

Natural Gas Due In S. W. Oregon

Roseburg may have natural gas by the middle of November.

At least this is the goal of California-Pacific Utilities Co. The announcement was made today by F. K. Albert, company president.

"We are now preparing to take bids for the construction of a 53-mile mainline from Grants Pass to Ashland. This line will tie in with the 127-mile mainline from Eugene to Grants Pass to be constructed by El Paso Natural Gas Co.," Albert said.

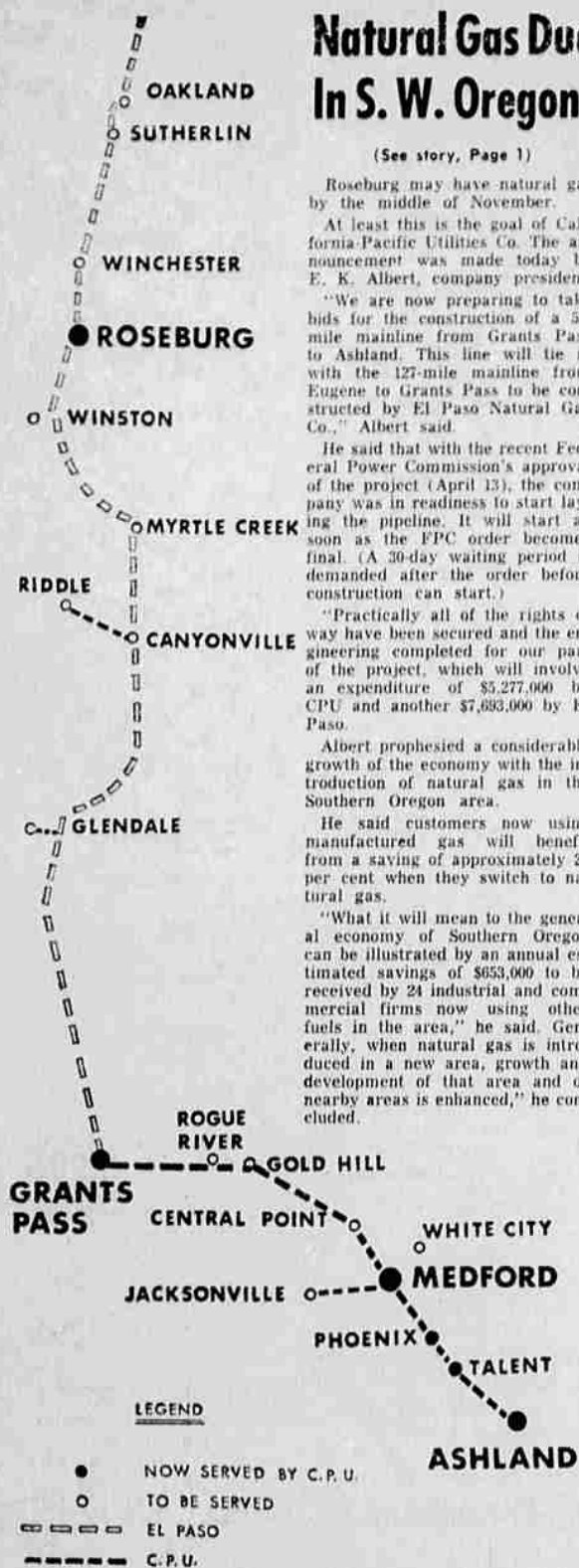
He said that with the recent Federal Power Commission's approval of the project (April 13), the company was in readiness to start laying the pipeline. It will start as soon as the FPC order becomes final. (A 30-day waiting period is demanded after the order before construction can start.)

"Practically all of the rights of way have been secured and the engineering completed for our part of the project, which will involve an expenditure of \$5,277,000 by CPU and another \$7,693,000 by El Paso.

Albert prophesied a considerable growth of the economy with the introduction of natural gas in the Southern Oregon area.

He said customers now using manufactured gas will benefit from a saving of approximately 20 per cent when they switch to natural gas.

"What it will mean to the general economy of Southern Oregon can be illustrated by an annual estimated savings of \$653,000 to be received by 24 industrial and commercial firms now using other fuels in the area," he said. Generally, when natural gas is introduced in a new area, growth and development of that area and of nearby areas is enhanced," he concluded.



Jane's Back In Pink Palace After Quick Juarez Divorce

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Actress Jayne Mansfield was back home in her "pink palace built for love" today—minus a husband.

The glittering blonde returned with her rumored third husband, Nelson Sardelli, after signing "quickie" divorce papers Tuesday in red ink in Juarez, Mexico. The divorce from Hungarian strongman Mickey Hargitay took five minutes.

Miss Mansfield and Sardelli, a multi-lingual singer-actor of Italian extraction born in Brazil, flew together from Texas to Mexico and then on to Los Angeles the same day. They had spent the night with Miss Mansfield's stepfather and mother in Dallas.

"But the pair dodged questions from newsmen about when, and if, they would marry."

"I only got my divorce several hours ago," said Miss Mansfield after stepping from a jetliner carrying her pet chihuahua, "Gallina." "I think it's a little premature to say anything now, don't you?"

Sardelli was more effusive in his remarks at the time of the Juarez divorce.

"We love each other and hope to marry," he was quoted as saying.

"She plays on the strings of my heart."

Miss Mansfield told Judge Miguel Gomez Guerra of the First Civil Court that she and Hargitay already had made a property settlement and arranged for custody

of their two children, Miklos, 4, and Zoltan, 2.

Miss Mansfield also has a daughter, Jayne Marie, 12, by her first husband Paul Mansfield, a public relations man. The children, she said, would "live with me, darling."

Miss Mansfield, who gave her age as 28, divorced Hargitay, 32, on grounds of incompatibility. She said she simply could not get along with him.

Mock Berlin Wall Gives Emphasis To Law Day Salute

A 6-foot high, 150-foot long wall in the middle of Wichita's (Kan.) main street today symbolized the sharp contrast between Law Day USA observances and the Communists' May Day celebrations in Moscow.

The ugly, cinderblock wall, which has three strands of barbed wire strung across the top, was built as a model of the Berlin wall.

Personnel from nearby McConnell Air Force Base donned "aggressor uniforms" to patrol the wall. An armored car with a mounted machinegun was parked near the wall. Guards halted motorists driving through "Checkpoint Charlie" to give them Law Day literature.

In Cincinnati, Ohio, famed Fountain Square was converted into a Red Square for the nation's sixth annual salute to freedom under the law. Former President Harry S. Truman had been scheduled to speak but had to cancel out because of illness.

Law Day observances were sponsored in many cases by bar associations to foster respect for the law, to teach the values and duties of citizenship and the roles of law and courts in protecting individual liberties and rights.

The Loyola (Chicago) Student Bar Association planned a special seminar on the new Illinois judicial constitutional amendment in Texas. Gov. John Connally told a "Law Day U.S.A." banquet the three major elements of a free society are "the rules of law, a political democracy and individual freedom."

Connally said the nation's tradition starts with respect for law and the "affirmation that we have consented to be governed only by law. Our law must be living and dynamic expression of our life."

The American Bar Association estimated about 100,000 programs of various kinds would be held in conjunction with law day.

Museum Man, Red Diplomat In Word Duel

FREDERICKSBURG, Va. (UPI)—A museum executive and a Soviet diplomat verbally clashed over the merits of the Monroe Doctrine Tuesday during a tour of the James Monroe Memorial Foundation.

Lawrence G. Hoes, foundation president and a great grandson of Monroe, presented a copy of the doctrine to Ignor Kolosovsky, counselor at the Soviet Embassy in Washington, and asked that it be given to Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The Russian told him that the Monroe Doctrine, pledging American might against foreign imperialism in this hemisphere, was "completely dead," said Hoes.

"I told him the doctrine is very, very much alive," Hoes said, and handed the document to Kolosovsky.

"Mr. Kolosovsky was very, very startled," Hoes said. "Then he managed a smile and took the copy."

The museum official said he told the Russian that "it was the Monroe Doctrine that got your missiles out of Cuba."

"He sort of recoiled as if I'd socked him," Hoes said.

He said he told another member of the party of 40 to 50 persons he believed the doctrine eventually would force Russia out of Cuba.

"Well, we'll let history be the judge," the Russian replied.

Senate Republicans Ready The Axe For JFK's Public Works Program

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate Republicans honed their axes for President Kennedy's stepped-up public works program today.

Led by Sen. Everett Sinton, R-Mass., many GOP senators were ready to vote for a \$200 million cut in the \$450 million, House-approved allowance for the accelerated public works program.

Republicans were not solidly behind the cut, however. Democratic leaders, assured of some support from their party's Southern wing and backing of senators from other areas, said they could defeat the economy proposal.

The public works money was included in a \$1.5 billion catch-all appropriations bill awaiting Senate action. Also included was a lump-sum \$75 million payment to the Philippine government in lieu of funds voted last year to pay World War II damage claims to individual Philippine claimants.

The revision was voted by the Senate Appropriations Committee following disclosures that a Washington lobbyist and his associates, who spread campaign contributions around the Capitol, stood to collect a percentage fee from many claimants who would have collected under a bill passed year.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., said he thought there was a bi-partisan desire to straighten out the foreign lobby complications with a minimum strain on U.S.-Philippine relations.

Kite Flying Cautions Issued By Power Firm

Kite flying safety precautions would be a good topic for the breakfast table briefing for the family's space pilots, according to Pacific Power & Light Company.

With a rash of reports of kites tangled in power lines and trees, some resulting in a few power disruptions that have inconvenienced customers while creating hazards for youngsters, the power company has issued a six-point reminder about handling kites.

1. Always fly kites in an open field, well away from power lines.
2. Never use tinsel string, wet string, wire, or any twine with metal in it. Use only dry string.
3. Don't fly kites in the rain.
4. Don't dash across streets or highways while flying a kite.
5. Keep kites away from TV or radio aerials.
6. Never pull on the string or climb poles or trees to loosen a kite snagged in power lines. If your kite lodges in a power line, or in a tree near power wires, leave it there! Do not try to get it down.
