SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI)—Track and field dominates today's program in the Pan-American Games with the United States favored to win gold medals in three of six events.

One Yank Representative

Candy Spots Ranked Tops

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—A field of eight shaped up for the 89th running of the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs on Saturday with Candy Spots, the oddity marked colt from California, a strong favorite to win America's greatest horse race.

Seattle took a fast 3-0 lead in the first period and was ahead 3-0 before Orland Kurtenback scored for San Francisco late in the second period.

After the crowd demonstrated loudly when referee Jerry Oliniski nullified another Seattle tally, the Totems proved that it didn't make any difference by scoring four more times in the last frame.

Veteran Lefty Wins Fourth By Downing Milwaukee 2-1

Take all those reports that Curt Simmons was washed up, wring thoroughly and then hang them out to dry.

Someone apparently made out the wrong laundry ticket on the 33-year-old St. Louis Cardinals southpaw.

Simmons underwent the first crisis of his career when he mangled two toes on his left foot while mowing his front lawn in 1953.

Some felt he was through when he was sent back to the minors in 1959 and most experts were sure of it when he drew his unconditional release in 1960 after 13 seasons with the Phillies.

But along comes this same Simmons with his fourth straight victory Tuesday night and pitches the Cardinals into first place in the National League by beating the Milwaukee Braves, 2-1.

The veteran left-hander no longer owns the blazing fast ball that brought him a \$65,000 bonus from the Phils 16 years ago but he still has enough stuff to make the Cards happy they signed him as a free agent three seasons back.

Allows Four Hits
Simmons limited the Braves to four hits and fanned eight in going the distance for the fourth time. His current 4-0 start is in keeping with his break from the barrier last year when he won his first five straight games.

Bothered by arm trouble down through the years, Simmons was hardly bothered at all by the Braves as he turned in the 14th victory of his major league career.

Frank Bolling tagged him for a first inning homer, after which Simmons held the Braves hitless until the seventh. The Cards had no easy time either with 24-year-old Denny Lemaster, who also

struck out eight and allowed four hits during the seven innings he pitched.

They scored their first run off him in the fourth and Julian Javier's homer in the fifth proved to be the clincher.

Rain threw a damper on the major league schedule for the second straight night, washing out four other scheduled National League contests.

Angels Beat Yankees
In the AL games that were played, the Los Angeles Angels beat the New York Yankees, 6-3, and the Minnesota Twins defeated the Baltimore Orioles, 8-1.

Ken McBride of the Angels had a no-hitter going against the Yankees for six innings but still needed help when the Inners rallied for two runs in the ninth.

Second baseman Billy Moran, back in the lineup after a four-day layoff due to an ankle injury, drove in two of the Angels' runs with a home run and a double while Leon Wagner accounted for two more with a pair of singles.

Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris playing together for the first time this season, each collected one hit and that was during the ninth inning rally. McBride yielded five of the Yankees' seven hits in winning his second game. Ex-Dodger Stan Williams was charged with his first defeat after being ruled out in the fifth.

Bob Allison and Zoilo Versalles each collected a pair of doubles in the Twins' 14-hit attack against the Orioles. Minnesota built a 3-1 lead off loser Steve Barber (4-2), then rallied for five runs at the expense of reliever Dick Hall in the eighth.

Camilo Pascual, who lost his first three games of the season, posted his second victory. He gave up 11 hits and aided his own cause by driving in two runs with a pair of singles.

New York Knickerbockers Land Harkness, Art Heyman

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Knickerbockers have taken measures toward quitting the National Basketball Association cellar by landing blue-ribboned catches Art Heyman of Duke and Jerry Harkness of Loyola's NCAA champions in the annual college draft.

Heyman and Harkness, both All-Americans and natives of the New York area, were two of 63 collegians selected by the NBA clubs Tuesday in one of the latest draft round-ups in league history.

The teams went through seven rounds before calling it quits. The Knicks, with the worst record in the league last season, had first crack at the pickings and selected Heyman of Rocville Centre, N.Y. Harkness, of the Bronx, was on tap when the second round opened and the Knicks promptly nabbed the 6-2 star.

Coach Ed Donovan of the Knicks rated Harkness good defensively and a player who rarely takes a bad shot.

Player Of Year
Donovan then heaped praise on the 6-5 Heyman, the United Press International college Player of the Year for 1963.

"He's a fine playmaker, as well as a shooter," Donovan chortled with enthusiasm. "He should fit right into our backcourt."

The Cincinnati Royals were the only club to exercise its territorial draft rights, selecting All-American Tom Thacker of the University of Cincinnati and thus giving up their regular first round draft.

The Zephyrs, whose franchise was shifted from Chicago to Baltimore for the 1963-64 campaign, drafted Rod Thorn of West Virginia in the first round. San Francisco then picked Nate Thurmond, 6-11 Bowling Green center, and Detroit chose Eddie Miles of Seattle University.

St. Louis grabbed Jerry Ward of Boston College and Syracuse claimed Tom Hoover of Villanova, whose college class became eligible for the draft this year.

Lakers Pick Strickland
Los Angeles, Western Division champion, picked up Roger Strickland, a small college All-American from Jacksonville (Fla.) University, and NBA champion Draft wound up the first round with Bill Green of Colorado State University.

Denver Lodges Protest After Loss To Seattle

Denver manager Jack Tighe was up in arms today over his team's 7-6 loss to the Seattle Rainiers.

Tighe lodged a formal protest of the game on grounds that R. G. Smith, a Seattle reliever, did not officially pitch to one man when called from the bullpen in the ninth inning of last night's game at Denver. Rules state that a pitcher must face at least one batter.

Seattle manager Mel Parnell brought in R. G. Smith when relief pitcher George Spencer had a 3-2 count on Denver's Eddie Haas. Smith threw one pitch and walked Haas, but the walk was officially credited to Spencer.

Then Parnell brought in Pete Smith to replace R. G. Smith and Tighe issued his protest.

Seattle's Don Giles socked a two-run homer in the second inning to knot the game at 3-3. After Seattle had gone ahead 7-3 in the fifth, Denver bounced back again on J. W. Porter's three-run homer. The Rainiers' winning run was scored on a double, passed ball and sacrifice fly.

In other games last night, Salt Lake City took over sole possession of first place in the southern division by dumping San Diego 7-5 for the Bees' fifth win in a row over the Padres. Outfielder Brax Bailey of San Diego dropped a pop fly to allow two Bees runs to score in a four-run seventh inning.

The Spokane Indians squeezed out of last place in the Northern Division by rallying for two runs in the bottom of the ninth inning to edged Dallas-Fort Worth 4-3. Catcher Mike Brumley doubled with two out to drive in the winning run.

Bob Garibaldi allowed only three hits in pitching Tacoma to a 6-2 win over Oklahoma City. His batterymate, Bobby Barton, hit a solo homer as did Hal Smith for Oklahoma City. Oklahoma City committed five errors but only one figured in Tacoma's scoring.
