

Community College Bill Freezes Building Funds

The Oregon Senate Education Committee has approved a bill on community colleges which would allow Douglas County to continue with planning for a college, but would block state building funds for the project until 1967.

Supporters of the plan for an Umpqua Community College District had previously stated there would probably be no construction started here until 1967 anyway, so this bill will not slow up the project locally.

The Senate bill states the creation of new community colleges for at least two years, without pulling the pins from under eight existing ones and one budding one (Douglas County). It carries a clause to allow Douglas County to go ahead with planning for its college.

The state Board of Education voted earlier this week to appeal to the State Supreme Court a decision by Douglas County Circuit Court Judge Don H. Sanders which overruled formation of the district. Judge Sanders had ruled the state board did not enter evidence on the district at its public hearing, so thereby had no facts on record on which to base its decision to form the district.

The bill was approved 6-2 and sent to the Ways and Means Committee. It also contains a provision that would require more local support for community colleges in Portland and Salem.

The bill was approved in the face of community college growth in the past two years that threatens to cost the financially-pinched

state increasingly large sums if not checked.

The bill would: — Put a two-year moratorium on new community colleges. After that, legislative approval for a new center would be required. Community college districts, however, could still be formed.

— Block state building money for new colleges until 1967, including Douglas County. Eight present centers, however, might get more building money.

— Revise the formula whereby the state pays as much as two-thirds of operating costs. Estimates say the change would increase Portland's local share per student from \$22 to \$48 and Salem's from \$15 to \$64. Unless their costs change, other parts of the formula would leave state support unchanged for Central Oregon, Southwest Oregon, Blue Mountain, Treasure Valley, Clatsop and Eugene Community Colleges.

The committee rejected an amendment that would have let The Dalles squeak under the wire to go ahead with its proposed community college. The district plans to file its petitions this week. Pressure for its inclusion is expected to be strong and a change could be made to include it.

Young Californian Pleads Guilty To Forgery Charge

Larry Allen Webb, 19, of Coachella, Calif., pleaded guilty to forgery on arraignment before Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodrich Thursday. The judge ordered a presentence investigation.

Webb admitted forging the signature of a fictitious Roy Tredway to a \$42.57 check on the Douglas County State Bank and attempting to pass it as Howard's Men's Store.

A charge of rape against Grant Marlow, 19, Winston, brought in a Grand Jury indictment, has been dismissed on motion of the district attorney, on grounds that he has pleaded guilty to a similar crime involving the same set of circumstances. The order was signed by Judge Don H. Sanders. Marlow pleaded guilty to contributing to the delinquency of a 14-year-old girl and is awaiting presentence investigation.

Sam R. Teasley, 23, Powers, pleaded guilty at a hearing in the District Court of Gerald R. Hayes in a paternity hearing Thursday. His case was remanded to Circuit Court where a \$50 monthly support payment for the child was ordered.

JFK Ready To Give Views On Steel

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy was reported ready to give his views today on the steel price increases.

The President was not expected to bring up the matter in his prepared address to the American Society of Newspaper Editors (ASNE). But he was said to be prepared to answer questions about the price hikes after his speech.

Kennedy's speech at the ASNE lunch (1:45 p.m. EST) was expected to concentrate on the nation's economy.
