Eyewitness Relates Cubans Speed Arms And Men To Latin Countries

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI)—An American eyewitness to the Communist build-up in Cuba said in a copyrighted radio report Monday that high speed vessels are transporting "tons of arms" and men from Cuban ports to Latin American countries almost daily.

The report, copyrighted by Miami radio station WGBS and the Storer Broadcasting Co., also said the Fidel Castro regime has "at least" 1,000 missiles which can reach the U.S. mainland.

The American and his wife said they were residents of Cuba for more than eight years. They reported their story for the radio station but declined to permit use of their names for fear of reprisals against friends on the island.

They said they have given complete details about everything they have learned about Castro's military strength to the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency, according to WGBS.

Their report challenged official assessments of Castro's arsenal and estimates of Russian troop strength on the island by the U.S. government. Castro's power is constantly increasing, the American said, and he is literally exporting his revolution by shipments of arms and trained agents to other Latin nations.

Foreign troops from the Communist bloc nations and the U.S.S.R. now in Cuba total between 70,000 and 80,000 men, the American said.

In addition, Castro has about one-third of the island's population or a total of two million persons under arms, he added.

He and his wife also reported that:

—At least 1,000 two-stage, 45-foot rockets, with an estimated minimum range of 300 miles, are in Cuba, many of them stored in caves.

—High-speed vessels, about 150-feet long and carrying no flag or insignia, are running small arms and trained saboteurs to Haiti, Guatemala, Venezuela, Chile, Peru and Argentina on a regular "schedule" of shipments.

—Submarine "pens" have been built under the guise of "fishing ports" at Mariel, near Havana, and at Banos, in Oriente Province and service an estimated 50 Russian-bloc submarines operated in and around Cuba.

—A new submarine base is under construction at the Isle of Pines "that will be the largest of its kind in the world."

Sen. Vernon Cook, D-Gresham, termed the bill "unrealistic and impractical." He said passage of the bill would simply result in more Oregonians going to Washington, where there is no waiting period, to get married.

The uniform commercial code was approved in the 1961 session, but its effective date was delayed to this September to give commercial interests time to study it and become familiar with its provisions.

The bill passed Monday makes several changes in the 1961 proposal. One removes from the code any reference to automobile title. Ownership of automobiles will be certificated as in the past.

Sen. Don Willner, D - Portland, urged passage of the bill which benefits employers with a good safety record. Sen. Walter Pearson, D-Portland, warned that if the workmen's compensation bill now in the House is not passed, that giving credit to employers with a good safety record, and penalizing others, "could lead to the ruin of the State Industrial Accident Commission."

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City Clean-Up Week Begins

Pickup of trash and junk in the Roseburg city limits got under way Monday, as city trucks started the rounds in the downtown section of town and Templin bar area.

Mayor Thomas Garrison has proclaimed this week of April 29-May 3 as Roseburg Clean Up Week, and states:

"During City Clean Up Week, the city will pick up all junk and trash (excluding garbage). I urge all property owners and occupants to take advantage of this service offered them by the city. I believe this is an opportune time to make a thorough check of all premises to get rid of any existing fire hazards, or any unsightly accumulations of trash. Many fires could be prevented if we all follow the rule 'Don't give fire a place to start.'"

Piles of trash were seen about town placed on curbsings Monday and today. The pickup continued today in the west Roseburg area from the Oak Street Bridge to W. Pilger Street.

Wednesday it will be in the north-east section north of Deer Creek; Thursday, far west Roseburg west of Pilger and the Hucert area and Friday, southeast section south of SE Mosher Street and east of the railroad tracks, and the East Roseburg east of SE Fowler and Fulton streets.
