

Episcopal Bishop Of Taiwan Due For Area Appearance

The Rt. Rev. Charles P. Gilson, Suffragan Bishop of Honolulu, will be in Roseburg this coming Monday to address members of St. George's Episcopal Church at a dinner meeting set for 6:30 p.m. at the Parish Hall. Reservations may be made by calling the parish office.

Earlier in the day, Bishop Gilson will speak at a noon meeting of the Southern Deanery of the church to be held at the Church of the Ascension in Riddle.

Bishop Gilson was elected at the

Cross and served with the Army there and in Japan. In 1946 he became treasurer of the Episcopal Church Mission in Shanghai, on the Chinese mainland. There, at the age of nearly fifty, he began studying for the ministry, at Central Theological School. He was ordained a deacon there in March, 1950. When the Communists took over Shanghai, he returned to the United States and in March, 1952, was ordained to the priesthood.

After six years in Rhode Island, first in parish work and later as Archdeacon of the Diocese, he and his wife returned to the East, to work again with the Chinese people on Taiwan.

Before his election, Bishop Gilson had been missionary-in-charge of Taiwan since 1958, and after his consecration he was assigned by the Bishop-in-Charge to continue his work there as bishop in residence.

The Bishop on Taiwan came to the Church after a long and successful career in business. After graduating from Dartmouth College in 1921 he went into banking and became a division head in the trust department of the Bank of America in New York City. He then entered the insurance field and was office manager and supervisor with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company in New York and Chicago until 1945.

Long active in lay church activities, Bishop Gilson left the business world in 1945 and went to the Philippines with the American Red

U. S. Army Troops Due In Thailand

WASHINGTON (UPI) — More than 3,000 U.S. Army troops organized into two battle groups will begin arriving in Thailand next month to participate in military maneuvers, the Defense Department announced Wednesday.

The two units are the 1st Battle Group, 5th Infantry of the 25th Division in Hawaii, and the 2nd Airborne Battle Group, 53rd Infantry, based in Okinawa. They will be accompanied by supporting aircraft and supply units.

The U.S. troop movement is part of an eight-nation exercise which the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization has called the largest of its type ever conducted by SEATO.

SEATO officials apparently hoped that the maneuvers would have a deterrent effect on Communists now stirring trouble in neutral Laos on Thailand's eastern border.

Wheat Notices Sent To Farmers

The 1964 wheat allotment notices have been mailed out to all wheat farm operators in Douglas County, reports Curtis Barker, chairman of the Douglas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

For most wheat farms, the chairman explained, the allotment represents the farm's share of the 1964 national wheat allotment of 49.5 million acres. For small farms (under 15 acres), however, the allotment represents the larger of (a) the farm's allotment based on the national allotment or (b) 90 percent of the farm's average 1959-61 wheat acreage (not over 15 acres).

Barker pointed out that all the wheat produced on a participating farm's wheat allotment acreage may be marketed free of penalty, if marketing quotas are made effective for the 1964 wheat crop. All wheat from a farm which had no wheat history in the three base years "1959-61," however, would be subject to a marketing quota penalty.

The question of whether or not to use marketing quotas for the 1964 wheat crop will be decided by wheat growers in the referendum May 21. Small farm operators will be eligible to cast ballots provided they register by May 13 their intention to participate in the 1964 program as an allotment grower. They may do this by signing in the space provided on the back of the regular allotment notice (MQ-24) and filing the notice at the ASOS office, Room 214, Court-house, before the deadline.

Under quotas, a small farm operator who does not elect to participate in the wheat program as an allotment grower would not be able to stay out of the program and plant wheat up to the larger of his 1964 allotment or his three-year base (but not more than 15 acres) without being subject to marketing quota penalties. Such a grower will not be eligible to vote in the referendum, however, and will not be eligible for price support or diversion payments.

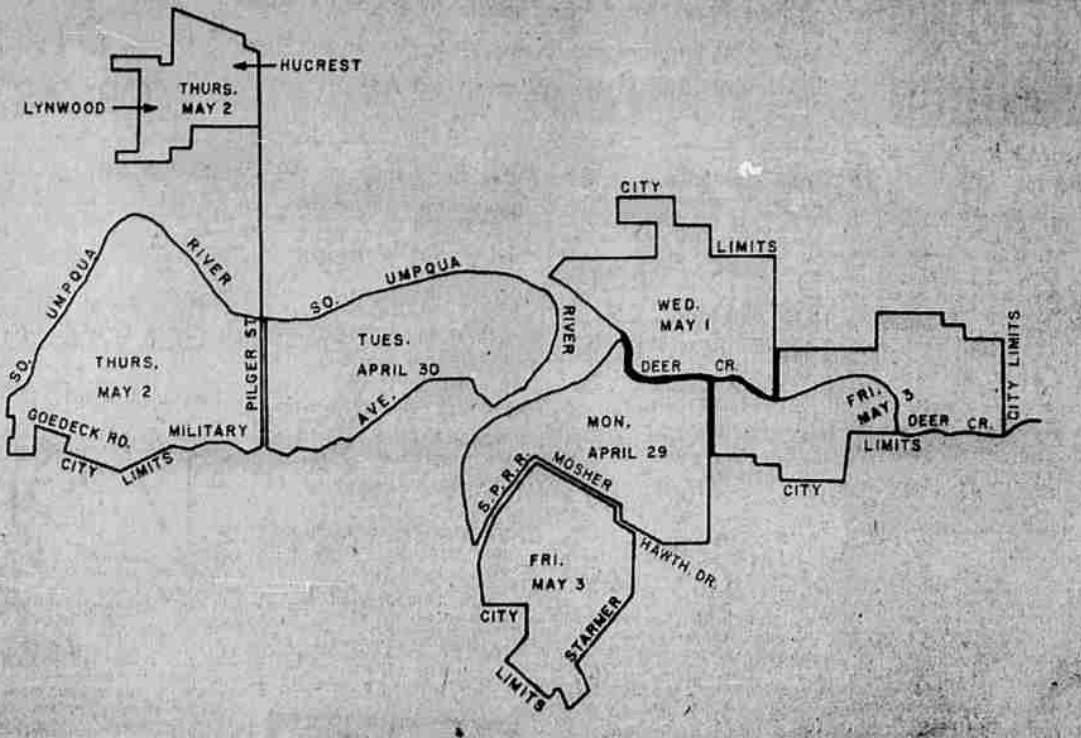
GLENDALE CLUB MEET

Solons Talk Year-Round College Plan

SALEM (UPI)—A step toward year-round college was given top priority here Wednesday as higher education presented its "B" budget for proposed improvements beyond the existing level.

Chancellor R. E. Lieueaen told the Ways and Means subcommittee on education that eight priority items totaling \$2.1 million have been picked from the proposed \$4.5 million supplemental budget.

He said the priorities are: 1—Expanded summer sessions, \$250,000. Rep. John Mosser, R-Beaverton, said he would like the sum increased because "we want to move just as rapidly as we can toward full summer use of buildings."

2—A masters in teaching program at Portland State College, \$362,074.

3—Fuller participation for teaching institutions in the Ford Foundations "Oregon program" to develop new teaching methods, \$322,820.

4—Extra appropriations of \$200,000 for PSC and \$50,000 for Southern Oregon College, where the per student amount is lower than the state average, to remove deficiencies.

5—Activation of closed circuit television at Portland State, \$78,300. Mosser objected it should pay for itself in reduced teacher time. Lieueaen replied he could not promise a saving "at this state of experimentation in television."

6—Research in new teaching and administration methods, including computer use, \$200,000.

7—Strengthened graduate programs, \$500,000.

City Cleanup Week Starts Monday

Thursday, May 2 — Far West Roseburg west of Stanton St. and Ilwaco area.

Friday, May 3 — Southeast section south of Mosher Street and east of Railroad tracks and East Roseburg east of Fowler and Fulton streets.

Property owners are requested to set out any and all material except garbage, as near the curb or street as possible the night before the day their area is to be picked
