During the fall of 1961 he served as interpreter at meetings of the United Nations General Assembly in New York. During Nehru's visit to Mexico in late November, 1961, Sein was released from his duties at the UN to travel in Mexico as Nehru's personal interpreter. Late in 1961 he served at the

Latin American Conference in Chile. He is one of the official interpreters for the International Aviation Organization of the UN and attends their conferences in this capacity.

Interprets For Notables
When President Llewellyn Mates visited President Eisenhower in Washington, Sein made the journey from Mexico City in order to interpret.

For three years he lived in Geneva and served as interpreter for the International Labor Organization, traveling widely in this capacity. He has been called to interpret for various organizations and conferences in many parts of the world, including India and Japan, and was one of the official interpreters at the founding of the United Nations in San Francisco. Sein is a member of the Mexico City Monthly Meeting of Friends, having been presiding clerk in 1961.

Cuban Inaction Policy Defended

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (UPI) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower Friday night defended his administration's position against Fidel Castro in the late 1950's.

He said the United States would have been "interfering with another American country" if it sought to check Castro in the late 1950's when his Communist ties were not clearly defined.

"I don't think I can speculate on that," Eisenhower said at a news conference when asked to comment, in retrospect, on whether he thought it was possible to stop Castro then. A reporter referred to recent remarks attributed to President Kennedy to that effect.

"Speculation is fruitless. You must remember America was very sick of a dictator named (Fulgencio) Batista," he said.

Police Snare Bank Bandit

TOPEKA, Kan. (UPI) — A 20-year-old bandit caught here Friday who admitted a spree of robberies that spanned half the United States was held in city jail today on \$15,000 bond.

Louene Hilton Morris, Jr., was apprehended at Topeka's municipal airport Friday afternoon less than 20 minutes after one of the town's banks was robbed of \$7,500. The money was recovered and Morris signed a statement admitting the robbery.

Police said Morris' tale of banditry stretching from Seattle, Wash., to Dallas, Tex., and Topeka appeared to be substantially true. On the basis of information supplied by Morris, detectives estimated he netted about \$5,000 in robberies in recent months.

Morris admitted committing robberies in Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Oklahoma and Kansas.

Evans Products Co. Winchester Plant Nears Completion

An expansion program at Evans Products Co.'s plywood mill at Roseburg is nearing completion and the company expects improved results from the mill during the second quarter. However, start-up costs at this mill adversely affected first quarter results, the company states in its report to its shareholders.

Net earnings of \$718 or 49 cents per share for the first quarter of 1963 were reported by the company. This is a substantial increase over the \$76,274 or 5 cents per share, earned in the first quarter of 1962, the company said. Total revenues for the first quarter were \$29,929,129 compared to \$24,971,802 in 1962.

The company, a major nationwide producer and distributor of plywood, hardboard and related building materials, and of damage-prevention equipment for railroad freight cars, reports earnings increases were primarily due to loss operations which now no longer burden its profit potential, plus improved demand for certain of its products and more efficient operation.

The plant at Winchester will have more than double its former production when all units are operating very shortly.

PP&L Inaugurates Power Use Survey In Roseburg Area

A door-to-door survey of the number and type of electric household appliances used by customers of Pacific Power & Light Co. and an analysis of how homes here utilize electricity has been inaugurated in Douglas County, according to Phil Quisenberry, PP&L district manager.

Purpose of the customer interviews is to provide the company information about the number of electric conveniences used by families in PP&L's service area and their future power requirements.

The calls are being made by members of the company's business development staff.

The information is expected to be useful in planning Pacific Power's construction requirements and business programs, Quisenberry reported.

"Use of electricity in Douglas County households has increased almost one-third in the last five years," he said, "and the average household consumption in the district is over 10,000 kilowatt-hours annually."

"The total is above the company's system-wide average and almost two and one-half times the national average."

"Based on other studies made by the company, the use of electricity here may well be expected to double in the next ten years," the PP&L manager said.

PP&L Man Is Honored For Engineering Work

The Society of American Military Engineers has announced award of the George W. Goethals Medal, its highest honor for engineering achievement, to E. Robert de Lucia, Portland, vice president and chief engineer of Pacific Power & Light Co.

The citation, named in honor of the military engineer who built the Panama Canal is offered annually to an engineer in civil and military practice who has made the most eminent and notable contribution to engineering, particularly in design and construction.

In naming de Lucia, the society noted the Portland engineer's achievements include directing and design and construction of large hydroelectric developments, one of them the highest earthen structure in the world when it was finished for PP&L in 1958, and transmission system lines.

Also noted were his role as an organizer of the Rocky Mountain Power Pool after Pacific Power acquired electric service responsibilities in Montana and Wyoming, and his interest since 1955 in civilian atomic research for electric power production.

Watch, Clock Repair Now In New Location

Tiny Tots Nursery In Winston Plans Expansion Program

The new Tiny Tots Day Nursery in Winston plans an expansion program in the future to more than double the size now in operation, reports Phoebe McGuire, Winston correspondent.

The state approved nursery at the present time is able to care for only 12 youngsters ranging in age from 2 years of age until school age. After completion adequate care may be given to as many as 35 children.

The nursery is attractively decorated in light pinks and blues with beds provided for each child. There are blackboards, tables, benches and books to provide entertainment as well as pre-school training for the youngsters.

A well-balanced lunch, regularly inspected by a state nutritionist, is provided at noon time for all children.

Hours are from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and in addition youngsters may be left at the nursery during those hours for a short period of time while mothers may shop or perform other necessary errands during the day.

The nursery is owned and operated by Mrs. Jack (Van) Darling, who devotes the day to the care and training of the youngsters.

Glide has three new citizens. Mr. and Mrs. Herbert P. Gray, formerly of Escandido, Calif., and Mrs. Gray's sister, Mrs. Marion D. Atherly, formerly of Yuma, Calif., recently purchased the Romine Apartments on Little River Road from Mr. and Mrs. James Romine.

The Grays purchased a motel at Clearwater Beach, Fla., after Gray's retirement in 1957. They later sold this and moved to California. There are four carports. Four apartments were made ready in September 1961 for the arrival of new teachers for Glide schools and buildings and grounds completed in the spring of 1962.

The Grays purchased three acres adjoining the apartments property. They expect to build a large home of their own and also make further developments. They are presently living in one of the apartments.

The Romines left after Easter for a long vacation in California. The sale was handled by Bill Stedman for the Paul Krueger Town and Country Real Estate.

Gray served in the Navy from 1917 to 1922 in the European theater during and after World War I, and with the Marines as a colonel in the 1st and 3rd Marine Divisions from 1942-46, participating in the campaigns of Guadalcanal, Bougainville, Guam, Okinawa and North China.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Gray worked for the Standard Oil Co. of California, producing department. They lived in the oil fields in California, Sumatra, Netherlands East Indies and in Maricao, Venezuela, retiring after 35 years service with the company.

The Grays expressed a desire to get away from the exploding population and industrial expansion of California, and state that, in Glide, "we believe we have found the spot where retired people can enjoy a climate with four seasons, yet mild...without being lost in an asphalt jungle."

The Romine Apartment House, on one acre, consists of five apartments, two two-bedroom apartments and three one-bedroom apartments, all completely furnished, with electric floor furnaces, ranges and refrigerators. Hot water is furnished from a main heater. The basement has a large recreation room and utility room. There are four carports.

West Central Oregon Bank Debits Increase

Bank debits for the West Central Oregon area, including Coos, Douglas and Lane counties, increased in March, compared to March 1962, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research reports.

March 1963 debits totaled \$228,758,622. For February they were \$206,798,392, and for March 1962 the total was \$203,623,023.

Oregon, with 254 banks reporting had an increase in bank debits in March, 1963, of 8.0 per cent as compared with February, 1963, and an increase of 7.9 per cent as compared with March 1962.

Total debits for Oregon in March, 1963 came to \$2,186,397,496. For February, 1963 the total was \$2,024,411,038 and for March 1962 the total was \$2,026,624,167.
