University Group To Sail Pacific

EUGENE (UPI)—A group of University of Oregon graduate students plan to sail for the South Pacific this summer on an eight-month scientific expedition.

The University of Oregon announced recently that grants from two museums will help finance the trip by Walter M. Frederickson, a teaching assistant in anthropology; his wife, Demaris, also a graduate student; Richard E. Ross, another teaching fellow, and his wife, Barbara. The Fredericksons plan to take their five-year-old son, Erik, on the jaunt.

They will do archeological work on Washington and Fanning Island under a grant from the Bishop Museum in Honolulu and in the Marquesas Islands under a grant from the Kon-Tiki Museum in Oslo, Norway.

They plan to sail from Portland late in June or early in July on a 40-foot trimaran built here and launched at Corvallis March 18. The trimaran, which has two 25-foot outboard hulls, is now undergoing final fitting in Portland.

## South Applies Squeeze Play

South did not like the looks of the dummy, but there was nothing he could do about it. His partner had taken him to six trump and it was up to South to make it.

He couldn't do anything about the first trick. West had led the ace of hearts. South did play the queen from dummy. It looked as if he might want to win the third heart lead in his own hand.

A second heart lead was taken by dummy's king and East discarded the three of spades. At this point things began to look better for South. East had started with only one heart. Maybe he was long in the other suits. In that case South did not much care if he went down several tricks. He wanted the best play for his contract and the best plan seemed to be to put East under pressure. South led a heart to his jack and East began to squirm. Finally East let go a low club.

South cashed dummy's king and queen of clubs and when West followed to the second club South had no further worries. It was apparent that East had started with one heart and four cards in each of the other suits.

South ran off his last two clubs and again East felt the pressure. He let a diamond go, whereupon South had four diamond tricks.

Of course, South could have made the contract by picking up West's jack of diamonds any time, but the actual play guarded against the jack in either hand.
