Clendenon and Bill Mazeroski had two hits each for the Pirates, who clinched their victory with a six-run third-inning. The win was Haddix' eighth of the season against five losses.

Colts Moved Up
Hal Smith singled home the winning run for the Colts, who moved past the Cubs into eighth place in the NL. Russ Kemmerer shut out the Cubs for the last two innings for the Colts.

Leon Wagner's 10th-inning homer gave the Angels their first game victory and Lee Thomas homered in the second game as the Angels picked up a game and a half on the Yankees. Tom Morgan shut out the Senators for the last two innings to win his third game in the opener while Don Lee went 6 2/3 innings to win his 10th game in the nightcap.

Bobby Del Greco homered and Ed Chries and Jerry Lumpe had two hits each for the Athletics, who handed Jim Bouton his fourth defeat. Mickey Mantle homered and Tom Tresh tripled for the Yankees.

Milt Pappas pitched a five-hitter and catcher Charley Lau drove in three runs with a homer and two singles for the Orioles; Jim Bunning pitched a three-hitter and Rocky Colavito had a two-run double for the Tigers; and homers by Earl Wilson, Lou Clinton, Gary Geiger and Eddie Bressoud paced the Red Sox to their victory after Jack Kraklek's seven-hitter gave the Twins their opening-game victory.
