GB Packers Trade Back, End To Giants For Draft Choice

NEW YORK (UPI) — The National Football League champion Green Bay Packers today sent defensive halfback John Symank and defensive end Bill Quinlan to the New York Giants in exchange for a high draft choice.

The Giants immediately shipped Quinlan, a six-year veteran, to the Philadelphia Eagles in exchange for Gene Gossage, also a defensive end.

Of the three players involved, only Quinlan appears in line for a regular job. The 28-year-old former Michigan State star was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in 1956 and after a year in the Army played regularly for the Browns for two seasons. He was

traded to the Packers in 1959 and was used frequently by Green Bay.

Symank was the backup man in the Green Bay secondary and more than likely will be used in the same capacity with the Giants. He has played six seasons in the NFL since being drafted out of the University of Florida by the Packers in 1957.

Gossage, the Eagles' 28th draft choice in 1958, joined Philadelphia for the 1960 season after being graduated from Northwestern and saw fairly regular duty. He was used as an offensive guard in 1960 and 1961 and then was switched to defensive end last season.

no coincidence that the Dodgers seem to be straightening away with three straight victories and five wins in their last six games.

Fairly drove in four runs with a homer, double and single Thursday night as the Dodgers downed the Cincinnati Reds 7-1 to give ex-New York Met right-hander R. L. Miller (1-12 in 1962) his second victory of the season.

The San Francisco Giants whipped the St. Louis Cardinals 8-4, the Houston Colts defeated the Milwaukee Braves 7-5 and the New York Mets beat the Chicago Cubs 3-2, in Thursday's other National League action.

In the American League, the Baltimore Orioles scored a 3-2, 10-inning win over the Kansas City Athletics, the Minnesota Twins shut out the Washington Senators 3-0 and the Los Angeles Angels topped the Detroit Tigers 7-5.

John Roseboro and Willie Davis joined Fairly in hitting homers to help hand 21-game winner Joey Jay of the Reds his fourth consecutive loss of 1963. Miller, the hard luck pitcher of the hard-luck Mets last season, went the distance with a five-hitter and lowered his earned run average to 1.14. His two victories equal his entire total for the 1961 and 1962 seasons.

Ed Bailey drove in three runs with a homer and a single and Orlando Cepeda knocked in a pair with a homer and a double to lead the Giants' 10-hit attack. Bob Bolin, who pitched 4 2-3 innings in relief of Billy O'Dell before retiring in the face of a ninth-inning Cardinal rally, received credit for his first victory. The win put the Giants in a tie with the Cardinals for first place in the NL.

Southeast Gambling Probe Turns Out Inconclusive

ATLANTA (UPI)—Georgia Attorney General Eugene Cook Thursday released a report on his efforts to determine if any big bets were placed on last year's Alabama-Georgia football game.

The report indicated that Cook's findings into the gambling angle of the Butts-Bryant controversy were not conclusive.

The attorney general is investigating charges made in a national magazine article that former University of Georgia athletic director Wallace Butts gave secret football information to Alabama coach Paul Bryant before last year's game, which Alabama won 35-0.

Cook investigated the report at the request of Gov. Carl Sanders and in an earlier statement concluded that Butts gave Bryant information that could have affected the outcome of the 1962 Georgia-Alabama game.

Both Butts and Bryant have de-

nied the charges and have filed multimillion dollar libel suits against the Saturday Evening Post which published the article entitled "The Story of a Football Fix — A Shocking Report of How Wally Butts and Bear Bryant Rigged a Game Last Fall."

The new Cook report quoted University of Georgia Comptroller J. D. Bolton as saying he first learned of the reported incident from Georgia coach Johnny Griffith. He said it happened in an Atlanta hotel room Jan. 24 during a Southeastern Conference meeting.

Griffith called him to his room, Bolton said, and told him that an Atlanta insurance salesman, George Burnett, had given him information about Butts telephoning Georgia team information to Bryant in Tuscaloosa, Ala.

Steve Barber Pitches Orioles To 3-2 Win Over Kansas City

If Steve Barber really can throw a strawberry through a locomotive why can't he pitch the Baltimore Orioles to the 1963 American League pennant?

Baltimore pitching coach Harry Brecheen insists the home-grown, 24-year old left-hander can do the former and a surprising number of AL experts think he might just also accomplish the latter.

In any event, the 6-foot, 190-pound left-hander, who was a weekend pitcher for the Orioles in 1962 when he was a private in the Army, is the hottest pitcher in baseball right now.

Barber became the major leagues' first four-game winner of

1963 Thursday night when he flame-threw a typical game — allowing seven hits and striking out seven — to give the Orioles a 3-2 10-inning triumph over the Kansas City Athletics. The victory vaulted the Orioles into sole possession of first place and strengthened their claim to consideration as a season-long flag contender.

Jack Kralick pitched a three-hitter to give the Minnesota Twins a 3-0 victory over the Washington Senators and the Los Angeles Angels hit four homers to down the Detroit Tigers 7-5 in Thursday's only other American League action.

In the National League, the San Francisco Giants beat the St. Louis Cardinals 8-4, the New York Mets edged the Chicago Cubs 3-2, the Houston Colts downed the Milwaukee Braves 7-5, and the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Cincinnati Reds, 7-1.

Gentile's Homer Wins

Barber, 9-6 last season, gained victory No. 4 of 1963 when Jim Gentile belted relief pitcher John Wyatt for a 10th-inning homer. Al Smith's two-run homer had provided the Orioles with their other two runs.

Kralick, who had lost his first three 1963 decisions allowed only one Senator base-runner to go as far as third and struck out five batters. Kralick tripled and scored the Twins' first run on a single by Lennie Green in the third inning. Rich Rollins homered for the Twins.

Leon Wagner hit two homers and Ken Hunt and Bob Rodgers one each to lead a 10-hit Los Angeles attack that brought relief pitcher Julio Navarro his second win. The loser was Hank Aguirre, who was tagged for five runs and six hits in three innings.

Nevada Commission Approves Fight Date

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Nevada gets its first heavyweight title fight in 53 years on June 27 when champion Sonny Liston and ex-champ Floyd Patterson meet in a return match at the Las Vegas Convention Center.

Their scheduled 15-round bout was announced Wednesday night by promoter Al Bolan of Championship Sports, Inc., after approval by the Nevada State Athletic Commission.

Not since July 4, 1910 has the Silver State had a heavyweight championship fight. In that 1910 extravaganza, Jack Johnson kept his crown by knocking out former champion Jim Jeffries in the 15th round at Reno.

Here in this gambling metropolis, 29-year-old Liston of Chicago is favored at 5-1 to again beat 28-year-old Patterson of Yonkers, N.Y.

Sonny required only 2:06 of the first round to knock out Floyd at Chicago, last Sept. 25.

Before that Chicago fight, Sonny had signed a return-bout contract guaranteeing that, in case of victory, he would make his first defense against Patterson or forfeit \$100,000 of his Chicago purse, some of which was placed in escrow.

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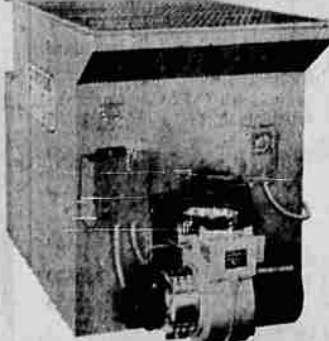
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
