

Talented Elkton Spikers Exhibit Power In Win Over Lakers, Lowell

Winning nine of 14 events, the Elkton Elks completely overpowered the Triangle Lake Lakers and the Lowell Red Raiders in a three-way track meet.

The Elks tallied an even 100 points, with the host Lakers coming in second with 45 points. The undermanned Lowell team wound up with six points.

Elkton boasted only two double winners—John Levenhagen and Gary Brooks. Levenhagen captured the top spots in both the low and high hurdles, winning the shortened 120-yard lows in a blazing 15.3.

Brooks cleared the pole vault bar at 9-6 and the high jump bar at 5-0 for his two wins.

Duane Schultz heaved the shot 44-3 for another triumph, while Lester Jones won the discus with a toss of 123-8. Other winners for Elkton were: Timm Picknell, mile; Ray Spencer, 220; and the relay team of Chuck Swinehart, Levenhagen, Taylor and Spencer.

The sharp pitching of Seattle's Billy Spanswick had the Rainiers solidly in first place in the Pacific Coast League's Northern Division today.

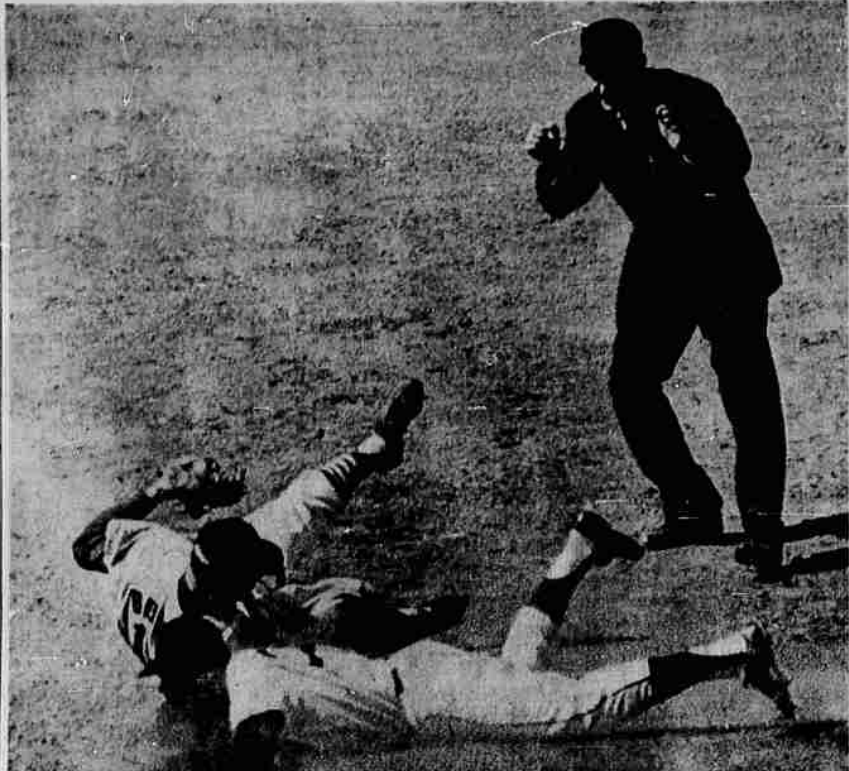
Spanswick, who never got past the first inning in his opening appearance, fanned 15 Denver Bears Wednesday night while tossing a four-hitter. Seattle dumped Denver 4-2 as the Rainiers moved to the head of the Northern loop with six wins in nine tries.

The weatherman knocked out the Tacoma-Oakland City and Spokane-Dallas-Ft. Worth affairs, but two other games were played. Hawaii blanked San Diego 4-0 as Charlie Dees accounted for all four Islander runs and Portland outlasted Salt Lake 5-4 to move into second place in the Northern loop.

Sanwick outpitched Denver's Wade Blasingame, a \$125,000 bonus lefty for the Bears, although reliever Archie White took the loss.

At Honolulu, Dees, Texas League batting champion last season, scored the first Hawaii run after singling in the fourth. He drove in two more in the fifth with a long triple to left and then sprinted home on an infield error.

Portland edged Salt Lake on the basis of homers by Bill Kern and Ken Harrelson and the tight relief pitching of Rudy Hernandez. Lew Krausse got the win.

Dodgers Topple Reds, 7-0; Balk Calls Argued By Owens

A widely-used four-letter word touched off the biggest ruckus of the baseball season so far.

The word was "balk" and it not only caused Cincinnati pitcher Jim Owens to blow his top but also produced probably the most violent demonstration ever at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles.

Owens hit the ceiling when three balks were called on him during the second inning of Wednesday night's game in which the Dodgers blanked the Reds 7-0.

The Cincinnati right-hander was so incensed and argued so violently that he was ejected from the game, but that was merely a prelude of what was to come.

As the umpiring team headed by Augie Donatelli summoned another pitcher from the bullpen, the angry Reds threw helmets and towels on the field until Donatelli emptied the Cincinnati bench. He told manager Fred Hutchinson he could bring in Cincinnati players from the clubhouse as needed.

Reliever John Tsitouris, taking his good sweet time, warmed up.

In less violent NL games, the Milwaukee Braves beat the Houston Colts, 4-3, the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 6-4, the St. Louis Cardinals took over first place with a 4-3 win over the San Francisco Giants, and the New York Mets blanked the Chicago Cubs 2-0.

Kansas City's surprising A's climbed into first place in the American League with a 5-0 victory over Baltimore, the Detroit Tigers downed the Los Angeles Angels 4-3 in 15 innings, Cleveland shut out Boston 2-0, Minnesota defeated Washington 6-4, and Chicago hung one on New York 6-4 in 12 innings.

Warren Spahn won his third game of the season and 330th of his major league career with a seven-hitter over the Colts, who suffered their fifth straight setback. Eddie Mathews and Mack Jones hit homers off loser Dick Farrell.

Roseburg Teams Ready For Full Slate Of Action

Roseburg's Indians will attempt to get back in the winning groove today when they host the Reedsport Braves in a non-league baseball outing at 3:30.

The Tribe, hurt by lack of practice time outdoors because of the weather, boast a 2-2 record. The victories came in practice games against Riddle and Myrtle Creek, with the losses coming at the hands of Grants Pass and Medford.

Following today's game, the Red-

skins will attempt to avenge the loss to Medford when the Black Tornado squad comes to town Friday. Saturday the Indians will try once again to open Sub-District 5-A-1 play. The local crew is set to invade Marshfield for a pair of games Saturday in league play.

Friday's game is scheduled for 3 p.m., with Saturday's league doubleheader scheduled to start at 1:30 p.m.

Two previous attempts to kick-off league play have been postponed by the rain. In the southern portion of District 5-A-1 the Indians will play against the Pirates of Marshfield and North Bend's Bulldogs. The winner will meet the winner from the Eugene area in a three-game playoff to decide the District 5-A-1 champion.

Roseburg's undefeated tennis team, rained out again Wednesday, is set for three weekend meets. The Indians will host the Marshfield Pirates Friday at 3:30, then head south for a tough road test Saturday.

Saturday's matches finds the Tribe matching skill with the Grants Pass Cavemen at 10 a.m., then the local power will take on the Medford Black Tornado netters at 2:30.

Medford is ranked as one of the top tennis teams in the state with

a strong squad of veterans. Going into the weekend the Indians, defending state champs, are undefeated. However, rain has been a damaging factor as the local team has not been able to get many matches in to date, and the District 5-A-1 tournament is scheduled for May 4.

Track Meet Set
In track action Saturday the Indian thinclads are set to test the strength of the Medford Black Tornado spikers. The dual meet is scheduled for 1:30 at Medford.

Roseburg has displayed an ever improving attack, with times and distances improving each week. Top stars include Al Jolson in the high jump, Bob Burgess and Barry Grant in the sprints, Mike Crumican in the mile and 880, Ron Leep and Bruce O'Neill in the hurdles, and Doug DuFresne, Jesse Hart and Dodge in the weights.

After placing third in the Roseburg Invitational, the Indians took second in the Spike Leslie Relays, triumphed over Springfield and Thurston in a triangular meet and were nipped by the Crater Comets last week.

Completing the list of weekend outings for the Indian teams is a dual golf match between the local linksters and the strong North Eugene Highlanders. The match is set for Friday at 1 p.m. on the Shadow Hills course in Eugene.

Roseburg edged the Highlanders by one stroke in the last meeting of the two teams, and will be out to repeat. The Tribe golfers have won three and lost two outings.

Arnie Seeks Fourth Texas Open Victory

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI) — Arnold Palmer, with "Arnie's Army" in pursuit, took off down "Arnie's Alley" today in search of an unprecedented fourth successive Texas Open golf tournament title.

Which means, actually, that the throng of Palmer's admirers who always gallery the husky Pennsylvanian in hopes of seeing one of his patented title surges was out early to see Arnie play his first round over the Oak Hills Country Club course he plays so well.

Palmer staged one of those rousing finishes over this same 6,616-yard, par 35-36-71 Oak Hills layout on the final round last year to win his third in a row with a birdie three on the final hole for a 273 that squeezed him home one stroke in front of Mason Rudolph, Doug Sanders and Joe Campbell.

He had won the title over the same course the year before with an even better 270 and had started his fabulous streak in 1960 when the tournament was played at the Fort Sam Houston military reservation course.

Palmer's chances of repeating are enhanced by the absence from the field here of the other two members of the "big three" — Jack Nicklaus, who took the week off to visit his wife and new-born son in Ohio, and Gary Player, who decided to spend a week with his family in the Bahamas.

Koufax Injured; Out For 10 Days

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Sandy Koufax's left shoulder rather than his index finger added today to the woes of the Los Angeles Dodgers, and the brilliant left-hander conceded he was "a little disappointed" about being sidelined for at least 10 days.

An examination Wednesday determined that Koufax, whose loss in mid-1962 probably cost Los Angeles the pennant, suffered a shoulder injury in the seventh inning of Tuesday's game with Milwaukee. Dr. Robert Kerlan said Koufax sustained an injury to the posterior capsule of the left shoulder joint.

Rain Strikes Again

Rain once again took its toll on the local sports scene, with two make-up baseball games and a tennis match postponed Wednesday.

In tennis the Roseburg Indians were to have hosted the University of Oregon Frosh, but the rain forced postponement until April 30. Baseball action rained out Wednesday game at Yoncalla between Canyonville and the Eagles and an Umpqua Valley League make-up doubleheader between the Riddle Irish and the Douglas Trojans at Douglas.

Yanks Run Wild In Pan-American Games

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI) — The United States team was expected to take a major portion of the honors today at the Pan American Games, where athletes will vie for a total of 21 gold medals.

Uncle Sam's athletes have collected 16 gold medals to date, including five Wednesday in diving, weightlifting and rifle shooting.

This aggregate is expected to mount today with nine finals in wrestling, three in swimming, two each in weightlifting, rapid fire shooting, tennis and fencing and one in dressage equestrian. The Yanks are involved in all the events with the exception of the Women's singles tennis finals.

Darlene Hard of Los Angeles and Carole Caldwell of Santa Monica, Calif., missed their opportunities to land in the women's tennis finals Wednesday, for

one of the few U.S. disappointments. Miss Hard was beaten by Yola Ramirez of Mexico, 2-6, 6-3, 6-4, and Miss Caldwell lost to top-seeded Maria Bueno of Brazil, 6-4, 6-1.

But on the brighter side, diving star Barbara McAlister, a 21-year-old secretary from Phoenix, Ariz., won the 12th gold medal for the United States with a come-from-behind victory. She took the lead in her second optional dive and went on to defeat Judy Stewart of Canada. Patsy Willard of Mesa, Ariz., wound up with the bronze medal in the event.

Joseph Puleo of York, Pa., in the middleweight class and Tommy Kono, a heavyweight lifter from Honolulu, then chalked up victories in weightlifting to add two more gold medals to the growing U.S. total.

Puleo hoisted a total of 400 kilograms (880 pounds) in his three lifts and Kono totaled 435 kilos (959 pounds) in his three tries, including a new Pan American Games record in the snatch with 132.5 kilos (292 pounds).

Sgt. Gary Anderson of Axtell, Neb., finished first in the individual three position 50-meter carbine shooting with a total of 1,147 points. The second place finish of M.Sgt. William Krilling of Fort Benning, Ga., 1,121, then enabled the United States to capture the team title in the event with 4,529 points.
