

Goldwater Sees Political Obscurity For Dick Nixon

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., Thursday night predicted former Republican Vice President Richard M. Nixon would fade into political obscurity by moving to New York.

"He will speak as Republican and we will welcome him," Goldwater said. "But political precedent shows that he will not be able to be a strong force in our party."

Nixon, defeated last fall in his bid for governor of California, announced Thursday he was joining a Manhattan law firm.

"If he went for his own personal good," Goldwater said, "I can't blame him. I can't imagine a better place than New York for a lawyer with his background."

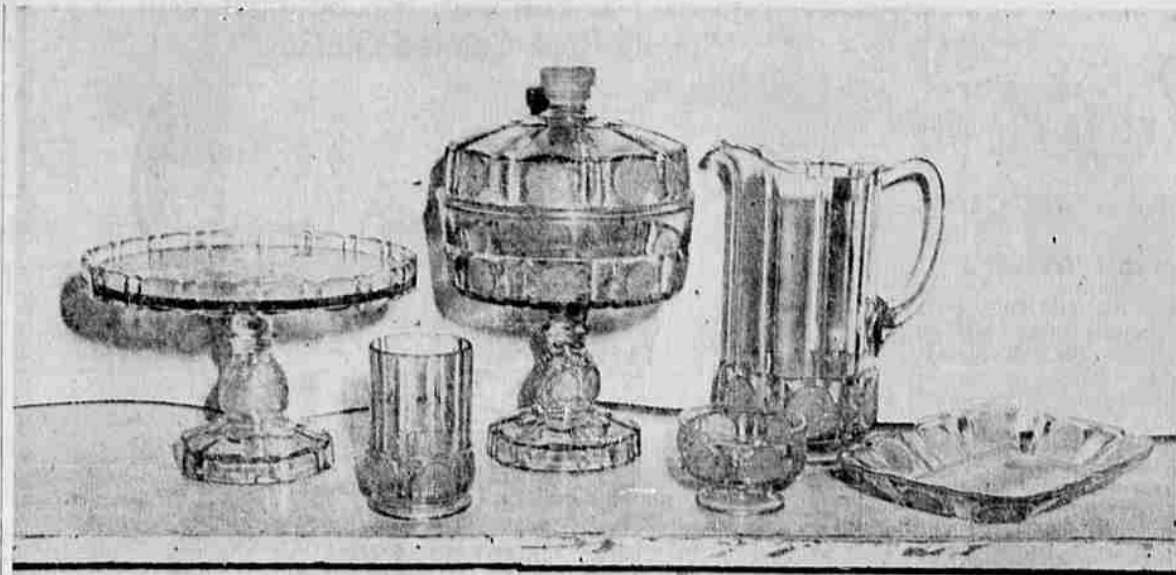
"But as far as speaking on a policy-making level, I believe

precedent shows he will not be a leader."

Goldwater was here as featured speaker at the 15th annual Forest Lawn Foundation writing awards banquet. As far as his future is concerned, Goldwater told a news conference it would not be possible for him to run on the same ticket with New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, no matter who the presidential nominee is.

"This is not possible," he said. "For example, I might be speaking in Chicago against Medicare and he would be speaking in California at the same time in favor of the issue."

Coin Club To View Glass Collection

A major feature at the Sunday meeting of the Umpqua Coin Club will be the showing of a collection of pressed glass.

The pressings in the glass were made with representations of coins. Many objects were made with this pattern and most of the coin representations are dated 1892 in anticipation of the Columbian Exposition. Some, however, are known with dates as early as 1878. Pattern displays coins in bottoms of tumblers and as rows of bosses on other hollow wares. The display has an estimated value of \$1,000.

The Umpqua Valley Coin Club is scheduled to meet at 1:30 p.m. in the Umpqua Hotel.

Club President Clive Stevenson urged all members to attend, but said a special invitation is being extended to junior members and friends who are interested in coin collecting.

He also asked all persons having old coins to donate to the Cancer Fund to do so. He asked that they be contained in envelopes, with name and address of the donor and be left at the desk at the hotel.

These coins will be auctioned off, and all proceeds will be turned over to the Douglas County Cancer Fund.

Death Penalty Bill Postponed In State House

SALEM (UPI)—Action on anti-death penalty bills was postponed by a House committee Thursday to await the outcome of Monday's House consideration of a new state constitution.

The anti-death penalty measures already have won Senate approval.

The proposed new constitution retains the death penalty.

The House Constitutional Revision Committee, which heard the death penalty measures Thursday, postponed action to Tuesday to determine if amendments would be necessary so that if the voters rejected capital punishment the prohibition could be applied to either the present or to the proposed new constitution.

A constitutional change and a proposed change in statutes are included in the anti-death penalty package.

The constitutional change would make the penalty for first degree murder life in prison.

15-year Minimum
The statute change would require confinement for at least 15 years, and lifetime supervision under parole.

The Senate conducted extensive public hearings on both measures. The proposed constitutional change was approved 25-3, the statute revision 24-6.

Sen. Don Willner, D - Portland, was the principal witness at Thursday's hearing.

"Will you let the people vote on this issue?" he pleaded.

Willner went over testimony before the Senate committee and pointed out that the death penalty was not a deterrent, there was the possibility of error, and that capital punishment "brutalizes society."

Rep. Edward Elder, R-Eugene, former Lane County sheriff, argued that the death penalty was a deterrent to murder.

He said he believed courts appointed competent defense attorneys in death cases. He was replying to a charge that only the poor who could not hire good legal help were sent to the gas chamber.

Mark Signs Bill To Control Cats

SALEM (UPI)—A bill authorizing counties to set up programs for control of stray cats was signed into law Thursday by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

The bill contains a clause requiring cats to be held and cared for for 10 days in case owners are looking for them.

The measure was supported chiefly by legislators from Jackson County, who said stray cats have become a serious problem.

The bill was the subject of considerable kidding before the legislature passed it.

Speaker From Ghana Heard At AAUW Joint Meeting

The Roseburg branch of the American Association of University Women was entertained at a luncheon meeting recently by the Myrtle Creek branch, and the combined groups heard a talk by Aaron Akom of Kumasi, Ghana, Africa, guest speaker for the event. The joint meeting was held at the Tri-City First Presbyterian Church, Hazel March, publicity chairman, reports.

Like Oregon
In his talk, Akom said "Oregon reminds me of Ghana," explaining that Ghana is rated as the "timber capital" of Africa and that his country is comparable in size to Oregon. Its political system, he stated, is based on that of the United States.

Following a description of various phases of life in Ghana, Akom opened the meeting to questions from the audience. Questioning brought out that text books and tuition are free for grades one to ten and for those attending colleges and universities. High school students pay tuition, he said. Also noted was the fact that Moslems comprise 56 per cent of the population and are free to practice polygamy although encouraged to follow the customs of the remaining population, which is largely Christian.

Influence Wanes
The Russian influence is waning he said, and further stated that the missionaries from America and European countries are highly esteemed and an accepted influence in the country's development. Industries are growing and an increasing number of women are being employed, it was brought out.

Following Akom's talk, the Roseburg contingent held a brief business meeting which included election of officers for 1963-64. Mrs. Lee O. Hunt, who is presently filling out the unexpired term of Mrs. Gerhard Eckman, was elected

president. Esther Dyar was elected corresponding secretary and Mrs. James Waterfield recording secretary. Mrs. Hunt gave a report on her attendance as a delegate to the state convention held last week in Gearhart, at which she was named state historian.

Announcement was made that the Roseburg executive board will meet May 16 at the home of George Clark.

Cordova Business District Destroyed

CORDOVA, Alaska (UPI)—A cleared a disaster area. pile of steaming ashes was all that remained of the heart of this little fishing community today. Nearly 80 per cent of the main business district was destroyed Thursday in the worst fire in Cordova's history.

No lives were lost but 150 persons living in apartments in the downtown area were left homeless.

Gov. William A. Egan was in contact with federal officials to have the community of 1,200 de-

clared a disaster area. Civil Defense Director Don Low placed the first official estimate of damages at \$1 million but unofficial estimates were put at \$2 million.
