

Musial Ties Ruth Extra Base Mark

Old man Musial ain't what he used to be but he's not yet ready to throw aside his bat in favor of a rocking chair in the sun. Stan the Man, now 42, got off to a slow start with the St. Louis Cardinals this season after no less an authority than Branch Rickey had suggested he might be excess baggage for the team to carry. Manager Johnny Keane, however, closed his ears to the advice and waited for Musial to supply his own answer.

That the Man did Thursday night with a three-run, seventh-inning double that lifted the Cardinals to a 4-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs and increased their National League lead to two games. The double enabled Musial to tie Babe Ruth's major league record of 1356 extra base hits and also raised his career RBI total to 1,901.

"He was a .250-hitter (10 hits in 40 tries this season) when he went to the plate," remarked Keane in the dressing room. "I figured he was just the .250-hitter we needed in that spot."

Tacoma Cops Pair In PCL

The Tacoma Giants shared first place with the Seattle Rainiers in the northern division of the Pacific Coast League today after getting a nifty pitching performance from southpaw Danny Rivas.

Tacoma took a doubleheader from Oklahama City, 11-1 and 1-0, last night for its fourth and fifth wins in a row.

Longball hitting by Jim Hart and catcher Bob Barton gave the Giants an easy win in the abbreviated opener. The Rivas allowed only four hits in shutting out the 89ers in the nightcap. It was Rivas' third consecutive win without a loss.

Barton banged a three-run homer and Hart tripled across two more runs to highlight Tacoma's seven-run explosion in the first inning of the opener. Hart went 4-4 in the first game and drove in the only run in the nightcap with an infield single.

In other games, Seattle dropped its second in a row at Denver, 7-2. Dallas-Fort Worth scored all its runs in the ninth to beat Spokane 5-2 and San Diego buried the Salt Lake City Bees 18-5.

Rain and wet grounds forced postponement of an Hawaii at Portland doubleheader for the third night in a row.

Denver, trying desperately to climb out of the southern division cellar, tallied six runs in the first inning against the Rainiers. Big hits in the inning were Don Tausig's three-run homer and Elhan Blackaby's four-bagger. Ray Withrow also belted a solo homer for Denver in the fifth.

Test Sedowski of Dallas-Fort Worth and Howie Reed of Spokane had hooked up in a brilliant pitcher's duel for the first eight innings.

Reed had allowed only one hit—a second-inning bloop single—going into the ninth.

Joe Christian led off the ninth for the Texans with a single. Pinchhitter Salvy Valdespino then hit a home run to start the five-run uprising and had a disappointing Reed his first defeat. He has one win.

Nicklaus Hot With 64 Sets Champs' Pace

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—The 27-man race for the \$13,000 first place jackpot in golf's Tournament of Champions shaped up today as a two-man battle between Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer after only one round of play.

Nicklaus, the 23-year-old National Open and Masters champion, fashioned a great, eight-under-par 64 Thursday to take a two-stroke lead over Palmer.

Only Bill Collins of Grossinger, N.Y., appeared in a position to give the two golfing greats a run for the money. Collins had a fine 67, one shot behind Palmer.

The rest of the field was at least six shots behind Nicklaus with little chance of shooting for anything except second or third place in this \$60,000 tournament.

Spectacular Performance

"That 64 equalled the finest round I've ever shot as a pro," said Nicklaus. "That seems to be about as good as I can do."

It was a spectacular performance for the record opening-day crowd of 9,000 on the sun-kissed Desert Inn Country Club course.

The former Ohio State athlete, now playing out of Tucson, Ariz., did just about everything right. He had only one bogey. He had an eagle and seven birdies. He missed only one green all day.

The par five holes on this course average about 525 yards, but he was hitting irons to get home on his second shot on all but one of them.

The 64 cracked a record of 65 that was held by four men—and it may stand for a long time because the weather conditions never will be better than they were for this one. There was very little wind and the temperature reached 90.

Nicklaus had only 30 putts. And he almost got a hole-in-one on the fourth, missing by five inches.

Palmer was just about as good as Nicklaus. He hit every green, but took 33 putts to get his 66. Collins hit 17 greens and took 30 putts.

Behind the three leaders came four men tied at 70—Johnny Pott, Bill Casper, Doug Sanders and Bo Winger.

Whitey Ford's Ailing Arm Comes Through As Yank's Lefty Blanks LA Angels 7-0

It won't require any kind of medical knowledge to establish that all is well with Whitey Ford's left arm.

It's also just as basic to baseball fans that they'll have to find another excuse if they expect the New York Yankees to lose the pennant.

Ford, a clever lefthander with a pixieish sense of humor, was bothered by arm trouble part of last season and he still wasn't feeling right when the current campaign started as he lost his first two games. Yankee batters were quick to point out that a broken-down Ford would cause the world champions to run out of gas.

The Yankees were rolling on a full tank Thursday when Ford threw a four-hit shutout at the Los Angeles Angels in a 7-0 victory. Ford, who after the game said his arm felt stronger than at any time since the 1951 World Series, now has a string of 16 scoreless innings during which he has yielded just six hits.

Indians Shellack A's

The Kansas City Athletics fell from first place in the American League after taking a 15-6 shellacking from the Cleveland Indians; the Washington Senators outgassed the Detroit Tigers, 9-1; the Baltimore Orioles beat the Chicago White Sox, 8-7, in a night game; and a scheduled day contest at Minnesota between the Twins and Boston Red Sox was postponed by rain.

In the National League, the St. Louis Cardinals remained in first place by edging the Chicago Cubs, 4-3; the San Francisco Giants topped the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-1; the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2; the Milwaukee Braves whitewashed the Cincinnati Reds, 8-0; and in the lone day contest the New York Mets romped over the Houston Colts, 10-3.

Ford's victory was an important one for the Yankees, who had lost two straight in Los Angeles and were threatened with a drop to the second division. After five scoreless innings, New York broke the game wide open in the sixth on a bases-loaded walk and a grand-slam homer by Joe Pepitone. Two more runs followed in the seventh, one of which came in on a Pepitone single.

Pepitone's homer was his fifth of the season, a club high, and the young first baseman also tops the Yankees in runs-batted-in with 11.

Held Hits Grand Slam

Woody Held cracked a grand slam homer to pace the Indian assault and rookie Vic Davallito contributed a homer and a double. Cleveland bombarded four Kansas City pitchers for 18 hits, including four by Tito Francona, to overcome an early 4-1 deficit. Reliever Barry Latman gained his first victory of the season and Dave Wickersham was charged with his first loss against one win.

First baseman Bobo Osborne, sold by the Tigers to Washington earlier this year, came back to haunt his old teammates with a pair of home runs as Detroit veteran Frank Lary could last only four innings in another comeback attempt. The Tigers got 14 hits off Claude Osteen and Jim Bronstad but stranded 12 runners. It was Bronstad's first success in three decisions and Lary now is 0-2.

Brooks Robinson broke a bad batting slump with a bases-loaded single in the ninth inning as the Orioles erupted for three runs to edge the White Sox. Chicago had a 7-2 lead after four innings and seemed safe behind the strong serves of Juan Pizarro, but Baltimore retaliated with two in the fifth and then narrowed the deficit to 7-5 on Bob Johnson's first home run in the eighth inning. Reliever Dean Stone was the beneficiary of the late rally for his first win and Gary Peters was charged with his second straight loss.

Hornets Defending

Camas Valley is the defending District 4-B champion, and the Hornets finished second in the state last year. However, the Hornets' domination of the local B meets will be seriously threatened by strong teams from Powers, Canyonville and CBA as they lost super-star Jim McGinnis through graduation. McGinnis won both the 100 and 220-yard dashes at last year's state meet.

Several defending district champions will be on hand attempting to qualify for the District 4-B meet in each event Saturday will qualify for the district finals.

Oakland's Bill Fredericks and Camas Valley's Bob Lawson appear to be the only thinclads that are virtually sure of qualifying.

Jumper Picked

Fredericks is a unanimous choice to capture the honor, in the high jump. The lanky Oaker has a best height of 6-2 1/4 to his credit and ranks as the third best high jumper in the state.

Last year Fredericks captured the district title, then tied for third in the state meet with a disappointing jump of 5-6.

Another Oakland star, Jim Archer, will be the only state champion back in action. Archer won the 440-yard run at the state meet with a :52.6 clocking. To date Archer's best time for this season is :53.7.

Bob Lawson, winner of the district 880 title last year with a 2:07.8, has a best this year of 2:03.2. This time is far below the district record. Bob Lawson is also favored in the high hurdles with a :15.8 to his credit and is a strong threat in the broad jump with a leap of 19-1.

Top battles shape up in most of the events, with the shot put promising to be one of the most thrilling. Canyonville's Ron Kippers heads the list of shot putters with a heave of 45.8, while Elktion's Duane Schultz has a best of 45-6 1/2. Jon Lamoreaux and Steve Ray, both of Oakland, have tosses of 43-11 and 40-8 respectively.

Strong In Javelin

In the javelin competition Canyonville's Fred Grunst is favored as he has the only throw over 170 feet. Grunst has tosses of 170-3 and 188-5 1/2 to his credit. Teammate Loren Powell is the defending district champ, while Yoncalla's Richard Wales has a throw of 168-2.

The pole vault shapes up as a duel between Bud Olsen of Canyonville, Gary Brooks of Elktion and Mike Sewell of Powers. Olsen and Brooks tied for second last year at the district meet and have bests of 11-0 and 10-9 this year. Olsen tied for second at the state meet.

Mother's Day 1959. Bob Feller made special arrangements for his mother to see him pitch a game. He brought her to Chicago from the farm in Iowa so she could see her son pitch in a Major League game for the first time. Early in the game, Feller hurled a fast ball to one of the White Sox players, who fouled it into the stands. Out of the 45,000 people in the park, that foul ball found Feller's mother, struck her on the head, knocking her unconscious. Badly injured, she was taken to the hospital. It turned out to be the oddest present any pitcher ever gave to his mother on Mother's Day.
