Business Leaders Join In Campaign For Cutting Taxes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A group of business leaders have joined in the campaign to get Congress more enthused about cutting taxes this year.

Thirty-six industrial leaders met here last week and formed a committee to start building business support for tax reduction. The list of charter members read like a page from "Who's Who" in U.S. business.

Frazar B. Wilde, spokesman for the group, told a news conference the administration had suggested formation of the committee. But he said the committee was not endorsing President Kennedy's specific tax plan.

The President earlier this year recommended a \$13 billion program of tax reduction and revision, but neither Congress nor the public seems too excited about it.

Wilde, board chairman of the Connecticut General Life Insurance Company, said the dearth of public support for cutting taxes was the main reason the business committee was organized.

"This is just to bring more people to the front to endorse the idea," he said.

Kennedy met with the committee at the White House and then issued a statement saying it "will perform a useful public service in fostering a wider understanding of the national need for a prompt and substantial reduction in individual and corporate tax rates."

The committee statement made it clear that the business leaders considered tax reduction the paramount legislative goal this year.

It said that cutting government expenditures and enacting so-called tax reforms also were important, but that neither should be allowed to hinder the drive to reduce tax rates.

While the committee did not endorse Kennedy's tax plan, it outlined a broad tax cut program that was close enough to the President's to permit him to benefit from any support it might generate.

The committee said it favored a \$10 billion tax cut, including a "substantial reduction" in individual tax rates and a cut in the corporate tax rate from 52 to 47 per cent.

South Suspects Slam Trouble

One of the many components that go to make up a really top flight bridge player is that mysterious quality known as "feel of the table."

South ruffed the spade lead and

studied the hand a while. Six clubs looked like a mighty easy contract. In fact, South wished that he had gone all the way to seven. Then he studied the hand a trifle more and wondered why his not-vulnerable opponents had let him buy the hand at six clubs.

Seven spades had to be a cheap save for them no matter how their hands divided yet someone must have thought that he had defense. In that case all three clubs would be in one hand. If East held them, South could lead a club to the ace and pick them up. Should West hold them South would have to lose a club trick in any event.

All this would be academic unless someone held four diamonds to the jack. But if clubs didn't break why should diamonds?

Then South's feel of the table came to him. He realized that East had invited a spade save when he jumped to four, but West let the hand play at six clubs. If anyone held three clubs it would be West.

Now South led his king of clubs and sure enough East showed out, but South had no trouble anyway. He played the ace and king of diamonds. West ruffed and led a second spade. South trumped in, led a club to dummy's ace and fished against East's jack of diamonds.
