Rubber Bridge, Duplicate Differ

A letter from Fitchburg, Mass., reads, "I have heard that the correct play at rubber bridge and at match point duplicate is not the same. Can you give an example?" Today's hand is one. South at

rives at a normal three no-trump contract on standard, simple bidding. West has an automatic queen of spades lead and South should win the trick with his king and go right after the club suit.

At rubber bridge he plays the king of clubs and then overtakes his queen with dummy's ace. He knows that he is probably giving up a trick by this play but he needs only five club tricks for game and rubber and he wants to guard against the possibility that clubs will break 4-1.

It is a wise precaution. If he fails to overtake the queen of clubs he will wind up with only seven tricks. His opponents will collect a 200-point penalty and the rubber will still be going on.

In duplicate, declarer has a real problem. He will recognize the safety play, but he will probably decide against it and go down. His reasoning will be along these lines: "Everyone else will be in the same three no-trump contract and will probably get the same opening lead. The odds are against a 4-1 club break. Therefore, why should I give up a trick in order to play safe." In duplicate, extra tricks are worth extra risk.

Umpqua River Summer Water Outlook Poor

A slim snowpack in the region watersheds will result in a short stream supply for the Umpqua River in 1963.

This is the forecast of Bob L. Whaley, snow survey supervisor for the Soil Conservation Service. Whaley said the outlook for the 1963 irrigation season in the Rogue-Umpqua area is varied, but storage will save the day for the major irrigation districts. Other irrigators, dependent upon the natural flow of streams, can expect very little water past the middle of summer.

March storms helped good additional snow at high elevations but did not reduce the huge deficit in the snowpack which is at a record low. Water content of the snow on April 1 is 28 per cent average, he said.

The North Umpqua River below Lemolo reservoir is forecast at 48 per cent average or very similar to the runoff in the dry year of 1941.

Oregon State University, the Oregon state engineer and others cooperate in the watershed study. Forecasts are made on the assumption that average conditions of temperature and precipitation will occur during the forecast period.

Outlook Bleak
Statewide, Oregon is beginning its 1963 irrigation season with an extremely poor water supply outlook for lands served from direct streamflow. In contrast, most lands served from stored water supplies will have sufficient water for most crops.

March storms brought heavy snow to the Cascades and highest areas of Eastern Oregon but failed to make up for the huge deficit in the record-low snowpack. Many reservoirs are likely to be completely drained this season leaving no carry-over water for next year.

Hanna Co. Report Upholds GSA Stockpiling Contracts

The Hanna Mining Co.'s contract "resulted in the lowest cost nickel and involved the most efficient use of the least government money, either per pound of nickel bought or per pound of capacity created."

This statement, attributed to George M. Humphrey, is contained in the company's annual report referring to the nickel mining and smelting property operation at Riddle. It refers to the report of an investigation during 1962 by the Stockpiling Subcommittee of the Senate Armed Services Committee into the company's stockpiling contracts with the General Services Administration.

Hearings on the contracts were conducted in August and in October. During these hearings, the report says, disputes arose between government and company witnesses over the legal and accounting principals to be applied under the contracts. Claims were made by government witnesses that certain expense costs should have been capitalized. The General Services Administration has recently requested the company to repay \$1,818,958 on this account.

"As we testified before the subcommittee, we vigorously deny the validity of this claim and firmly believe our accounting procedures were entirely in order," the report states. "All of our accounts were subject to annual audit by our independent certified public accountants, Ernst & Ernst, and were also reviewed by the General Accounting Office and periodically by the General Services Administration."

The report says, "Our view of the issues raised by the investigation was clearly set forth by George M. Humphrey in his testimony before the subcommittee. . . . Subsequent testimony regarding the nickel expansion program of the government confirms our statement that, of all the transactions the Government made for this purpose, the Hanna contracts resulted in the lowest cost nickel and involved the most efficient use of the least government money, either per pound of nickel bought or per pound of capacity created."

"This is one of the comparatively few cases where every cent of

money advanced by the government has already been repaid in full with interest. We continue to feel strongly that the Hanna contracts served the interests of this country well."

The Riddle properties operated at capacity throughout the year, producing 21,139,000 pounds of contained nickel, the company says. This was the first time in which the entire sales were made commercially and the product became solidly established in the market. Temporarily slackened demand in the fourth quarter gave an opportunity to establish a desirable level of warehouse inventories in Pittsburgh, Detroit, Chicago and Riddle.

Roseburg Appraiser Guest Speaker At Eugene Meeting

Guest speaker at the March 28 meeting of the Eugene chapter of the Society of Real Estate Appraisers was Roseburg appraiser, John Fleck. By invitation Fleck spoke on the subject of development of an "Appraisal Plant."

The meeting, held at the new Country Squire Restaurant and Motel was attended by a large group of representatives from banks, savings and loan companies, utility companies, appraisers and real estate brokers, having special interest in real estate values and modern appraisal techniques. As fee appraiser for numerous clients including F.H.A., the Federal V. A. and the State of Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs, Fleck has conceived wide acclaim as having one of the finest appraisal plants in the state.

In addition to explaining the step-by-step procedure for developing an "appraisal plant," Fleck's remarks included comment on the tremendous burden placed on the highly-ethical, well-informed, conscientious appraiser in today's appraisal work.

"Never before in history, has the appraiser been asked to estimate value with the degree of accuracy,

as is expected of him today. Today's appraiser is asked to make an estimate of value, calling for a degree of accuracy, that would justify a lender making a 97 per cent or 100 per cent mortgage loan. Such accuracy obviously leaves little or no margin for error. This is almost beyond the comprehension of the appraiser of yesterday."

"The science of appraising today, in spite of its advanced techniques, has not, to date, and may never develop into a perfect science, so perfect as to be 100 per cent accurate. Nonetheless, today's competent appraisers, students of the appraisal science, continue relentlessly, striving toward this goal, constantly improving the various techniques, as well as the appraisal process. One of the important advancements toward this goal, said Fleck, is the development of the modern appraisal plant."

Fleck presented a similar program for the Southern Oregon Chapter of the Society of Real Estate Appraisers, last fall. Also, tentatively scheduled is an appearance before a like group in Pendleton, later in the spring.
