Battling from behind, the Glendale Pirates came on strong to hand the Umpqua Valley League setback of the season Monday in the first game of a make-up doubleheader. The 'Cats collected three unearned

runs in the fifth inning to nip the invading Pirates, 5-2, in the seven inning opener. Rojas Gutierrez brought the Pirates back in the second game with a nifty one-hit, 6-1, triumph.

In the opener Glide's Lyle Charon and Glendale's Joe Apperson settled into a pitchers' duel until four errors proved disastrous for the Pirates in the fifth canto.

Glendale took the lead in the first inning when Hubert Stewart slapped a single to center and with two away Gutierrez blasted a triple down the right field line. In the third the Pirates struck again on a walk to Gary Tooley, a sacrifice and a double by Bill Waterman.

The Wildcats tied the score in the third with a two-run uprising. John Allenby led off with a single, and with two away John DeGroot walked to set the scene for Rob Blake's towering triple.

In the third Allenby again started the rally when he was safe on an error. Darrell Cellers singled through the box and a pair of errors allowed both runs to score. DeGroot went to third on the bobbles and scored on the fourth miscue of the inning.

Charon worked six innings to get credit for the win, then was tagged

with the loss in the second game. In the opener Charon struck out eight, walked two and was tagged for four hits. Cellers pitched the last inning, giving up a lone single.

Apperson gave up only four hits and two walks, but the errors proved his downfall in the fatal fifth. Gutierrez suffered from periods of control trouble in the closing game, but it was not until Terry Jamison slashed a single over second base to lead off the fifth was the flashy Pirate hurler tagged for a base blow. Gutierrez struck out five and issued seven walks.

The Pirates took the lead with a single run in the second stanza, then fed the victory with a three-run uprising in the third. Jerry Schaffer led off with a walk and Jim Redfield followed with a single. Stewart bunted for a single to load the bases, and on Gutierrez's

sacrifice the ball was thrown wild at the plate allowing two runs to score. A throwing error to second allowed Stewart to score and Bill Hubler laid down a perfect bunt to bring Gutierrez home.

Glendale finished with a single run in the fifth off relief hurler Bob Zuck. Redfield and Gutierrez each collected two hits in the second game, while Stewart and Waterman each had two for the Pirates in the opener.

Sutherlin opened the scoring in

the bottom of the first when Larry Pitner walked, moved to second on Dennis Sutton's single, went to third on a sacrifice and scored on Ron Heaton's squeeze bunt.

The Eagles bounced back with two runs in the second as Rod Jackson and David Vian led off with singles to set the scene for Rick Luttrell's double. However, the home team tied the count in its half of the second as Charles Koch walked, stole second, advanced to third on a passed ball and scored on a wild pitch.

Yoncalla's winning rally came in the fourth. Roger Carney, Dennis Boan and Gordon Smith walked to load the bases with one away. Carney raced home on a wild pitch, while Boan and Smith followed on an outfield error.

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Balk Nets NY Mets A 4-2 Triumph Over Dodgers; SF Giants Win 4-3

Who says they've eased the balk rule?

National League President Warren Giles tried, but apparently he didn't get through to his umpires.

They set a National League record Monday night by calling the 77th and 78th balks of the season and also set Casey Stengel to doing cartwheels because one of those balks gave the New York Mets a 4-2 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Dodger reliever Ed Roebuck balked home the winning run during a three-run rally in the seventh inning after winner Roger Craig had erased the old mark of 76 in a single season by balking home a run in the second inning.

"I thought they had eased the rule," said a dejected Roebuck after the game. "I still don't know what the interpretation is."

According to Giles' newest directive, pitchers still are required to come to a stop in their delivery when there is a runner on base, but they needn't stop "at least one second" as was the case previously.

Stengel, against the rule from the start, said he understood it perfectly, "but go explain it to my pitchers."

Anyway, Roebuck's seventh-inning balk allowed Charley Neal to trot home with the winning run from third and ended the Mets' three-game losing streak.

Rookie Starts Rally
Rookie Ed Kranepool started the winning rally with a double to open the seventh and after Neal bunted safely, loser Bob Miller uncorked a wild pitch that tied the score. Neal advanced to third on Al Moran's single and came home after Roebuck relieved Miller and committed a balk.

The San Francisco Giants snapped a three-game losing streak with a 4-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies in the only other NL game played. Rain washed out scheduled games between the Houston Colts and Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds.

In the American League, the Washington Senators beat the Los Angeles Angels, 9-3, in the first game of a two-nighter but lost the second game, 10-8.

The only other scheduled games between the Chicago White Sox and New York Yankees, and Baltimore Orioles and Minnesota Twins were rained out.

Mays Belts 100th Triple
Willie Mays belted the 100th triple of his career in the third inning and came home with the winning run on Orlando Cepeda's single off loser Cal McLish. Former Oriole Jack Fisher was

nicked for 10 hits by the Phillies, who dropped their third straight, but went the distance for his first NL victory.

Chuck Hinton drove in three runs with a homer and a single to pace the Senators to their victory in the opener over the Angels. Bob Turley suffered his third straight loss for Los Angeles, although a two-base throwing error by reliever Julio Navarro opened the gates for a four-run Washington rally in the fifth. Don Rudolph hurled an eight-hitter for his first victory.

The Angels came from behind with six runs in the seventh inning to salvage the nightcap. Albie Pearson collected three hits to pace the winner's 14-hit attack. Mel Nelson was the winning pitcher and Jim Hannan the loser.
