Vacation Trip Enjoyable Event

Mrs. Jack Veach of Green and Mrs. Peg Stanley of Roseburg have returned to their homes after spending several weeks traveling in the United States and Puerto Rico, where they were guests of Mrs. Veach's brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Switzer, and their teenage son, Harold. Switzer is government agent in charge of the fish and wild life service for the islands. While in the area, they also enjoyed visiting with former Roseburg residents, Mr. and Mrs. William Clarenback. Clarenback who formerly managed the Proflame Gas Co. here, is now in the road construction business in Charlotte Amalie, St. Thomas Island.

The Roseburgians spent five weeks in the islands, and report being greatly impressed with their beauty. They suffered from the humidity, however, although the temperatures ranged no higher than mid-80s. Their tours of the islands included two days spent at St. Thomas, which, interestingly enough, has no rivers or wells to supply water. All water used must be caught and stored in cisterns or other containers. The government has enacted laws that anyone planning on building must have the plans show that he has made arrangements to collect household

water. Enormous hillside catch basins have been made by the government to collect rain from the mountains and store for use of the cities for fire and consumption. Some water is also imported from Puerto Rico.

The two women attended the Union Church at San Juan, which was built to accommodate all Protestant faiths of the area, as the prevailing church is Roman Catholic. She stated that 29 different denominations attend the church, proving that there are strong bonds of likeness in all faiths.

They also visited the site of the construction of the world's largest telescope, which is being installed there after five years of world searching to choose the most advantageous situation. The U. S. government and Cornell University are collaborating on this project.

The trip was made by bus to Miami, taking the southern route with numerous stopovers at places of interest. From Florida they traveled by jet to the islands and returned. The trip home was planned to take them to Maine and back but due to adverse weather conditions they turned west at Charleston, S. C., thence to Chicago, Salt Lake City, Boise and Walla Walla, then home to Roseburg, where they arrived April 12, after having been traveling for two and one half months.
