

Twelve Halter Classes Are Open At Quarterhorse Show April 26

Twelve halter classes are scheduled for all ages of quarterhorses in the State of Jefferson Quarterhorse Show scheduled in Roseburg April 26-28.

The classes are scheduled for all ages of the breed, report spokesmen for the show. Performance classes will be run in a big variety of roping, reining, cutting and games, so that every horse entered will have a chance to show what he can do, whether it be winning a conformation class or in action in performance.

New Event Set

A new event to be shown in an approved show for points is team roping. Heading and heeling horses will be judged separately, both earning full points. The working cowhorse class has never been shown in Roseburg before, so there will be new and interesting events for the spectators. The performance classes will be held Saturday evening, April 27, and Sunday afternoon, with different types of events for each day.

The champion working horse of the show will be awarded a hand-tooled trophy saddle, which is being donated by a Roseburg store. Special trophies will be awarded to reserve champion working horse, champion working gelding and high-point horse in the youth division.

Prizes Notable

Halters will be presented to all first place winners in the halter classes, and a \$50 purse will go to each performance class winner, in

addition to trophies and ribbons awarded to each class winner.

A banquet is scheduled Friday night, April 26, to launch the show weekend. It will be held at the Community Building at the Douglas County Fairgrounds, with Miss Oregon as a guest. The public is invited to this, as well as the other events at the fairgrounds. Banquet tickets may be purchased at Robertson's Shell Station, Allen's Western Goods in Winston and Montgomery Ward's Store.

Local YMCA Group Hears OTI Staffer

Jack Douglas, volunteer YMCA World Service worker who is on the teaching staff at Oregon Technical Institute in Klamath Falls, was speaker at last night's board meeting of the Roseburg YMCA.

Douglas reported the World Service program is in its 67th year and operates in 77 countries with no two programs alike. The total effort of the YMCA World Alliance, with headquarters at Geneva, Switzerland, makes this possible throughout the world. All YMCAs give to the National Council, which in turn supports the World Alliance.

Refugees Assisted

The National Council is now helping 160,000 Cuban refugees in Miami, according to Douglas. He also reported the National Council is sending 17 students to Japan this year and 17 to Germany to instruct YMCA enthusiasts in those countries on the art of building summer camps for youth.

Douglas reported YMCA interest was high in both Russia and China prior to Communist domination. However, he said, there is now a committee from the World Alliance working with a committee from Russia to resume YMCA activities with the rest of the world and that YMCA activities are continuing in China under sponsorship of church interests.

He reported it is the hope of the World Alliance to bring YMCA work to all countries and to unite all people in building world-wide Christian Fellowship, and promote Christian ideals and values. He closed by saying world-wide understanding and work of the World Service program comprise the missionary efforts of the YMCA.

Reports were made by T. L. Goodwin on finance; Thomas Hartfield, membership; and Hartfield and Joe Scallon on the wrestling program requests for equipment.

Schulz Reports

Wayne Schulz, executive secretary of the YMCA, reported on the Southern Oregon meeting held in Ashland regarding the summer camp at Diamond Lake. Mrs. Bruce Hetrick and Robert Keady have been appointed to the exploratory committee on the summer camp. In this connection, Schulz reported the youth program plans a candy sale to raise money to go to camp. This project will be pending until approval from the United Fund is granted. In previous years, youngsters conducted a soap sale to raise money to go to camp.

Mrs. Don Matson and John Loosley were named as a committee for shower installation. Bill Green, T. L. Goodwin, the Rev. James Jenkins and Mrs. Matson were appointed on the policy forming committee for the Y and plans were made for a "stop smoking clinic" to be sponsored by the Y. The latter will be a five-night clinic of lectures and films open to the public.

Soviet Boats Near Florida

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Two Russian trawlers loaded with electronic equipment cruised within sight of President Kennedy's ocean-front vacation home Tuesday.

The Coast Guard sent patrol boats to watch the Soviet ships but reported the trawlers were in international waters and no attempt was made to stop them.

Both ships were running the same southerly course, apparently headed for Cuba.

The Coast Guard said one of the trawlers was spotted about 11 a.m. EST, about two hours before Kennedy cruised on his yacht into the Atlantic and the other about 4 p.m. EST, an hour or so after Kennedy returned home from his cruise.

The Kennedy yacht — with the President, Mrs. Kennedy and Charles E. Bohlen, U. S. ambassador to France aboard — cruised less than a mile into the ocean before circling back into the intracoastal canal, presumably because of choppy Atlantic waters.

SOC Alumni Set Get-Together

Alumni of Southern Oregon College are planning a get-together in Roseburg May 11.

Festivities begin at 6:30 p.m. in the Umpqua Hotel. This event was originally scheduled for April 27 but a new date was announced by Dale E. Truax, secretary of alumni affairs.

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Youth Advisory Committee Eyes Summer Work Camp Possibilities

The Douglas County Juvenile Advisory Committee Tuesday night received indications it would probably not have any trouble finding work for delinquent boys in a juvenile work camp program.

The council is currently studying the possibilities of setting up a work camp program under the jurisdiction of the Douglas County Juvenile Court. It would be used for young men, at the discretion of the court, who probably should not be sent back to their own homes or to foster homes, and at the same time, are not incorrigible to the point they should be sent to the MacLaren School for Boys.

Forest Service Heard

Two speakers at the meeting were Vondis Miller, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest, and Jack Price, Little River District ranger in the same forest. Both agreed plenty of work would be available for young boys in forestry and conservation work.

Miller said the Forest Service has financial limitations which would limit any money it could provide for the program, but he said technical supervision and training could be offered. He said it was possible some transportation and food could be provided also.

"We've got a million acres and I don't anticipate we would run out of work for the boys," he said. Both he and Price said they thought work could be provided in both summer and winter.

Others Show Interest
Others at the meeting indicated

the Douglas Forest Protective Association and the state Game Department had also indicated interest in the project. None of the jobs involved would compete with regular labor markets.

County Juvenile Officer Julian Helleck reported during the meeting that members of his department and the Douglas County Court had investigated the possibilities of setting up a semi-permanent headquarters at Winchester Wayside Park during the next year. He said the park would get little use during the year because of highway bridge construction. At the same time, he said, the community would get a chance to see the program in action.

Completing the evening's program was a showing of colored slides by John Seasons of Riddle on the subject of camping.
