

Sen. Flegel Plans Public Hearings On Two Basic School Support Bills

SALEM (UPI)—A major overhaul of the basic school support program including a plan to place the fund on a biennial appropriation basis — will be proposed at a Senate Education Committee hearing Tuesday.

Chairman Al Flegel, D-Roseburg, said he planned public hearings on two basic school bills, one by Sen. Walter Leth, R-Salem, and the other a Ways and Means Committee bill recommended by the Legislative Fiscal Committee.

The present basic school grant is \$120 per census child, but after the cost of special programs is deducted, about \$112 per child is available. This amount is then

We Must Fight For Industries McKay Claims

Roseburg and Douglas County, to get their share of new industry, are going to have to get out and fight just twice as hard as they have been, and "we have just begun to fight," Del McKay told the Roseburg Lions Club Thursday night.

McKay is co-chairman with Don Dole of the Roseburg (area) Chamber of Commerce Payroll Development Committee, which is studying what Douglas County has to offer and its possibilities of attracting new industry or further development of present industries.

He outlined the makeup of the committee, and listed its members under the headings of leg men, research, industrial and publicity subcommittees. He also discussed outside help from the state Department of Planning and Development and key men assigned by leading public utilities in furthering the program here.

The city and county have got to stop "dreaming" about some huge industry that will come in to solve all our industrial problems so that everyone will get rich.

They must take a realistic approach by starting small and thinking big. He said and must start scratching, rooting and working hard on payroll development on a small scale, by developing businesses, industries and ideas. He advised that any one having an idea should contact the committee here.

A year ago 18 cities had industrial parks. Today 33 cities do. He stated planners advised against raising a lot of money and buying up land for future industries, because there may be disappointments, but that every effort should be made to help and encourage potential industries whether the payroll is big or small.

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Wettest April Recorded; More Rainfall Expected

The wettest April since Weather Bureau records began in Roseburg in 1877 is noted by the Weather Bureau station at the Roseburg airport today.

With an 81-year record already broken, precipitation expected for the remainder of the month could well result in this April's total exceeding the records for the normally wettest months of December and January, weather officials state. Previous high for the month was in 1882 when 5.14 inches were recorded. So far precipitation this month totals 5.31.

Moderate precipitation is expected for the next five days. Temperatures below normal for the season are expected, but highs of 58 to 66 and lows of 38 to 46.

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College Building Program Gets Tentative Approval

SALEM (UPI)—Higher education buildings worth \$25 million were given tentative approval Thursday by the Ways and Means Education subcommittee.

The priority buildings in the instructional and utility category were chosen from a \$45 million list proposed by the State Board of Higher Education.

In addition, the subcommittee will act on buildings in the dormitory student center category. The committee is considering a list worth \$17.8 million, pared down from \$29 million requested by the board.

The committee stressed that its decisions were subject to change, depending in part on "how much money we have."

If the instructional building list gets final approval, some of the buildings would be financed with general funds or a general bond issue. Others — libraries and athletic buildings — would be financed under the self-liquidating program as dormitories are now. With bonds paid for out of earmarked student fees.

Of the general fund buildings, the committee gave top priority to the Oregon Technical Institute campus and to replacement of Campbell Hall at Oregon College of Education.

Soviet Fighters Circle Copters

BERLIN (UPI)—Two Soviet jet fighters circled two U.S. Army helicopters over Berlin today, apparently to underline Russia's contention that the helicopter flights were illegal.

An Army spokesman said the jets approached within 500 yards of the helicopters but took no aggressive action.

One of the helicopters was over East Berlin and the other was flying along the West Berlin side of the East-West city border, the spokesman said.

Western officials noted that the Russians never before had sent up aircraft when American helicopters were in the air although the Soviets maintain helicopter flights over East Berlin are illegal.

The helicopters over East Berlin also was circled several times, witnesses said.

The helicopters were flying at a height of about 250 yards. Both landed safely in West Berlin.

The Soviets long have denounced helicopter flights over East Berlin as illegal, and have even warned they might shoot them down.

However, the Western Allies assert they may fly anywhere in Berlin, East or West.

Assessor Posts Ratio For Tax

The Douglas County Board of Equalization, has adopted a ratio of 25 per cent for county property assessments, as posted by the county assessor.

The board consists of Ray Doerner, county commissioner, as chairman; Carl C. Hill, of Dixonville, former county judge, and Harold Woolley, Drain. They met this week to look over the ratio studies of the assessor and question him as to how the figures were arrived at.

The ratio is required by law and means the assessor must use a figure of 25 per cent of the actual estimated cash value of property in preparing tax rolls.

This figure is uniform throughout the state, except for Multnomah County, which uses 33 per cent. It has been in effect since adopted by the 1961 Legislature, but the county Board of Equalization must act upon it each year.

The board meets again May 13 to listen to taxpayer appeals and to equalize the assessment roll. Taxpayers must file protests of their assessments by May 1. However, before filing their complaints, persons are asked to consult with the assessor to make sure an error has not been made and attempt to make reasonable adjustments without the complaints coming before the board.

Clock Change Affects Nightclub Operators

Tavern owners will be able to complete a full day of operation, but nightclub operators will lose an hour with the shift from standard to daylight saving time Saturday night.

The state Liquor Control Commission has decreed that the time for licensed liquor establishments to change their clocks is 1 a.m. Sunday, according to Sgt. Calvin D. Willis, local OLCC representative.

Taverns, being required to close normally at 1 a.m., thusly will have their full day completed. Night clubs, which are permitted to remain open until 2:30 a.m., must, however, move their clocks ahead one hour at 1 a.m., to 2 a.m., thus losing the hour. They will gain it back next fall when clocks return to standard time.

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More Demand For Recreational Use Of Parks Seen By Planners

Predictions of increases in recreational demands on Douglas County's park and campground facilities, which will keep three separate agencies active to meet public use, were made at Thursday night's Douglas County Planning Commission meeting.

Park development heads from the Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Forest Service, and Douglas County Parks Department appeared at the meeting to outline their recreational developments of the past, current programs and long-range planning.

Norwood Robertshaw, recreation planner for the Umpqua National Forest, said the USFS expects to see an increase from 308,000 visitor days recorded on the forest's parks last season to 1,880,000 in 1976. This figure will again increase to 3,860,000 by the year 2000.

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He also announced that 40 to 60 more sites have been added to the Diamond Lake facilities. Some of the lakeshore sites have been removed, to allow more access to the lake by persons in other sites. The road in the campgrounds will be paved, to cut down on the amount of dust in the camping area.

Both Robertshaw and Bureau of Land Management District Supervisor Muri Storms agreed that most of their recreational work will be done on area near the Umpqua and North Umpqua Rivers. Demands for such facilities in the southern part of the county

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are much lighter than in the central area, they said.

The biggest BLM development will be the campsite on land formerly used by the Douglas County Lumber Co. mill on Rock Creek. When completed, this project will involve expenditure of some \$100,000, Storms said. Currently, the BLM plans to install 20 campsites, an undetermined number of picnic sites and pit-type toilet facilities. Later on, a kitchen-type structure will be built, as well as a softball field, flush toilets and bath facilities.

BLM work is being carried on both under funds provided through their regular recreational development funds and through funds obtained from the Accelerated Public Works Act.

Wilbur Weiprecht, head of the Douglas County Parks Department, said present thinking of county parks officials is that emphasis should be placed more on development of present sites than on acquisition of additional park lands.

One project the county may enter is the proposed parks construct-

tion at the Cooper Creek dam site. This would be carried out in cooperation with state agencies and the federal government. It is the first such project planned under a federal law passed last fall allowing federal agencies to participate in recreational developments adjacent to dams.

In the list of new park developments planned for this summer, he pointed out the development scheduled for a 4.88-acre site at the mouth of St. John's creek on the South Umpqua river.

He also said the Parks Department is developing a new brochure listing all county facilities. This will be made available to the public at the county courthouse and through chambers of commerce in all major cities in the county.
