Rocky's New Marriage Stirs Political Hassle

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and his bride began a two-week honeymoon at a sprawling family cattle ranch today, remote from the political controversy stirred by their marriage back home.

Rockefeller and the former Mrs. Margaretta Filler (Happy) Murphy settled down in relative isolation on the 14,000-acre ranch and potato farm 125 miles west of Caracas.

The newlyweds were overwhelmed by Venezuelans at an impromptu airport reception here Sunday when they arrived from New York. Later they flew by private plane to Rockefeller's ranch near Valencia.

"We came here for a honeymoon because we love Venezuela," the governor told the South Americans on hand to greet him at Caracas Airport.

GOP Starts Reappraisal

Back in Washington Republican leaders began reappraisal of their possible presidential candidates in light of Rockefeller's sudden remarriage Saturday. They found themselves in almost total disagreement about the political effects of the move.

Some felt the New York governor, who had been considered the strongest contender for the 1964 GOP presidential nomination, had committed political suicide by his marriage. Others said it would have no effect.

Rockefeller, 54, who was divorced last year by his wife of 21 years, married Mrs. Murphy, 36, in a quiet ceremony Saturday. The bride, a mother of four, divorced her husband, Dr. James R. Murphy, 35 days ago.

The ceremony at the Rockefeller estate at Pocantico Hills, N.Y., climaxed a romance nobody admitted but which had been whispered about in cafe society and hinted at in international society columns for months.

No Political Comment

Rockefeller himself refused to comment on his political future or the effect the marriage might have on his presidential aspirations. Before leaving Idlewild International Airport Sunday he told newsmen:

"I know that some of you would like to discuss politics. But

I don't think that this is the time or place for it. There will be time for that later."

Both the governor and Mrs. Rockefeller, an attractive brunette, beamed with apparent happiness during their stops en route to the ranch.

Jester Hairston Starts Rehearsals For Music Festival

Jester Hairston, Negro Spiritual arranger and actor of Los Angeles, began rehearsals today with Roseburg area high school choral groups in preparation for Tuesday night's Negro Spiritual Festival at the Roseburg High School gym.

Hairston spent the morning working with the Myrtle Creek and Douglas High School Chorus, and this afternoon with the Roseburg High School Choir and Girls' Glee Club. This evening he will rehearse with advanced chorus students from Fremont and Joseph L. and a Junior High.

Tuesday's rehearsal schedule will find Hairston working with Choir members from Oakland, Grants Pass, Cottage Grove, and Sutherlin High School, as well as appearing in an afternoon assembly at Roseburg High School and directing about 16 of his own compositions and arrangements in the public concert at 8 p.m. in the Roseburg High School gym.

Hairston's name is familiar to hundreds of Douglas County high school students who have sung his choral arrangements during the past 10 years. Roseburg High School choralists have journeyed to Eugene and Corvallis on four different occasions to take part in Hairston festivals, and the Douglas High School Choir traveled to Corvallis just a week ago for a festival at OSU's Gill Coliseum.

Movie fans have seen Hairston as a character actor in such recent films as "The Alamo" and "To Kill a Mockingbird."

Tickets for the Tuesday evening Negro Spiritual Festival will be available at the door.

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Solons Hear Pros, Cons On Dunes Seashore

Sen. Neuberger Says Boundaries Still Flexible

EUGENE (UPI) — A Senate Interior subcommittee Saturday heard testimony for and against Sen. Maurice Neuberger's proposed bill calling for a national seashore at the Oregon Dunes.

Sen. Lee Metcalf, D-Mont., chairman of the hearing, heard two hours of testimony from opponents, two hours of discussion and two hours from proponents.

Another hearing is scheduled in Washington, D.C. Wednesday on the proposed 42,000-acre park near Florence.

Mrs. Vera Springer, Sen. Neuberger's Portland representative, indicated at the outset of the hearing that the Democratic senator feels the boundaries of the proposed park are still flexible. Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Ore., has introduced a House bill with smaller proposed boundaries.

Mrs. Springer noted also the difference between national parks and national seashores, which she said is a point of misunderstanding.

She said national parks are set aside to preserve the beauty of an area and often do not offer maximum use or recreation. But, national seashores, she said, are set aside for maximum use.

Coos Bay Testimony

Businessmen and officials of Coos County and the cities of Coos Bay and North Bend testified they were opposed to a national seashore park that would include industrial sites and industrial water supply.

Tom O'Dwyer, North Bend, asserted the national seashore concept is not compatible with industrial use. He said loss of the water for future forest products industries could be a tragic blow to the communities.

Similar statements were placed in the hearing record by other opponents who object to a south park boundary near Coos Bay and the north boundary near Florence.

Support for the seashore came from Bend publisher Robert Chandler, former congressman Charles Porter of Eugene, and James Monte, Portland, chairman of the Committee for the Oregon Dunes.

"They (the dunes) are unique on the North American continent and they should be preserved," Chandler said.

Monte said Oregon lacks well rounded resort areas and the dunes could fill this need.

Dan Allen appeared for Gov. Mark Hatfield and the Oregon Natural Resources Board. He said the state favors federal development of the dunes and would be willing to turn over the property in the area.

TRAFFIC HAZARD

County Streams Start Rise After Heavy Sunday Rains

April was a big month for rain-fall, but May is starting out as if it were going to be even bigger.

Sunday, a deluge of rain gave the county more than 1 1/2 inches of precipitation in 24 hours. And more was promised today. The U.S. Weather Bureau station in Roseburg reports it expected more heavy rain today and tonight and continued rain for the next five days.

The streams of the county began rising rapidly after the Sunday rainfall, but there appeared to be no immediate danger of flooding. Some of the smaller streams, such as Deer Creek, crept out of their banks, but not enough to cause any threat.

Taking the dubious honor of having the most rainfall for the 24-hour period from 8 a.m. Sunday to 8 a.m. Monday was an area southwest of Riddle where 2.22 inches were recorded on the Water Resources Survey gauge.

A gauge northeast of Sutherlin recorded 2 inches. Roseburg had 1.45. This pushed the total far past normal for the month. Tiller had 1.5 inch pushing the total to 2.6 for the month, more than the entire total for May 1962.

Russian Claim Says Hitler's Body Found After End Of WWII

MOSCOW (UPI) — Fresh Soviet accounts of World War II may follow the Russians' claim that they recovered Adolf Hitler's burned body in Berlin at the end of the war, Western observers believed today.

It was disclosed Sunday that the Russians had broken 18 years of silence and said they found Hitler's body in his Berlin bunker when they smashed into the German capital.

The official Soviet position heretofore has been that the Nazi leader may have escaped and fled to Spain or Argentina.

The Soviet admission was made by Marshal Vasily Sokolovsky to Cornelius Ryan, American author, who recently completed a two-week study of top secret archives of the Red Army's final assault on Berlin. Ryan's research is for a new book.

"The Longest Day" Author

Ryan is the author of "The Longest Day," the D-Day story of the Allied invasion of France, June 6, 1944.

Ryan said in Paris on his arrival from Moscow that the Russians told him how they disposed of Hitler's body, but he refused to elaborate. He said "You'll have to read it in my book."

Western diplomats expressed surprise at the unprecedented Soviet effort to make secret military archives available to foreign researchers.

One possible explanation was that the Soviet leadership has been extremely resentful of Western accounts of the Soviet-German war, written almost exclusively from German sources. They now appear ready to make their own version available to Western scholars, especially in connection with

A Forest Service gauge at Wolf Creek Guard Station on Little River showed 1.66 inches of rain from 8 a.m. Sunday to 8 a.m. Monday and 1.34 inches from Friday to Sunday, according to Ray Armstrong of the Forest Service.

Brookings Doused By Heavy Rainfall

The southwest Oregon coastal town of Brookings was soaked by 5.88 inches of rain in the 24 hours ending at 4 o'clock this morning, the Weather Bureau reported.

The amount far overshadowed that which fell elsewhere, but Western Oregon had a wet weekend with an outlook of more rain to come.

No major damage was reported at Brookings although some roads in the area were water covered.

By contrast, Astoria on the north coast reported that .03 of an inch of rain during the same 24 hour period. North Bend got 1.93 and Newport 1.36 while inland Salem had 1.34 and Portland .86.

Eastern Oregon was comparatively dry, with only a trace of rain at Klamath Falls and Pendleton.

The five day outlook called for continued damp conditions with more than normal rain on both sides of the Cascades.

Ridge Rattlesnakes Meet Violent Deaths

The rattlesnakes on a rocky mountain ridge between Swamp and Woodford creeks, about 2 1/2 miles south of the Glendale Junction, should learn to take cover and slither for their lives when they hear the name, "Smith," reports Mrs. G. B. Fox, correspondent.

Last year, Chester Smith Jr., together with his father and uncle and a group of high school students, blasted out a total of 47 snakes on the ridge about this time of the year.

This time, in the same spot, Smith Sr. and Wesley Chrysler, Glendale High School student, did a two-man job on 29 or 30 snakes with their "22" rifles.

Smith said that two of the snakes had 13 rattles each and may well have had more than that, originally, since some were obviously broken off. The largest snake was 37 inches long, he said.

Co-Pilot Survives Idaho Plane Crash; One Still Missing

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (UPI) — The Air Force today identified the crew of a B47 bomber which crashed after a collision Friday night.

The co-pilot parachuted to safety.

Found dead in the wreckage of the plane were the pilot, Capt. Frank G. Zumba, 32, and staff Sgt. Lawrence E. Harrison, 35, the crew chief.

Still missing, according to Mountain Home Air Force Base officials, was Capt. Lorin T. Matthews, 30, the navigator.

They said paramedic rescue units and a helicopter would resume the search for Matthews today.

Zumba is survived by his wife, Donna, Riverside, Calif., two children, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank F. Zumba, Elmhurst, N.Y. Harrison's survivors are his wife, Elizabeth, Mountain Home AFB and three children, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Harrison, Wheelersburg, Ohio. Matthews' wife, Helen, lives at Mountain Home AFB with their 3-year-old son.

The bodies were found in the wreckage of the airplane which collided with a KC135 tanker over the rugged Idaho-Montana-Wyoming border. The bodies were found Sunday shortly after the co-pilot of the ship was found near the scene, about 10 miles southwest of Old Faithful Geyser in Yellowstone National Park.

The tanker, with one wing damaged, returned safely to Mountain Home AFB.

Pinball Player Wrecks Machines

Jack Bratton, Sutherlin, was taken into custody by the Sutherlin police last week for demolishing pinball machines at Jug's Club, The Pastime and Lyle's Cafe.

Bratton reportedly became enraged when the pinball machines did not pay off and proceeded to demolish five machines. He wrecked one at Jug's Club, one at Lyle's Cafe and three at The Pastime, reports Mrs. Jerry DeMuth.

Damage was estimated at over \$5,000 according to Sutherlin Police Chief Dick Grimal. Bratton is free on \$100 bail. The trial date has been set for May 24 at Sutherlin. Damage was done by tipping the machines over.

Waterfront Work Hearing Due May 23

The Wage and Hours Commission will hold a hearing May 23 at its office in Portland on proposed revisions in regulations governing employment of minors in waterfront areas.

Edward C. Hawes, chief inspector, said the hearing is a formality to permit presentation of any objections.

The hearing was announced by Norman O. Nilsen, Oregon labor commissioner and executive secretary of the Wage and Hour Commission. Observers evaluated the announcement as favorable for a relaxing of regulations in connection with employment of youths for waterfront work.

Proposals Made

Proposed by the commission are changes which will make it possible to issue work permits to minors 16 years of age or older for employment as charter boat operator - assistants, or "swivel necks," and for minors 14 years of age or older to work on waterfront areas — not aboard boats — such as youths who clean fish or otherwise assist small boat basin resort employers.

Waterfront employers would be urged to employ only youths who are good swimmers and to take all necessary water safety precautions.

Hawes said the Wage and Hour Department is also interested in efforts to open up harvest work and other summer employment in inland areas to the coastal youths. This would augment employment opportunities offered by the small boat basin and recreational boating and fishing industry, Mrs. Peseau said.

Wage and hour regulations have prohibited employment of youths under 18 on the waterfront. Enforcement of these regulations became an issue last summer at Salmon Harbor where young persons are hired to work on boats, clean fish and wash boats following charter trips.

Review Requested

A committee representing the Port of Umpqua District, Salmon Harbor administration, charter boat operators, high school administration and others met with the commission to request a review of the regulations. Joining in the request were the Coast Ports Federation, Lower Umpqua Chamber of Commerce and Reedsport High School District.

Several Reedsport High School students rely on employment as "swivel necks" and other jobs to earn funds for their education, Mrs. Peseau reported.

British Frigate Stands By

The British sent a Royal Navy frigate to international waters just off Haiti and the Admiralty in London said the ship would remove British residents if that became necessary.

Four Dominican warships moved into the Gonave Channel off Haiti's west coast, according to Dominican government sources.

Combat-ready Dominican troops with tanks and artillery took up offensive positions along the Dominican side of the Haitian border. Three F51 Mustang fighter planes armed with rockets and 29 millimeter cannon stood ready at San Isidro Air Base near Santo Domingo.

House Opens Debate On New Constitution

SALEM (UPI) — Debate on a new constitution for Oregon opened in the House today, with Democratic leadership predicting Democrats will supply more than half the 40 votes it needs to pass.

House Speaker Clarence Barton predicted the document would get 20 to 24 votes from the 31 Democrats in the House.

Republican Minority Leader F. F. Montgomery of Eugene declined to estimate how many of the 28 Republicans would vote for it. GOP Gov. Mark Hatfield, however, has endorsed constitutional revision.

If the document got a two-thirds vote of the House, and then of the Senate, it would go to the voters next May.

The proposed new constitution would replace Oregon's present one, written 106 years ago and amended 111 times.

Two Years Work

The Oregon Commission on Constitutional Revision, appointed by action of the 1961 Legislature, began writing a new document two years ago. The commission's work was submitted to the legislature this January.

House and Senate committees spent three and one half hours, meeting jointly, going over the document and revising parts of it.

The committees ended up with a draft a little closer to Oregon's present constitution than the commission had proposed.

There were only a few differences between the two committees.

The proposed constitution is less than half the length of the present one. It contains 14 articles, two of them transitional.

Marines Set To Evacuate Americans

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — President Juan Bosch convoked his cabinet today for a report from military chiefs, strengthening belief the hour for a Dominican strike against Haiti may be imminent.

The meeting lasted an hour but no official comment was forthcoming. However, Bosch summoned U.S. Ambassador John Barlow Martin to the palace, presumably to give him a briefing on the meeting.

An army spokesman said Dominican infantry now were in attack positions the length of the border separating the two countries on the Caribbean island of Hispaniola.

Bosch made no secret of his plans to invade Haiti if necessary to topple the dictatorial regime of President Francois Duvalier.

The Organization of American States (OAS) stepped up its efforts to head off a war between the two nations which share the Caribbean island of Hispaniola, only 55 miles from Cuba.

President Duvalier vowed in Port Au Prince he never would step down under pressure, he told his people:

"I am a revolutionary in every sense — not a sentimental type but one of the hard kind...I have for my companion my rifle."

In Washington, the OAS scheduled an emergency meeting to hear a report from three members of the fact-finding mission it sent to Haiti and the Dominican Republic. The mission members expressed doubt that Bosch would move against Haiti while the OAS was trying to solve the crisis.

Move Into Position

But Bosch moved troops, tanks and warships into position for an invasion, spurred on by a plea from Haitian political refugees in asylum in Port Au Prince to save them from "savagery" by Duvalier's police.

Although no formal ultimatum was issued, Dominican officials hinted the attack could come at any time and might be preceded by heavy aerial bombardment of Duvalier's palace.

U.S. Marines aboard a Navy task force within 30 miles of Port Au Prince were alerted to move in to evacuate 1,000 Americans in the Haitian capital if fighting broke out. The Navy said it was ready to move on 10-minutes notice.

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
