

Hafield Sees Turmoil In Basic Support Plan

SALEM (UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield said today that placing basic school support on a biennial appropriation basis "could throw local school districts into complete turmoil." Such a step has been suggested by the Ways and Means Committee.

Hafield told a news conference it was all right for the legislature to change formulas for various school programs. But he warned that school districts "can't wait for each legislature to set the budget."

The Legislative Fiscal Office has termed the present continuing open end basic school program "poor fiscal management." The Senate Education Committee will hold a hearing Tuesday on the proposal to place the appropriation on a biennial basis, similar to other state programs.

"We must have time for school planning," the governor said. "It is all right for the legislature to change the formula, but not to set the allotment each session."

No Injuries Result In Winston Wreck

State police investigated a two-car accident at 2:59 a.m. Saturday on the Lookingglass Road at the Winston City limits.

They report a pickup was parked on the wrong side of the road with the rear of the vehicle out on the pavement. The car was registered to Gayla Rudzik, of Rt. 4, Box 697, Roseburg.

A second car, operated by Jerry Lee Wirtz, Winston, came east over a hill and around a corner, striking a high bank. The car then flipped over on its side. There were no injuries, and the cars were moved under their own power.

Ambulances were called from every direction to a motorcycle accident eight miles west of Camas Valley on Highway 42 Sunday. One went out from Roseburg and another from the Myrtle Point area, but they, or state police found nothing.

Another ambulance service which also was called, however, got a second call before dispatch that it was not necessary to come out as the accident was not serious. No name was obtained.

A one-car accident also occurred on the North Umpqua Highway between Roseburg and Gilda Saturday at about 7 p.m. A wrecker was dispatched when a car went into the ditch but there were no injuries. Police had no investigation reports.

Miss Shirley Courtney, daughter of Deputy Sheriff and Mrs. C. A. Courtney, 583 NW Sweetbriar Ave., was hospitalized overnight with shoulder and other minor injuries, as the result of an accident on NE Stephens St. Sunday about 7 p.m.

According to information received by The News-Review, she was traveling north in the center lane and signaled to move to the left lane for a turn onto Garden Valley Blvd., when her car was struck in the side by another car in the inside lane.

The second car was operated by Ben Ryder of NW Broad Ave. The cars reportedly traveled 70 to 80 yards before stopping after the accident. The Courtney car was a total loss. Both cars had been removed prior to the arrival of police.

Hafield said he would meet with labor leaders to discuss the senate-approved workmen's compensation bill. He said the increased benefits and universal coverage features of the bill were good, but he hoped the House would improve procedures for handling claims.

He said he favored the provisions allowing private insurance companies to underwrite some employers.

Hafield said he hoped the House would improve the bill.

Of Senate President Ben Musa's request to double the proposed state civil defense budget to finance a six-man agency, Hafield said, "I am glad to see there is concern by legislative leaders with civil defense."

He was optimistic the Senate would approve traffic safety bills to "end the slaughter on our highways."

Hafield reiterated his opposition to bond programs to finance highway construction.

He said the proposed interim study of game management was an argument for his proposed natural resources department.

"It would be better to spend money on reorganization, then the problem would solve itself," Hafield said.

No Explosion, Says Rickover

PORTSMOUTH, N.H. (UPI) — Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover testified today the nuclear reactor core of the sunken submarine Thresher was so designed that it "is physically impossible to explode like a bomb."

Rickover, known as the father of the atomic submarine, testified before a naval court of inquiry into the mysterious sinking of the Thresher April 10 with a loss of 125 men.

Rickover, wearing a conservative blue suit, testified in public for seven minutes. He then resumed testimony behind closed doors presumably on secret aspects of the nuclear-powered Thresher. A Marine guard was posted outside the hearing room.

Rickover said that debris scooped up from the Atlantic where the Thresher sank showed no signs of radioactivity in tests conducted as recent as Sunday.

The debris was not identified. But the naval court previously had been shown debris that included a chunk of plastic believed from the Thresher's nuclear reactor shield, bits of cork, part of a life jacket and gloves used in the reactor room of a submarine.

"The reactor core is so designed it is physically impossible to explode like a bomb," Rickover said.

Rickover said that if the Thresher's reactor were flooded, the sea water would act as a coolant and provide an additional safeguard.

"There is no reason to believe any radiological problems were caused by loss of Thresher," he said.

Rickover said he and his associates knew many of the Thresher's crew members and were responsible for their selection and training.

"We knew their problems," he said.

He said, "Everyone knows how I felt about the crew. It was a personal loss to me. We can only hope that in giving their lives to our future safety."

"I feel for the wives, mothers, fathers and children," he said.

James Renfrow

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Season's Worst Tornadoes Hit Great Plains, Texas

Heavy thunderstorms, rain and hail pelted Texas, Nebraska and Kansas residents today trying to dig out from the aftermath of the worst tornado siege of the season.

Minor flooding was reported in eastern Kansas and north Texas.

A score of twisters plus 92-mile-per-hour winds swirled through the western plains Sunday, killing at least one person, injuring dozens and leaving one missing.

Fort Worth, Tex., where damage estimates soared as high as \$2 million, bore the brunt of howling wind and rain storm. But the most tragic result of the tornado assault occurred near Auburn, Neb.

A black funnel cloud swept up a car containing Mrs. Fred Shilling, 37, Vandalla, Ill., and her eight children, hurled it through power lines along the highway near Auburn and bounced it along the ground, scattering the occupants at intervals of 400 to 500 feet.

One of the children, Diane, 14, died on an operating table at the Auburn hospital four hours after the mishap. The seven other children and Mrs. Shilling were in serious condition.

The tornadoes occurred in a "tornado warning" area. The U.S. Weather Bureau had posted warnings of severe thunderstorms and tornadoes for portions of Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri and Iowa Sunday.

Showers and thunderstorms were predicted for today over the eastern half of the country with heavy amounts forecast for Iowa. Generally fair skies with little rain was the outlook for the West.
