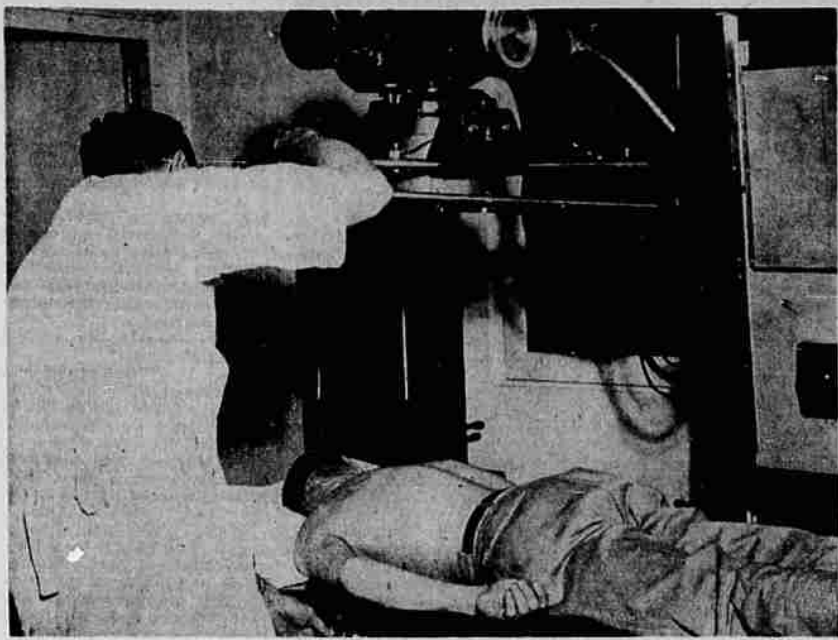

X-Ray Service Provides Important Function In VA Hospital Program

(This is another in a series of articles describing the significant work under way at the U.S. Veterans Administration Hospital in the treatment and rehabilitation of neuro-psychiatric patients.)

The X-ray department of the VA Hospital X-Ray Service doesn't take much space—in terms of cubic feet—but it is a highly productive unit in terms of output and service to hospitalized veterans.

The X-ray Service provides an important diagnostic function in the hospital program, revealing information vital to the treatment of the neuro-psychiatric patient.

Three years ago a "Picker" 300 milliamperage and 125 kilovoltage combination radiographic and fluoroscopic stationary unit was installed. This is an all-purpose unit capable of taking X-rays at 1/120 of a second.

Versatile Machine
All X-ray examinations—both radiographic and fluoroscopic—are performed on this one machine, explained Ralph L. Frisbie, chief X-ray technician.

The department recently acquired a "standard" 100 milliamperage and 100 kilovolt mobile unit that can be used for bedside X-rays and

X-rays in surgery. In emergencies it can also be used as replacement for the stationary unit for radiography.

All special X-ray examinations at the hospital are conducted under the direction of Dr. J. A. Colbrunn, radiologist and member of the American College of Radiology, who visits the hospital once a week. Dr. Colbrunn performs the fluoroscopy and interprets X-ray films.

In addition to the shooting and processing of all types of diagnostic X-rays, the X-ray department

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Liz Is Prepared For Bad Comment

NEW YORK (UPI)—Movie star Elizabeth Taylor apparently was prepared for unfavorable comment about her romance with actor Richard Burton.

"If part of the world, unfortunately, has some kind of nasty opinion, maybe it's only to be expected," Miss Taylor said, in a Look magazine interview published Monday.

"I would be idiotic if I didn't expect it, but what I am is my own business and the business of the people close to me."

The interview was conducted in London, where Miss Taylor, who has separated from her husband, Eddie Fisher, and Burton, whose wife Sybil, recently filed for separation, are working on the film, "International Hotel."

They have adjoining suites in a London hotel.

Of their romance, Burton said: "Elizabeth and I would not have been ready for all this 10 years ago. We met then and carefully avoided each other. Now, we find we share the same sense of comedy and the ridiculous. That's why we love each other."

Miss Taylor said her male secretary keeps most "scorching" newspaper clippings away from her because "He loves me too much to let them hurt me."

Commenting on her critics, she said, "I suppose they rather regard me as a scarlet woman. I guess I seem so scarlet that I'm almost purple. Why get a heart attack over them?"

"I'm a human being," she said, "and I do make mistakes like all human beings. I can't be that hypocritical to protect my public. It's very hard to admit you've done wrong. If your mistakes hurt other people, in the long run, you will have to pay for them."

"You try not to hurt other people, but, if you do, you'll wind up paying."

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Straw Vote Reveals Senate Is Divided On Revenue Measure

SALEM (UPI)—The Senate Tax Committee appeared divided today in an informal straw vote on a proposed "one shot" revenue bill which would increase state income by \$12 million next biennium.

At the same time the committee skirted a straw vote on the cigarette tax and income tax measures approved Friday by the

House. Members indicated they would rather not take a pulse reading until they had the bills in the committee.

Opposition to the "one shot" revenue plan—which would require employers to turn over withholding taxes monthly instead of quarterly—appeared to be based on the advisability of keeping something back for emergency.

Sen. Donald Husband, R-Eugene, said "this is the last money we've got in the bank. Let's save it for an emergency."

Elfstrom Agrees
Sen. Robert Elfstrom, R-Salem, agreed with Husband's view, and added, "If the people refer the tax program, we'd be better off if we held this back."

Sen. Walter Pearson, D-Portland, opposed the plan on another basis. "As far as I am concerned this is still employers' money. The employer has to do all the bookkeeping."

Sen. Glenn Stadler, D-Eugene, said he employed about 30 people and he felt it would be more convenient to turn over the money each month.

Sen. Vernon Cook, D-Gresham, said if the "one shot" measure was not approved, it would be necessary to increase the income tax rate.

Committee Chairman Sen. Boyd Overhulse, D-Madras, suggested "let's hold this back for a while and see what happens."

The cigarette, income and bank tax measures approved Friday by the House will be turned over to the Senate Tax Committee for review later this week.

Other Highlights
Three-Way—A workmen's compensation bill has been made a special order of business in the Senate Wednesday. The Senate defeated a move to send the so-called "three-way" bill back to committee.

Cats—A cat control bill was arrested in final stages Monday when the Senate called it back. The House had agreed to Senate amendments, forwarding it to the fish-and-deck.

Fish—A package of Senate bills revamping commercial fishing licenses and increasing fees cleared the House.

Three Tracts Of Blowdown Timber Sold

The Umpqua National Forest supervisor's office Monday sold three more tracts of blowdown timber resulting from the Columbus Day windstorm.

All went to Lane County operators.

The Filing Shed Freida Salvage Sale tract on 456 acres 28 miles east of Cottage Grove was sold to Porter Bros. Logging Co. of Cottage Grove. The 3,300,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$25.05 sold for \$25.25 and the 700,000 feet of hemlock and other species sold at the appraised \$13.35. Total bid on the tract appraised at \$92,610 was \$92,670. The only other bidder was Bohemia Lumber Co. Inc. of Culp Creek.

In the Sawtooth Freida Salvage Sale 28 miles east of Cottage Grove, 1,400,000 feet were involved. Douglas fir totaling 1,200,000 board feet was appraised at \$22.55 and hemlock and other species was appraised at \$13.30. Total appraisal was \$29,720.

High bidder was C. and H. R. Higginbotham Logging Co. of Cottage Grove, which bid \$22.65 for Douglas fir and \$13.35 for hemlock and other species for a total of \$29,850. Other bidders were Allum Bros. of Eugene and Bohemia Lumber Co.

A. and A. Logging Co. of Culp Creek won the third tract of 900,000 board feet on 574 acres 26 miles east of Cottage Grove. It bid the appraised \$24.50 for 700,000 feet of Douglas fir and \$14.45 for 200,000 feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$14.40. Total bid was \$20,040. The appraisal was \$19,990. Bohemia Lumber Co. was the only other bidder.

Next sale is scheduled Friday at the supervisor's office in Roseburg.

The Curry County sheriff's office said there was a slide on the road and that his car probably was carried into the river. The vehicle has not been found.

School Forestry Tours scheduled for this week will consume two days this spring. To meet the needs of an expanding program, a new area in Canyonville, serving Southern Douglas County, will be opened up for the first time this week.

Wednesday some 300 sixth graders from Canyonville, Days Creek, Tillier, Glendale, Riddle, Myrtle Creek and Tri-City will converge on the new area. The latter is located on the property of the South Umpqua Rod and Gun Club, 2 1/2 miles west of Canyonville. The tour will begin at 10 a.m. and is scheduled to last until 2:30.

The six stations listed below will be manned as follows: fire control—Bruce Ferguson, Douglas Forest Protective Association, and Knox Pipkin, state Forestry Department; forest products—Ray Currier, Oregon State University, Forest Products Laboratory; and Dick Hanlin, Evans Products Co.; wildlife—Bill McCaleb, Bill Hall and Doug Taylor, state Game Commission.

Tree identification and reforestation—Mahlon Hale and Robert Bryant, USFS; and Dick Harms and Charles Thomas, BLM; pruning and thinning and 4-H—John M. Davis and Glen Puetz, USFS; Jim Richardson and John Boyler, BLM; and Frank von Borstel, Extension Service; forest soils—Bob Raschke, Jack Pinkard and Charles Buzzard, Soil Conservation Service.

Thursday 150 sixth graders from Glide and Sutherland will attend the morning session of the tour to be held on the Bert Mellus Tree Farm, between Tenmile and Reston. In the afternoon, 50 Roseburg High vocational agriculture students will attend a special, advanced tour on the same site.
