Yanks Get 11 Gold Medals In Pan-Am Games Thursday

SÃO PAULO, Brazil (UPI) — United States athletes, who are making a shambles of the Pan-American Games with an avalanche of gold medals, get a chance to add to the pile today in track and field, basketball and boxing.

The Yanks picked up 11 gold medals Thursday in sweeping the modern pentathlon. The men's and women's gymnastics and the team title in epee fencing. That boosted their gold medal collection to 87 and with anticipated victories in today's events, the United States should be within striking distance of the record 120 gold medals won at the last Pan-American Games four years ago in Chicago.

There are six track and field finals on today's program, in which the United States is expected to win at least four gold medals. Add to that the boxing finals in each weight division plus title games in both men's and women's basketball—both against Brazil—and it clearly shapes up as a runaway for Yank stars.

Thus far Americans have won eight of the 11 track and field events—three less than originally anticipated. Today, Yank men stars compete in the high hurdles, broad jump and the hammer throw. Coach Lou Montgomery expects victory in all three events.

Ralph Boston of Laurel, Miss., the 1960 Olympic champ, and Darrell Horn of San Antonio, Tex., carry the U.S. colors in the broad jump. Willie May of Chicago, the silver medalist in the 1960 Olympics, and Blaine Lindgren of Salt Lake City, Utah, compete in the 110 meter high hurdles, and Al Hall of Greenfield, Mass., the defending games champion, and James Pryde of San Gabriel, Calif., are in the hammer throw.

The fourth men's final is the 20,000 meter walk in which Ron Zinn of Orland Park, Ill., and Ron Laird of Chicago are the American entries.

The two women's events are the high jump, in which Eleanor Montgomery of Cleveland and Estelle Backerville of Columbus, Ohio are entered, and the discus, with Cynthia Wyatt, the reigning U.S. indoor champion from Honolulu, and Sharon Shepherd of North Bend, Ore., the American entries. The U.S. expects to win both events.

In basketball, the United States is favored in both the men's and women's final, but it won't be

easy. The Brazilians clearly have shown they are capable of pulling off upsets and American officials are not taking them lightly.

Boxing is a different story. Two of three Americans shooting for final berths were eliminated on Tuesday and two others Thursday night, and the feeling is that the Yanks will be fortunate to win the two fights today in which they placed finalists.

Also on tap today are finals in saber, fencing, water polo and volleyball. The U.S. plays Canada in the water polo final and meets Brazil in the volleyball final. Both of these matches are rated toss-ups.

net power has captured three consecutive state team titles.

A change in plans for the state tournament May 10-11 at Corvallis means that only two singles players and two doubles combinations will qualify from each of the eight district tournaments this year. In past years three qualifiers have been selected from each district.

Invading the local courts to compete for the state berths up for grabs will be the teams from North Eugene, South Eugene, Springfield, Thurston, North Bend, Marshfield and Junction City. Any other

schools in the district (A-1, A-2 or B) with tennis teams are eligible to compete.

Top Record

The host Indians have the best dual meet record going into the tournament, but are not rated as "favorite" favorites. A tough battle for each of the state tournament is expected, and the final results could find each spot being filled by netters from different schools.

Springfield's Millers and South Eugene's Axemen are ranked at the top with the Indians. Roseburg has a 6-1 dual meet victory over the Millers and were leading in a second match when the rains forced a cancellation. The Millers have handed South Eugene its lone setback.

Among the top seeded singles aces in the tournament is Thurston's Larry Bates. Bates is undefeated. Other top stars from out of town includes Mike Moyer of South Eugene, Jim Moore and Dave Wright of Springfield and the Landes twins, Don and Ron, of Marshfield.

Lineup Set

Roseburg coach Al Hoffman announced a tentative lineup for the Indians for Saturday's action. The host team will enter three doubles teams and will field three singles entrants.

Mike and Don Harris will probably enter as the top rated Roseburg doubles duo. However, Hoffman said that he may split the twins up with Don going in singles. If this happens Brian Phillips will be teamed with Mike Harris.

Mike Hoffman, and Bob McKee will form another doubles combination for the Indians, while the team of Rick Ragan and Steve Pyle will be the third pair entered.

Competing for the singles crown will be Don Mulkey, Phillips and Mark Sohn.

Roseburg has a 6-1 record in dual meets this year, and were ahead 3-0 in another when rain forced the players to stop. The lone loss marring the record of the Tribe was to a powerful Medford team. The loss ruined Roseburg's bid for a fourth undefeated prep season.

Giants Face Mets Tonight In New York's Polo Grounds

NEW YORK (UPI)—That eastern air is breathing new life into the San Francisco Giants, who move into their old home stadium tonight to take on the surprising New York Mets.

The National League champions, able to win only six of 14 games at Candlestick Park this year, go into the Polo Grounds with a record of seven victories out of eight games on the road.

But manager Casey Stengel's Mets, the laughing stock of the league last season, have won six straight games at home—and would like to make it seven at the expense of the Giants.

Giant manager Alvin Dark has tabbed either Lott, Billy Pierce (1-2) or Billy O'Dell (2-0) for mound duties tonight. Stengel will go with Jay Hook (0-3) in the opener of the four-game series.

Juan Marichal and Felipe Alou teamed up yesterday to give San Francisco a 2-1 victory over Pittsburgh and a sweep of their two-game series with the Pirates.

Alou, leading the Giants in hitting with an average of .390, smashed a homer over the centerfield wall at Forbes Field with Jose Pagan on base to give San Francisco all the runs it needed.

Marichal mixed a fast ball with a sinking curve to limit the Pirates to five hits in winning his third game against two setbacks. He struck out seven.

Pittsburgh scored its only run off the 25-year-old right-hander in the sixth inning. Bob Skinner led off with a triple and scored on Roberto Clemente's infield out.

Marichal yielded a single and double in the second inning, but did not give up another hit until the sixth.

San Francisco Seals Blast Into Running For Hockey League Crown With 8-0 Win

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Just when the Seattle Totems seemed to have the Western Hockey League playoff title wrapped up, the San Francisco Seals called a red-necked meeting that didn't end until they were contenders once more for the crown.

"Hockey is too good a game for that kind of stuff," League President Al Leader warned afterward. "And I don't think that fight really helped to sell it."

Never Bend Second Choice In Kentucky Derby Running

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — "We have entered a period of desperation."

That was the way trainer Mesh Toney, who conditions favored Candy Spots for partner Rex Ellis, today described the last remaining hours before a field of nine goes to the post Saturday in the 88th running of the Kentucky Derby.

The serious work was over although the worry remained. Only a year ago, on the eve of the first of the triple crown classics, Sir Gaylord, the favorite, broke down and was confined to his stall when he decided to romp to glory in the record time of 2:00 2/5 for the mile and one-quarter.

The horses against which Candy Spots risks a perfect record of six wins in six races are: Cain Hoy Stable's Never Bend, Greentree Stable's No Robbery, Miss Patricia Jacobs' Bonjour, Darby Dan Farm's Chateaugay, Walnut Hill Farm's Gray Pet, Bernard J. Ridder's Royal Tower, and Joseph J. Cherock's Investor.

Never Bend, winner of more than \$500,000, was second choice at 5-2 against the 6-5 quoted on Candy Spots. No Robbery, another colt with an unbeaten record, was third choice at 3-1.

These are the "big three" of the 1963 edition of America's greatest horse race which boasts two undefeated starters for the

first time since Aristides won the inaugural running in 1875.

Down through the years seven unbeaten horses have started in the Derby. Only two of them emerged unscathed with Regret, the only filly ever to win, scoring in 1915 and Morvich bouncing home in 1922. But such horses as Native Dancer, Bimelech, Coal-town, Thunderer and Colonel Hogan tasted defeat for the first time in the Rose Run.

There was little left for the trainers to do until it is time on Saturday to lift their jockeys into the saddle to the strains of "My Old Kentucky Home."

Toney planned to gallop Candy Spots today to keep the colt on edge. No Robbery, Chateaugay and Royal Tower also were scheduled for "blowout" and the others probably will get them on Saturday morning.
