Nobody Took Chance To Slam

There are many ways for North and South to bid their cards, but when this hand was played in a New Jersey duplicate no one reached the lay down slam in hearts. In fact those pairs who played hearts rather than no-trump received good scores for making six. No one

I can find nothing wrong with the opening heart bid, the jump response to two spades and the rebid to three hearts.
 I also can't find much wrong with North's bid to four hearts. He has jumped to show 17 or 18 points and that is what he has. Furthermore, if North does decide on some further strong bid what should it be?

On the other hand, it seems to me that South can find a bid above four hearts. He only has 12 points in high cards, but he has a six card suit, three spades for his partner, first or second round control on every suit and a hand that looks decidedly slamish.

Even though South has a void, a Blackwood four no-trump seems in order. If North shows three aces, South can think about seven. If North shows two aces south can afford a six bid.

Actually, North will show just one ace, but South can still bid six. If North's one ace turns out to be clubs, South will be set but that is unlikely and you don't win at bridge by waiting for sure things.

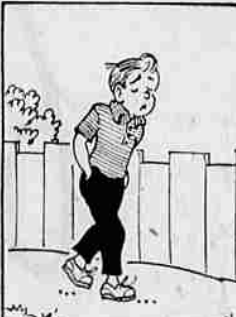
