## State BPW Projects Evaluation Made At Weekend Meeting Here

Evaluation of results in carrying out projects outlined at a fall conference held in Lakeview occupied members of the Southern Oregon District of the Business and Professional Women's Clubs at their spring conference held in Roseburg weekend.

Over 70 women registered for the conference, held in the Indian Room of the Umpqua Hotel. Delegates attended from Medford, Grants Pass, Ashland and Klamath Falls. The Lakeview contingent was unable to appear due to bad road conditions caused by inclement weather.

### Opens With Dinner

The concentrated agenda began formally with a 7 p.m. dinner meeting Saturday and closed about noon Sunday following a breakfast meeting which featured a panel report and discussion by presidents of the five clubs represented.

Speakers for Saturday night's session were Mrs. V. L. Greene, president of the Oregon Federation, and a special guest speaker Renuka Raghaven, now studying for her doctorate at Oregon State University on a BPW scholarship.

In her talk, Mrs. Greene stressed ways in which women can become better individuals and said "the investment you make in yourself can never be taken away." She said that four main objectives of most persons include the desire to "live," to be important, to be loved and to find variety in life. Her speech, largely inspirational, dealt with how the "seeds" planted at the fall conference, were now coming to fruition.

### Cites Changing Status

Renuka Raghaven, appearing in colorful native dress, told of the changing status of women in India, citing the past 10 years as a period of great progress for women in her country. Many now being educated have chosen medicine as a profession, she said, one reason being that because of ancient taboos, many women will not seek medical aid from a male physician.

## Morse Says He'll Continue Fight For Federal Use Of Tongue Point

SALEM (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., says the General Services Administration (GSA) does not plan to sell the Tongue Point Naval Station to an Astoria group for slightly under \$1 million.

Morse addressed some 300 Democrats Saturday night.

The Oregon Democrat said he is informed in a letter from the GSA that the agency now intends to put the abandoned \$14 million naval station on public sale about June 24.

Morse said he will continue to battle for a federal use for the property and buildings. He served notice that he will carry his fight to the floor by trying to attach riders to appropriations bills calling for new buildings where Tongue Point might be used instead.

He said the GSA told him that it felt it would be abusing its authority by selling Tongue Point to Astoria for \$920,000 since the city intends to relay it immediately to a private group.

### Delay Sought

Morse said he will try to postpone the June 24 date for public sale in order to "exhaust all possibilities for federal use."

In reply to some criticism, he said he has been active in the Tongue Point situation from the beginning.

Morse said "any time it is proposed to dispose of a \$14 million property for less than \$1 million, there exists the ingredients of a scandal."

He said he has been informed that Commerce Secretary Luther Hodges conceded the station should have been used by the Coast and Geodetic Survey, which finally located last year at Seattle.

"The administration has admitted that it made a mistake last year in not locating the oceanography program of the geodetic survey at Tongue Point," he said.

"I think it deserves a chance to rectify that mistake. I think it deserves a chance to make a new effort to utilize Tongue Point, he said.

## Governor Gets Anti-Pollution, Railroad Bills For Signature

SALEM (UPI) — The House passed and sent to the governor Saturday bills strengthening the anti-pollution law and retaining the railroad full crew law.

They were about the first major pieces of legislation to go to the governor since the legislator's pay raise early in the session.

The action on a total of 26 bills came at the first Saturday session of the house. The Senate did not meet Saturday.

The pollution bill would make it possible for the State Sanitary Authority (SSA) to shut down promptly a flagrant polluter, without going through the present lengthy hearing procedures.

**Contracts Possible**

It also authorizes local units to

contract with each other for anti-pollution programs.

Rep. Richard Kennedy, D-Eugene, praised the bill but said he was disappointed it did not include new controls on agricultural burning.

Rep. Sidney Bazett, R-Grants Pass, said the bill sent to the governor would let the SSA take action to halt present dumping of sewage into the Rogue River.

The railroad full crew law, a total victory for the unions, whipped through 48-9 without debate. It not only retains the law requiring six crewmen on long freight trains in Oregon, but also modernizes it by deleting its reference to "steam" trains.

**Other Bills**

The house sent several other bills to the governor.

One would permit the use of highway gas tax money to match federal money in repaying the expenses of persons who are displaced by new highways. Most of it would apply in the Portland area.

One would let the state health officer shut down an unsanitary farm labor camp where the county officer can't or won't.

## State Association Elects Local Man

James Wilson of Roseburg was named second vice president over the weekend during the election of the Oregon Collectors Association.

The convention was held in Portland. Highlight of the association convention was the presentation of three scholarships totaling \$500 to the three finalists in the statewide essay contest for high school seniors on "the proper use of credit."

Last year's winner in the contest was from Roseburg.

The winner this year was Cheryl Taubman of Salem. Her scholarship amounted to \$500.

More than 100 members from the state attended the meet for representatives of collection agencies.

## Former Crime Czar Wins Court Hearing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Former crime czar Frank Costello won a Supreme Court hearing today in his fight against the government's efforts to deport him to his native Italy.

The court agreed to hear arguments on Costello's appeal sometime next fall or winter and then hand down a written opinion. Today's order stayed a ruling by the U.S. Court of Appeals which had held last Dec. 4 that Costello could be deported.

The Supreme Court said it will confine itself to deciding whether the deportation act applies to an individual who was a naturalized citizen at the time of a federal conviction. Justice John M. Harlan did not participate.

## Automobile 'Totaled' In Saturday Accident

An automobile, a 1955-model coach, owned and operated by Raymond Hugh Gaswint of 111 Valentine Ave., Sutherlin, was "totaled" in an accident on Highway 42, about four miles west of Winston early Saturday.

State police report the Gaswint car, headed east, struck the rear of one operated by Kip Dallen Morgan, Rt. 3, Box 1615, Roseburg, owned by Casey Morgan.

The Morgan car was knocked around in the road but suffered only minor fender damage. The other car, however, was flipped over and came to rest across the road. It was considered a total loss.

## Firemen Douse Blaze

The Roseburg City Fire Department quickly extinguished a small fire at the home of Frank Dittus, 2757 W. Langenberg Ave., Sunday.

Cause of the fire was listed as an electrical short in the wires going into the house. No damage was reported.

At 3:17 p.m. Sunday the firemen answered a call at Fir Grove School. The call was a false alarm set off by youngsters who were taken to the fire station and reprimanded.

## Sen. Morse Blasts Nixon, Rockefeller

SALEM (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., Saturday night criticized both former Vice President Richard Nixon and New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller in a speech to Democrats here.

He called Nixon a "warmonger" and said Nixon took "a shocking position" Saturday when he said the U.S. should "openly support the forces of freedom in its policy toward Cuba."

Morse said President Kennedy has at all times fought Communism in Cuba "within the framework of international law."

He accused Rockefeller of a "shabby performance" in egging on French President Charles de Gaulle in hopes of embarrassing President Kennedy. He cited a Rockefeller speech made earlier last week that he said was full of "evasion."

## House Here Burglarized While Family Is Away

Roy Hill, of 755 NE Nash St., returned home Sunday to find his house had been burglarized and some kitchen items stolen.

Entry was gained by a culprit breaking a basement window, then going up through the stairway to the main floor. After a hole had been cut through the door, it had then been forced and the door broken.

An electric frypan and toaster were taken and a check is being made for possible other missing items, according to Roseburg city police.

Other minor burglaries and larcenies are being investigated by city police.

## Temperature Stays Low

The five-day weather forecast, according to the Weather Bureau station at the Roseburg Airport, calls for temperatures averaging near or a little below normal with highs of 53 to 63 and lows of 40 to 45. Rainfall will be less than normal, occurring mostly after Wednesday.

## New Tracks Revive Search For Idaho Youth

MARSING, Idaho (UPI) — Discovery of fresh boot tracks at a summer cattle camp in the mountains 20 miles south of Homedale brought renewed hope today of finding alive an Idaho youth missing for a week.

The tracks, believed to be those of missing Delford Sharp, 19, Gayway Junction, were discovered late Sunday by rancher Frank Mayer in the Owyhee Mountains. The camp is about 20 miles straight south of Homedale and about 11 miles west of Highway 85.

Sheriff Al Barberis, who had called off the week-long search for the missing youth, ordered his resumption early today. He obtained a public address system and planned to go into the mountains in hopes of reaching the boy by voice and talking him back to safety.

The young man and his parents went into the Silver City area a week ago Sunday and were snowbound. Young Sharp left his parents last Monday morning in hopes of reaching help and rescuing them. However, the Sharps learned by car radio that the search for the entire family still was on the next day so the older Sharp made his way out and got help to rescue his wife last Wednesday. Then the search for the missing boy was begun.

## Western Governors Draw Warning On 'Crazy Quilt' Traffic Laws

PHOENIX (UPI)—Western governors were warned today they must act to straighten out a "crazy quilt" of traffic laws or face federal "invasions" into the field.

The warning came from Robert Montgomery Jr., Washington, D.C., executive director for the National Committee on Uniform

Traffic Laws and Ordinances before the opening session of the three-day 1963 Western Governors Conference.

Governors, individually and collectively, must assert more affirmative leadership in traffic safety efforts, particularly in the field of uniform traffic laws, Montgomery told the 11 state executives.

Gov. Grant Sawyer of Nevada, another opening day speaker, called for federal legislation to open federal land readily to take care of expanding urban and suburban areas and for private industrial and agricultural developments.

**Politics Are Discussed**

For the past two days, as the governors arrived at the conference site at nearby Scottsdale, they talked politics—particularly about the possible 1964 Republican presidential nominee.

Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield, a youthful Republican often mentioned as a vice presidential candidate, met newsmen Sunday to say that New York Gov. Nelson

Rockefeller would probably be the nominee—if the election were held now.

However, he said Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona was the "No. 1 preference" of party leaders. He refused to dismiss the chances of Michigan Gov. George Romney and Pennsylvania Gov. William Scranton.

He called his chances of being a vice presidential nominee "moot" but did not remove himself from contention. "I would give consideration to any invitation given by anyone to serve," he said.

Alaska Gov. William A. Egan, a Democrat put himself on record complaining about defense of Alaska from the possibility of nuclear war.

### Wants Planes Shot Down

He called upon the United States to shoot down Soviet planes that fly over the nation's territory or over U.S. aircraft carriers anywhere in the world.

Conceding that shooting down Soviet planes over aircraft carriers could be considered an act of war, Egan defended the action by saying the fly-over "would be an unfriendly act."

"I can't see how we can avoid taking drastic action," he said.
