

Heavily-Guarded Queen Frederika Flies Home After Chase In London

LONDON (UPI)—Heavily guarded Queen Frederika of Greece flew home Tuesday from London where an American actress claim, the queen was chased by angry demonstrators.

Six motorcycle police escorted Queen Frederika and her daughter, Princess Irene, 20, to London Airport from the Hotel Claridges, where more than 30 uniformed police were on duty. Strict security precautions were also in force at the airport.

It was the first time in the queen's 10-day visit demonstrators were not picketing her hotel.

American actress Marti Stevens, 28, said she gave the queen and Princess Irene shelter and a calming drink April 20 after they beat on the door of her apartment, near the hotel, and said they were being pursued by angry demonstrators.

"They looked frightened. Their legs were covered with mud. They were breathless," Miss Stevens said.

She said the queen asked her: "Will you please help me? I am the queen of the Greeks."

"I said: 'I don't care who you are, come in.'"

The demonstrators outside the hotel during the past 10 days were led by British-born Mrs. Betty Ambatielos, wife of imprisoned Greek union chief, Tony Ambatielos.

She said Queen Frederika "was certainly not being chased... nobody at any time laid a finger on her."

The Greek Embassy said in a statement that Mrs. Ambatielos had "tried to distort the facts."

"The truth is that on Saturday evening April 20 Mrs. Ambatielos, while under the influence of emotional agitation, approached the queen just as she left the hotel accompanied by Princess Irene for a walk and grasped her by the shoulders," the embassy said.

"At that moment, the security officer assigned to Queen Frederika intervened and extricated the queen from the attacker's grip. Simultaneously, a group of young Cypriot Communists rushed against the officer, who was thrown to the ground, and assaulted a chauffeur coming to his aid."

"Under the circumstances, Queen Frederika sought refuge in the first house she could call at, in fact, the resident was an American lady, Miss Marti Stevens."

Sardelli, pushing a car loaded with Miss Mansfield's luggage at the Dallas airport, said, "boy, I wish Hargitay were here to help with the baggage."

Miss Mansfield described Sardelli as a "friend." She declined to commit herself on future matrimonial plans, "until my divorce is final, anyway." Par for a final divorce in Juarez, Mexico, where she went, is 24 hours.

She said that as soon as she finishes her business in Juarez, she will fly to Los Angeles for a television show and then take off for Europe to make a motion picture.

She did not undertake to identify the movie because, she said, it had a long name and she was not sure how to pronounce it.

She and Sardelli spent Monday night in Dallas with her mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Peers.

Georgia-Pacific Raps USFS Road Regulation

PORTLAND (UPI)—A spokesman for Georgia-Pacific Corp. said recently proposed U.S. Forest Service regulations could block access to private property.

Rue L. Johnson, timberlands manager for the big wood products firm, spoke at a hearing on a redraft of National Forest access road regulations proposed by the Forest Service.

Johnson said the regulations would give the Forest Service power and means to delay indefinitely granting of access road permits to terminate existing permits across National Forest lands "at will."

He was one of several persons who opposed the proposed redraft of access regulations. Johnson termed the Forest Service's power under the proposed regulation as "unprecedented in the concept of democratic government."

Rusk Says World Faces Red Threat

KARACHI, Pakistan (UPI)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk said the major threat from Cuba has been removed but he warned that "all members of the Free World are still under the gun" of communism.

Rusk said defensive arrangements such as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the Central Treaty Organization are the most effective way to keep world peace and prevent war by error.

He told a meeting of the CENTO ministers that only behind a shield of defense can the Free World pursue economic progress that will ensure lasting peace.

"Today our security of the Free World depends not on the distance from the enemy but on the certain knowledge by an aggressor of a devastating response to an attack," he said.

The meeting was opened by the Pakistani host foreign minister, Zulfikar Bhutto, who reminded the delegates of his government's concern over Western arms shipments to India for use against Communist Chinese aggression.

Pakistan fears that India will use American and British arms against Pakistan in their dispute over Kashmir.

Barry Blames Education Office For Lack Of School Classrooms

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said here the Federal office of Education simply will not let the nation overcome its school classroom shortage.

He accused the office of "manufacturing" figures to show the existence of a shortage in order to drum up support for federal aid to education.

Goldwater made the charge in testimony before a Senate labor and public welfare subcommittee which is conducting hearings on President Kennedy's \$5 billion education bill.

The Arizona Republican, a prospective candidate for next year's GOP presidential nomination, said the massive federal aid sought by the administration is not needed.

States and local school districts have been rapidly meeting education needs, he said, but the Office of Education refuses to recognize this and continues to turn out "propaganda" aimed at increasing federal control.

Goldwater was surrounded by liberal Democrats and Republicans as he testified, but his statements went unchallenged.

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., subcommittee chairman and author of the bill, said this would be done later.

The Goldwater bill, which would cost a fraction of the amount needed to finance the Kennedy measure, would set up a nationwide system of scholarships for college undergraduates and provide tax relief for parents sending children to college.

But it does not contain the wide range of federal aid to education included in the administration bill. The Kennedy bill puts all of the administration's education proposals into one basket, ranging from grants and loans for grade school and college classroom construction to higher teacher salaries.

First Nighters Will Pay \$100 For Premier Of Kennedy Film

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—One hundred dollars is a great deal of money to blow on a movie, but more than a thousand persons are expected to lay it on the line and consider it a bargain.

Along with the movie, customers will be given dinner and maybe, just maybe, an opportunity to hobnob with the President of the United States—who also will pay \$100 for his ticket.

The occasion, of course, is the Southern California premiere of "PT 109," the movie depicting JFK's heroics during World War II.

Mrs. Peter Lawford, the President's sister, is sponsoring the premiere in hopes of raising \$100,000 for the Joseph P. Kennedy Child Care Clinic in Santa Monica, Calif. But Mrs. Lawford can't guarantee that the President will be there.

In announcing the July 2 premiere, Mrs. Lawford said, "my

brother, the President, has been invited. Now I'm just waiting for the check to come in."

Also invited were Attorney General Robert Kennedy and Sen. Ted Kennedy, D-Mass. Mrs. Lawford is awaiting word (and checks) from them, too.

Tickets Going Fast

When movie folk got word of the invitation list tickets began to sell as if "PT 109" had been filmed with the original cast.

Even militant Republicans in the community were anxious to attend the premiere, some perhaps in the hope that they could cry that the lily had been gilded.

But there is small chance of that inasmuch as the picture was made under the personal supervision of Jack L. Warner, head of Warner Bros. studios and a Grand Old Party regular of which few are grander or older. He's 71.

Warner will be at the premiere himself.

With the prospect of seeing members of the country's first

family in the flesh, Hollywood is invited. There is nothing dearer to the hearts of movie stars than celebrities from other fields of endeavor, especially politics. The stars become gape-jawed fans themselves.

Thus, while Pat Kennedy Lawford is not an actress, she is a celebrity's celebrity in Hollywood.

Supper Show

The dinner party - premiere will be held in the international ballroom of the Beverly Hilton Hotel where one enormous wall will be transformed into a motion picture screen. Diners will remain seated at their tables for the showing.

It is the first time in Hollywood annals that first-nighters will see a movie from the convenience of the dinner table.

But that is hardly the point. If there is a good showing of Kennedy's it is a safe bet that more eyes will be glued to the table of honor than to the movie screen—even at \$100 per head.

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The new rates, which went into effect March 22, include a block of 540 kilowatt-hours at just 1¢ per KWH. This is of particular benefit to water heating customers, although equally available for any use you may wish.
