

School Director Elections Slated In All Districts

All school districts in Douglas County Monday will select at least one school board member, and several districts in the northern part of the county will name a Rural School District board member.

The rural school district board member will be selected from Zone A, which includes Gardiner, Drain, Yoncalla, Elkton, Reedsport and Ash Valley. As usual the field is slim. The only candidate is Frank White of Gardiner, who is the incumbent. Voting in all districts will take place between 2 and 8 p.m. Monday.

Outlook Fine For Saturday Mail Rescue

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Prospects appeared bright today that the nation will get its mail on Saturdays as usual next year.

The Senate Appropriations Committee, coming to the post office's rescue Friday, restored \$50 million of the \$69.8 million the House had chopped out of the department's request for operating funds for the fiscal year starting July 1.

A Post Office spokesman said that if the \$50 million gets through Congress, it will be just barely enough to get along without halting Saturday deliveries and a number of other services. The money bill goes to the Senate floor in about 10 days, and then to a House-Senate conference committee to work out a final bill for action by both houses. The Senate generally goes along with its Appropriations Committee's recommendations.

The Post Office Department had said it could avoid cutting mail service if the Senate restored a substantial part of cuts made by the House. If not, Saturday mail deliveries might have to be stopped, as well as deliveries to all new buildings, or there might be no delivery of third-class mail in the first week of each month.

The Post Office already has stopped hiring new employees until June 30 because the House cut more than \$8 million in supplemental appropriations for the rest of the current fiscal year.

A department aide said this ban is still in force. As a result, to cope with the expected manpower shortage, the nation's 48 biggest post offices are expected to curtail mail deliveries to all new buildings until they are 90 per cent occupied.

Senator Says Task Force Will View Uses For Base

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., said Friday the White House planned to establish a special task force to examine every possible federal use for the Tongue Point Naval Station at Astoria.

But officials of the General Services Administration at Auburn, Wash., said they have not received word of cancellation of a scheduled public auction to sell the 800-acre base June 24.

GSA spokesmen said advertising to announce the sale would continue.

2 Indicted For Murder

BAKER (UPI) — The Baker County grand jury Friday indicted Jasper Worley, 39, Baker, on a charge of first degree murder and Dorrell Dotson, 50, Sumpter, on a charge of second degree murder.

Worley was charged in connection with the death of Benjamin Hopkins, 62, Baker, at Baker April 13. Hopkins was bludgeoned to death.

Dotson was accused in connection with the fatal shooting of Camillus Lawrence, 67, Sumpter, at Sumpter April 10.

Six Children Die In Indiana Blaze

ROCKVILLE, Ind. (UPI) — Fire swept through a home for mentally retarded children here Friday night, killing six children and injuring five others, one critically.

All of the dead were between 3 and 10 years of age.

The operators of the home were not present at the time of the fire, but said a "friend" had been caring for the children. Two teenage boys were also in the building along with the 11 younger children when the fire broke out.

Six injured children were rushed to the Vermillion County Hospital at Clinton, where one of them died today.

Rockville Fire Chief Bernard Lee said the fire apparently resulted from an explosion in an electric clothes dryer.

MASS MEETINGS HELD

Negroes Plan New Marches

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — Negroes were urged today to make this a "double D-Day" of racial demonstrations in a continuing drive to crack Birmingham's major segregation barriers.

Negro youths were called to three mass meetings (starting at noon EDT) to touch off fresh demonstrations. New marches were expected by 2 p.m. EDT.

More than 200 Negroes, including many children, were arrested Friday, bringing to approximately 1,000 the number put in jail

or juvenile homes in two days of demonstrations.

Claim 10 Persons Bitten

Negro leaders said about 10 persons were bitten by police dogs that were brought out on long leashes to push back Friday's demonstrators. Most of the injuries were minor and only one person was hospitalized.

"Yesterday was D-Day in Birmingham, let us make tomorrow double D-Day," integration leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. told a wildly cheering throng of more than 2,000 packed Friday night into the 16th Street Baptist Church.

The church, across the street from the park where fire hoses and dogs were turned on Negroes Friday, rocked for about three hours to the chants and hand-clapping cadence of "freedom" songs.

Asks Halt To Violence

King, introduced as the "black Moses of America," urged Negroes to halt all forms of violence, including rock throwing or use of profanity.

"We must meet physical force with non-violence for violence destroys everybody," King said. "An eye-for-an-eye philosophy leaves everybody blind."

King reacted strongly, however, to a statement by Attorney General Robert Kennedy suggesting that the all-out integration drive here was ill-timed.

"I grow weary of those who ask us to slow down," King told a reporter. "I begin to feel that the moderates in America are our worst enemy. They are the ones who assure success for groups like the Black Muslims."

Kennedy Urges Negotiations

The attorney general urged a cooling off period with white and Negro leaders negotiating differences in meetings "and not in the streets."

Birmingham's new mayor, Albert Boutwell, begged Negroes to

call off their show of pressure until a new and more moderate city government which he will head takes over the reins of government.

There was no indication that the advice of the two white leaders would be heeded.

At the rally, King recited again the integration movement's price for racial peace here: Desegregation of eating and other public places, job upgrading, dropping all charges against arrested demonstrators and appointment of a bi-racial committee that would work out a plan for school desegregation.

Coos Officials Rap Park Plan

Businessmen and officials from Coos County, Coos Bay and North Bend testified before a U.S. Senate Interior Subcommittee Friday and spoke out in opposition to any national seashore park that would include a section of the Oregon dunes north of Coos Bay that has been developed for industrial water supply and plant sites.

Tom O'Dwyer of North Bend told the senate group the National Park Service concept is incompatible with industrial uses and said loss of the industrial water for future forest products expansions would be a tragic blow to the communities.

Similar statements were made by others opposed to the plan of Sen. Maurine Neuberger to put the south boundary of the park near Coos Bay and the north boundary near Florence.

A Pacific Power & Light Co. spokesman questioned that any more industries would risk large capital investments in plants that would require water from inside the park. The power company urged the south boundary to be on Tennille Creek, such as proposed by U.S. Rep. Robert Duncan.

High Court Voids State's Vote Law

SEATTLE (UPI) — A three-judge federal court panel Friday ruled unconstitutional all Washington state laws pertaining to the election of legislators.

This means the lawmakers will have to run at-large if they do not meet in special session to reapportion the state's legislative districts. Gov. Albert D. Rosellini is the only one empowered to call a special session.

The only other alternative is to win an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Rosellini said in Wenatchee, shortly after hearing about the ruling, he has no intention of calling a special session at this time.

He said he felt the ruling should be appealed to a higher court.

Three Freida Sales Staged

The Umpqua National Forest conducted three more Freida salvage sales Friday, with a total volume of 11,270,000 board feet of timber going for \$248,588.50. Total appraisal on the three tracts had been \$223,834.50.

First was the Emer salvage sale, located on a 234-acre tract 26 miles northeast of Tiller. Included in the sale was 4,300,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$21.45 per thousand and 1 million feet of incense cedar and other species appraised at \$7 per thousand. Total appraisal on the 5,300,000 feet of timber was \$99,235.

High bidder was Oregon Veneer Co. of White City with a bid of \$7.05 on the incense cedar and other species and the appraised price on the Douglas fir and pine. Other bidders were National Plywood, Inc., and Roseburg Lumber Co., both of Roseburg.

The second sale was on the Buck blowdown area, a 191-acre tract 29 miles northeast of Tiller. A total of 4,300,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine was appraised at \$21.80 and 700,000 feet of white fir and other species was appraised at \$11.50. Total appraised price was \$101,790.

High bidder was Oregon Veneer Co. with a bid of \$26.50 on the Douglas fir and pine and the appraised price on the other species. Total sale price was \$122,000. Other bidders were Fitzgerald Logging Co., National Plywood, Inc., and Roseburg Lumber Co., all of Roseburg.

The third sale was the Hutch salvage sale on 284 acres located 10 miles northeast of Tiller. A total of 840,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine was appraised at \$25.15 and 130,000 feet of white fir and other species was appraised at \$12.95. Total appraised price of the 970,000 feet of timber was \$22,809.50.

High bidder was Green Valley Lumber, Inc., of Myrtle Creek, with a bid of \$30.50 on the Douglas fir and pine and the appraised price on the other species, for a total bid of \$27,303.50. Other bidders were Enterprise Logging Co., Canyonville, Paul B. Hult Lumber Co., Dillard, and Oregon Veneer, Inc.

Additional Freida salvage sales are set for both Monday and Tuesday.
