

Legislate For Other Packages, Senator, But Leave Cosmetics Containers Alone

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Legislation today to a Senate anti-trust subcommittee. "To specify a standard container, to stultify the label with unnecessary conformance to utilitarian uniformity would destroy the glamor, precipitate the whim and dissipate the dream."

The subcommittee, headed by Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., also heard opposition to the proposed measure voiced by Gilbert H. Weil, of the Association of National Advertisers.

Weil said Hart's bill to ban deceptive packaging and labeling would "establish a veritable commissariat of packaging." Present laws will do the job, he contended.

Gilbert Miles, of Colgate-Palmolive Company, representing the toilet goods association, shared that view in his prepared statement.

TILLAMOOK (UPI) — Two Coast Guardsmen will be honored for heroism here Friday for the rescue of four men whose fishing boat capsized while trying to cross the Tillamook Bay bar last August.

Chief Boatswain Mate Floyd Sheldon, commander of the Tillamook Bay Coast Guard Station at Garibaldi, will receive the Coast Guard Commendation Medal.

Engineer 1/c Donald McMillan will receive a letter of commendation.

They rode a 40-foot utility boat to the rescue when the 34-foot fishing boat Pisco II capsized with five men aboard while trying to cross the bar.

The two men plucked from the surf Dr. Ken Bourquin, Hillsboro; Dr. William Ewbanks, Portland; Dr. Vernon Hall, Estacada; Dr. Charles Rasmussen, Hillsboro; and 16-year-old Brad Davis, Green Bay, Wis. Dr. Bourquin died, but the others survived.

The small utility boat was forced to remain outside the bar for more than two hours until seas moderated enough to let it return.

Living Costs Set New High In April

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The increase in the index means about 40,000 workers, including 30,000 in the aerospace industry, will receive wage increases of one cent an hour. In addition about 25,000 other workers will receive varying increases.

Chase said there probably would be no change in living costs this month despite selective steel price increases. But there might be some impact later.

He said items directly affected by steel prices account for only 16.5 per cent of the total consumer price index and "I would expect the effect of the steel increases to be very small."

The over-all result was a rise in the March index to 106.2 per cent of the 1957-59 base period. This meant it took \$10.62 to buy the same goods and services that could have been purchased for \$10 during the base period.

The average weekly earnings of workers rose more than 50 cents during March, however, taking some of the sting out of the increased cost of living.
