

Crunican Shatters Standard In 880

Roseburg's Mike Crunican and Oakland's Bill Fredericks climbed to the ranks of the leading track performers in the state as a result of sterling performances Wednesday at Finlay Field.

Crunican shattered the Roseburg school 880 record set by Art Backlund 15 years ago. The Indian covered his two laps in 1:57.5 to topple the old mark of 1:59.3 set by Backlund in 1948.

In grabbing the school record, Crunican now holds the marks in both distance events as he recorded a 4:24.4 mile at Medford last week. In the 880 Crunican jumped

to third in the state, with Jim Price of South Salem leading with a 1:54.8 run Tuesday. In the mile Crunican has the fourth fastest time in the state.

Fredericks bettered his season's best by an inch and a quarter in the high jump—clearing the bar at 6-2 1/4. However, he remained in third place among the state's high jumpers, with Bob Shepard of

Grants Pass soaring 6-4 1/4 Tuesday to take over the top spot. Wednesday's jump was the third of the season over the six foot mark for Fredericks.

As far as the team action was concerned Wednesday, the host Indians ran off with top honors. The Tribe thincads racked up a total of 71 points, followed by the Myrtle Creek Vikings with 31, Oakland's Oakers with 11 and Camas Valley's Hornets with 9.

The Indians captured eight first places, Myrtle Creek won three, Oakland two and Camas Valley one. Crunican, in addition to setting a record in the 880, tied with teammate Gary McClung in the mile. Other victors for the Indians included Ron Leep with a 21.9 in the low hurdles; Larry Helbling with a javelin toss of 144 feet; Jesse Hart with a discus throw of 130 feet; Doug DuFresne with a heave of 45-4 1/2 in the shot; Bob Burgess with a leap of 18-7 1/2 in the broad jump; and Tom Dodge with an 11 foot pole vault.

Myrtle Creek's Ross Barkhurst was the lone clear double winner of the meet as he captured firsts in the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Barkhurst was clocked at 10.5 in the 100 and 22.3 in the 220. He was also a member of the Viki's winning relay team.

Oakland's other first was won by Jim Archer with a 53.7 in the 440, while Camas Valley's lone winner was Bob Lawson with a 16 second run in the high hurdles.

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Seattle Nears WHL Crown With 3-1 Win

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Coach Keith Allen of the Seattle Totems took nothing for granted today though his team needed only one more victory over the San Francisco Seals to clinch the Western Hockey League's Lester Patrick Trophy.

"We haven't won the fourth game yet and I have seen some play-off where a team took the first three and still got beaten," Allen said last night after the Totems defeated the Seals 3-1 and took a similar margin in the best-of-seven series.

The sextets faceoff again at the Cow Palace tonight and Allen warned that the Seals remained "a good club with the advantage of playing on its home ice."

The entire final playoffs are being held at the Cow Palace as the Totems first were evicted from their home arena by the Ice Follies and then a revival.

Goalender Al Millar registered 39 stops and had great back-checking assistance as the Totems skated to a routing triumph. San Francisco did not score until 11:37 of the final period and that tally was made by Len Haley during a goal-mouth scramble.

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI)—United States athletes, pausing only briefly to cheer spectacular upset victories in the 10,000-meter run and the decathlon, expect today to win Pan American gold medals in the pentathlon and fencing in addition to setting up a triumph in basketball.

With 76 gold medals already accumulated, Uncle Sam's athletes are a good bet to equal or surpass the Pan American record of 120 gold medals won at Chicago four years ago.

Holds Team Lead
The United States is favored to start off the day by taking two gold medals in the pentathlon, can add more in the individual sabre fencing finals this afternoon and then figures to cap the day with a victory over Mexico in its next-to-last game in the basketball tournament. A U.S. basketball victory tonight will set up a "gold medal game" with Brazil, which also is unbeaten in the tournament.

The U.S. goes into today's fifth and final event of the pentathlon—the 4,000-meter cross country run—holding the team lead and running one-two in the individual competition.

At the end of four events, the U.S. team held the lead with 10,926.76 points followed by Brazil with 10,297.64 and Mexico with 10,140.32. In the individual standings, Richard Stoll of Ft. Sam Houston, Tex., was first with 3,783.30 points with Robert Beck of Boston second with 3,697.32.

Jose Wilson of Brazil, who set a world pentathlon record in the 300-meter swimming Wednesday, was third with 3,685.88 points and Jim Moore of Ft. Sam Houston was fourth with 3,445.88.

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Invaders Explode For Five In Fifth Frame To Post Win

Bobbles proved the downfall of the Roseburg Indians Wednesday in a non-league diamond duel with the Reedsport Braves.

The Indians committed eight errors, including four in the disastrous fifth that saw the Braves push across five runs to post a 7-4 triumph.

Going into the fifth the Indians enjoyed a 4-1 advantage. After Reedsport had opened with a single run in the first, the Indians bounced back to take a 2-1 lead at the end of a full inning of play.

Roseburg's two runs in the first came on two hits and a sacrifice fly. Jon Burnham led off with a single and Lance Casebeer followed with a towering triple. Casebeer scored after tagging up on Bob Manning's outfield fly.

The tribe added a single in the second when Bruce Wassom circled the bases to third on a three-base error. Wassom scored on a passed ball.

Manning socked his second home run of the season to account for the final run for the Indians in the third.

The invading A-2 team came up with what proved to be the winning rally in the fifth. Don Evans walked before Jerry Boucock took over for the local crew. Boucock picked a runner off first, then issued a walk.

John Furman singled to load the bases and an error on a double play ball hit by Jerry Newport allowed two runs to score. Jim Goins followed with a slashing triple to add two more runs and send the Braves ahead by one.

Wayne Larson singled Goins home as the Braves proved deadly. Reedsport added a single insurance tally in the top of the seventh.

Dan Rohde went the distance for the invaders to get credit for the victory. Rohde gave up eight hits, with most of Roseburg's power being displayed in the early innings. After his shaky start, Rohde settled down and set the Indians down without a run in the final five frames.

Coach Bill Harper used three pitchers. Evans started and lasted until the middle of the fifth inning explosion when Boucock came on. Boucock was tagged with the loss. Gary Heeter pitched the final inning.

Catcher Jim Beamer topped the Roseburg batsmen with two hits in four trips to the plate.

A slight change in the scheduling will give the Indians a chance to gain back some of their lost prestige Friday when the North Bend Bulldogs come to town for a pair of Sub-District 5-A-1 counters. The league twin-bill had originally been set for Saturday, with Medford playing at Roseburg Friday. The change was made in order to get the remaining league games and make-up games in before the scheduled opening of the District 5-A-1 playoffs.

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
