Paper Says 'Rocky' Will Wed Divorcee

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Mirror in a copyright story today quoted a "close family friend of the Rockefellers" as saying the New York governor and Margaretta (Happy) Murphy would be married in mid-May.

"The ceremony will be performed at a Protestant Episcopal church—but not the one where Rockefeller usually worships, the Riverside Church on Riverside Drive. It will be within New York state, but outside the city," the close friend said, according to the morning paper.

The Mirror story said only 25 to 30 members of the immediate families have been invited to the "quiet ceremony, and no reception."

Robert McManus, the governor's press secretary, declined to comment on the Mirror story.

Rockefeller, considered a leading candidate for the GOP presidential nomination in 1964, was divorced from Mrs. Mary Todd Rockefeller in March 1962. They had been married 31 years.

Mrs. Murphy was divorced three weeks ago from Dr. James Slater Murphy, an associate in virology and medicine at the Rockefeller Institute.

Mrs. Murphy, a volunteer worker for Rockefeller when he ran for governor in 1958, served for a while as staff member in his Manhattan office resigning in May 1961. The two have been romantically linked for several months.

Education Board To Take Another Look At Building Needs For Higher Education

SALEM (UPI)—On a cordial note, the Ways and Means Education subcommittee and the State Board of Higher Education moved Saturday to coordinate their positions on higher education building.

At the request of the legislative committee, a special board meeting was planned May 6 to comment on actions tentatively taken by the committee on the board's college building budget.

Charles Holloway, vice president of the board, expressed willingness to hold a special meeting. Chancellor R. E. Lieunell said, "I think you'll find them willing to work toward the goals you've outlined."

What it seemed to mean is that the board will take another look at building needs in terms of financial limits indicated by the committee.

The committee, in turn, will listen to the board's expression on how priorities and funding should be handled.

The committee recently gave tentative approval to instructional projects worth \$25 million during the 1963-65 biennium—some in a bonding, self-liquidating category, and others in a general fund category.

Flexibility Eyed

The board was asked specifically if it would like more flexibility in setting priorities than the separate categories would allow. The committee indicated it is open to further consideration of three projects it omitted that were high on the board's priority list: Library construction or remodeling at Oregon State University, the University of Oregon, and Oregon College of Education.

At the special meeting, the board also will have a chance to comment on bids for development of the Oregon Technical Institute campus that are to be opened Thursday. The committee is waiting to see the amount.

Rep. John Masser, R-Beaverton, suggested the board also might want to comment on whether some of its "B" budget items for improving education might take priority over some building requests.

The meeting ranged over several subjects:

—The subcommittee rejected a suggestion that higher education donate \$6,000 for planning of a private graduate study center in the Portland area. Private colleges already have donated such a sum. Members warned it would set a precedent in favor of further state support of the proposed center. Said Rep. Stafford Hansell, R-Hermiston, of state aid, "now is the time to knock it in the head."

—On campus growth, Sen. Alfred Corbett, D-Portland, suggested another effort be made to work out a plan for letting the University of Oregon expand onto part

Negro Leaders Plan Broader Race Campaign

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—Negro leaders planned to broaden the scope of their month-old campaign against racial barriers in this Southern industrial center today and indicated the next target would be the city bus system.

A spokesman for the Negro leadership here said a delegation would meet with officials of the Birmingham Transit Co. today to demand that the company hire Negroes as drivers.

The spokesman indicated the threat of a boycott hung over the financially shaky company, which just resumed service Saturday after a strike by employees, if the demands are not met.

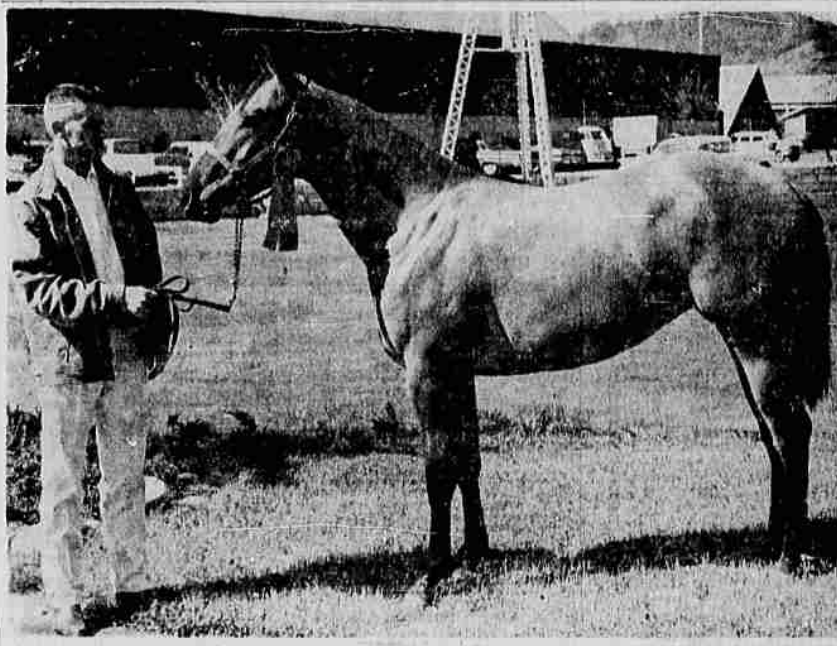
"The Negroes need buses more than the whites," the spokesman said, "but they need jobs, too."

Small groups of Negroes attempted Sunday to attend morning worship services at Birmingham's white churches for the third week in a row, but the effort met with limited success.

The Negroes presented themselves to the pastors of 39 churches Sunday morning and handed over a printed card which read:

"We come in a spirit of love and in the name of Him who taught us to say 'Our Father'."

At least nine of the churches invited the Negroes in and ushered them to their seats. Others turned them away.

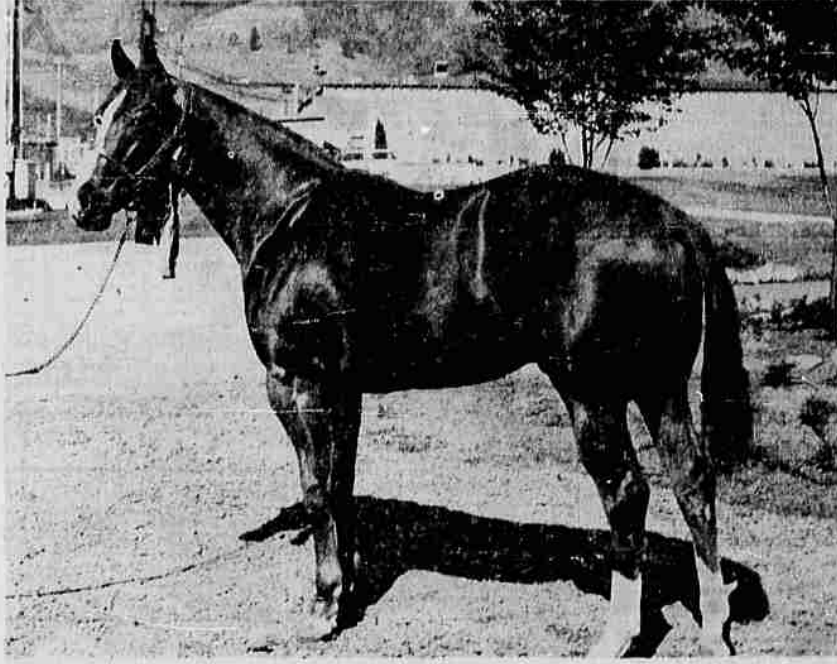
Those from the county will include Mrs. Gertrude Compton of Elkton, District No. 9 director. She will preside at the Thursday luncheon.
