

Senate Honors Rickreall Youth For Heroism In Saving Brother

SALEM, UPI — A 16-year-old boy stood before the Senate today to receive recognition for heroic action which saved the life of his 12-year-old brother.

Greg Jenkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Jenkins of Rickreall, was cited by a Senate concurrent resolution, and received the governor's 1963 farm safety award "in recognition of exceptional bravery and mature judgment."

Greg's parents watched the ceremonies from the Senate gallery. Greg was honored for action he

took on the family farm last fall when his young brother slipped while stepping across a silage feed conveyor.

The brother, Bruce, became entangled in the machinery, and both his legs were severed, one below the knee, the other above the knee.

Greg was working in the top of the silo when he heard his brother scream.

Acts Swiftly

In the horrible moments that followed, Greg acted without hesitation. He shut off the power to the feed conveyor auger, used a pocket knife to cut his brother free and ordered a farm hand to get blankets and call an ambulance.

Realizing it was difficult to give directions so the ambulance could reach the farm quickly, Greg arranged to meet the ambulance.

He used blankets to slow the bleeding, and held his brother in his arms while the farm hand drove to the meeting with the ambulance.

He continued on to the hospital, and signed papers necessary so doctors could perform surgery.

The quick thinking and mature judgment in the face of horror is credited with saving Bruce's life.

Sen. Walter Leth, R-Salem, said Greg demonstrated "bravery, quick thinking and resourcefulness that is a part of the American tradition."

Leth said Greg was active in

Demolay, 4-H, and FFA activities, and was a high school wrestling and football star who hopes to become a police officer.

Greg replied to the honors with a quietly spoken "thank you" as senators and guests in the gallery applauded.

Winston Man Pleads Guilty

Earl Chapin, 43, Winston, pleaded guilty to a Grand Jury indictment charging him with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, on arraignment before Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodrich Wednesday.

He was sentenced to serve four years in the Oregon State Penitentiary, less credit for the time he has served in the county jail, leaving three years, seven months and 20 days. He was admitted to probation, however, for the balance of his term, subject to the usual rules of the state Board of Parole and Probation.

The case involved small children in the Winston area.

Judith Angel, 22, Roseburg, pleaded innocent to a Grand Jury indictment of March 28 charging her with forgery, on arraignment before Judge Woodrich. Her case will be set for trial, and her bail was reduced from \$2,500 to \$500. She is charged with forging a signature to a payroll check of the R. A. Briggs & Son Logging Co., and was arrested in New Mexico and returned here.

Attorney George Weigum was appointed to represent her after two other attorneys had asked to be withdrawn as they sometimes represent the Briggs Co. in legal work.

Deputy Dist. Atty. Tom O'Dell prosecuted both this case and that of Chapin. Attorney Don Dole was the court-appointed attorney for Chapin.

Electric Bell Pease Jr. (Herriges), 26, Winston, waived preliminary hearing when arraigned on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses before District Court Judge Gerald R. Hayes. She was arrested by Roseburg City Police and charged with passing a worthless \$8 check at Al's Chevron Station on April 14, made on the Douglas County State Bank. She was bound over to the grand jury.

Robert Ray Childers, 19, Cove, Ore., has been arrested by a sheriff's deputy and lodged in the county jail to face a forgery charge. Bail was set at \$5000.

Joseph Anthony Lewis, 31, Riddle, was arrested by a deputy and is being held on a Coos County warrant charging non support.

Elsa (Faye) Allen, 64, of Myrtle Creek, died Wednesday morning at a Canyonville hospital after a lengthy illness.

She was born Jan. 18, 1889, in Lookingglass and had lived in the county her entire life, coming to the Myrtle Creek area 59 years ago. She was a member of the Myrtle Creek Methodist Church and the Order of Eastern Star, Valentine Chapter 98, of Myrtle Creek.

Survivors include her husband, Ray, of Myrtle Creek; a son, Ray Jr., of Redwood City, Calif.; three grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Pete (Pearl) Ulam, of Myrtle Creek, Mrs. Burrell Graves, of St. Helens, and Mrs. William Toll, of Salem; two brothers, A. L. Matthews and F. L. Matthews, both of Myrtle Creek.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Ganz Mortuary in Myrtle Creek Friday at 2 p.m. with the Rev. Noel Mills officiating. Ritualistic services will be conducted by the Eastern Star Chapter.

Vault interment will follow at the 'OOF' Cemetery in Myrtle Creek.

City police and the Roseburg Fire Department were called to the Art Isaacson residence at 1403 SE Main St., where three small children were reported to have started a fire Wednesday afternoon, first in the house, then on the front porch.

The children, two of them six years old and the other 8, admitted starting the fire with newspapers on the coffee table. It scorched the table and a place on the floor, so they threw the papers out the front door onto the front porch.

A neighbor, Walter Holbrook, saw something was wrong, after a passerby had called the fire department and police. Holbrook had the fire out when the department arrived, but a thorough check was made to make sure there was nothing smoldering.

Good Lead Revealed In Hunt For Slayer Of Racial Marcher

GADSDEN, Ala. (UPI)—Police said today they had turned up "a good lead" in connection with the slaying of a crusading busman, whose body was found alongside an Alabama roadside Tuesday night.

Deputy Sheriff Tony Reynolds would not discuss the lead, but left no doubt that police were hot on the trail of one or more suspects.

Earlier, authorities said they were examining a set of tire tracks and two 22-caliber bullets in connection with the slaying of William L. Moore, 35, killed while conducting a one-man integration march through Alabama.

"We got every man we have working on it," said Sheriff Dewey Colvard.

He said the only clues available were the two bullets which killed Moore and a set of tire tracks leading into the roadside park where Moore's body was found 13 miles from here.

Authorities disclosed Wednesday that Moore had been warned three times during his march that he would be killed for his beliefs.

President Kennedy and Gov. George C. Wallace both expressed outrage over the slaying.

Kennedy called it "an outrageous crime" at his nationally televised news conference. The governor, announcing he had ordered every investigative agency in the state to work on the killing, said it was a "dastardly act."

Alabama officials made public a diary Moore kept during his antisegregation walk from Chattanooga, Tenn., toward Jackson, Miss., where he intended to present a letter of protest to Gov. Ross Barnett.

In it, Moore noted the warnings. The last entry, "only kids adopt dogs," noted the fact Moore had presented some children with a stray dog he had picked up on

his march. He gave them the dog at a general store located only a mile from the place his body was found.

He had been shot once in the forehead and once in the neck with 22-caliber bullets.

An investigator for the Alabama Department of Public Safety, Roy McDowell, disclosed he had stopped Moore shortly after he left the general store and refused his protection. He said Moore refused.

Education Honor Due Lay Citizen

A prominent Douglas County citizen, whose name is as yet unrevealed, will be honored Friday night by the Douglas County Chapter of the Oregon Education Association.

The citation will be given at the annual Lay Citizens Banquet of the association to be held at 6:30 p.m. in the cafeteria of Myrtle Creek High School. The unannounced selection has been made on the basis of extensive contributions to the field of education during the past year, according to Ralph Snyder, president of Douglas County OEA.

The principal speaker of the evening will be Dr. James Millar of Portland who is well known to Douglas County residents. Dr. Millar is well known in education circles and is a lifetime member of the National Education Association. For many years, he served as a minister in the Presbyterian Church throughout the Northwest, and for several years was pastor of the Roseburg church.

Other awards to be presented during the evening include retirement pins for those teachers who are retiring from the field of active teaching.

Ella Hilkemeier, president of the Drain Education Association, will be honored in receiving the charter for this newly formed education group as a member of the Oregon Education Association.

Other awards to be conferred include those to Mrs. Margaret McGee, Riddle, a former trustee; to the Board of Control of the Oregon Education Association; and to Ray Talbert, Winston, for his work on the retirement committee of the Oregon Education Association.

Third Collection Booth Set By Goodwill Group

A third booth for collection of clothing and household articles for Goodwill Industries of Oregon has been placed in Roseburg.

The new booth is located at Drive N Save Market. The other booth sites are Marks Inc. and the First Methodist Church, where the first Goodwill booth was placed in 1960.

The material collected from the three booths will make it possible for Goodwill to give jobs to Oregon's handicapped. The rehabilitation agency depends on householders' contributions of clothing and miscellaneous items in order to meet the needs for training and employment of handicapped people. The donated articles are repaired, renovated and resold to pay the wages of Goodwill workers.

18 White Pickets Arrested After Tussle Breaks Out At RFK Talks With Wallace

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)—Police today arrested 18 white pickets in a tussle that broke out when Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy visited with segregationist Gov. George C. Wallace.

Two pickets who resisted arrest were bodily tossed into a paddy wagon. Another placard-waving picket landed head-over-heels in the wagon and a retired Navy admiral stood nearby reading aloud from the First Amendment of the Bill of Rights.

Kennedy and Wallace held a closed-door session that lasted 1 hour and 22 minutes. In an impromptu news conference later, Wallace said, "We had a courteous and frank discussion of the problems facing the states and federal government. My position is the same as it was in the governor's campaign; the same as it was when I was elected governor and the same as it was when I was inaugurated."

"I also feel that his (Kennedy's) position is the same," Wallace said.

Assistant Police Chief D. H. Lacey said the 18 pickets were arrested on charges of parading without a warrant. The pickets began parading near the Capitol about an hour and a half before the Kennedy-Wallace meeting.

In the forefront was Adm. John Crommelin (ret.), a National

States Rights party figure, who refused to move when Lacey over a loudspeaker ordered the demonstrators to disperse.

Police almost arrested Crommelin but when they told him he would be taken into custody if he did not stop reading aloud, the admiral stopped and was not arrested.

Signs carried by the pickets read "Mississippi murderer," "Wash. D.C., a disgrace to the white people" and "No Kennedy Congo here."

Kennedy is making visits to three southern states to meet U.S. attorneys and their assistants.

The attorney general immediately left the Capitol after the meeting without comment. He visited shortly with Grover Hall, editor of the Montgomery Advertiser, and then left by air for Columbia, S.C., where he has a speaking engagement tonight.

Douglas Singers To Join Festival

Singers from Douglas High School will join voices with more than 1,300 student singers from 13 other high schools and Oregon State University in a giant choral festival Saturday night in the OSU coliseum.

Conducting the festival, which starts at 8 p.m., will be noted choral conductor Jerrold Hairston. Hairston was at OSU two years ago for a similar festival with 970 singers.

The program will feature spirituals composed, arranged and conducted by Hairston and will be climaxed by the massed performance of all choirs in six songs.

The Corvallis public schools are cooperating with the OSU Music Department in sponsoring the festival, according to Robert B. Walls, university music director.

In 1961, Hairston went to Europe for the State Department to teach American folk songs to choral groups in Germany, Austria, Norway and Switzerland. This summer, he will return to Europe to teach and lecture in Yugoslavia, Finland, Sweden, Germany and Norway.
