Fire Destroys Martin Sawmill Near Oakland

Fire raged out of control early this morning, completely destroying the Martin Bros. Container and Timber Products Corp. sawmill at Oakland.

The blaze is believed to have started around 12:30 a.m., with the alarm being sounded at 12:40. Firemen from the Oakland Volunteer Fire Department, the Roseburg Rural Fire Department, the Sutherlin Fire Department and the Douglas Forest Protective Association rushed to the scene.

By the time the firemen arrived, the fire was well on its way to destroying the mill.

General manager Ray Martin told The News-Review Tuesday morning there was no way he could assess the damage as yet, but added, "We couldn't replace it today for a million dollars."

He said some 25-30 employees are affected by the loss of the sawmill.

Oakland Fire Chief Fay Stearns and Roseburg Rural Fire Department Chief Cliff Thresher told The News-Review early indications were the fire started when a compressor apparently blew up. A total of more than 30 men from the four departments combated the fire.

Canyonville, Sutherlin Reject School Budgets

School district budgets in all districts of the county but two were approved by voters in the annual school election Monday.

The only districts rejecting their budgets were Canyonville which rejected its by a vote of 72-93, and Sutherlin which turned its down, 365-214.

Following are the districts and their votes on all issues:

Gardiner — \$62,225 outside 6 per cent limitation approved, 65-47; rural school budget approved 57-35; rural school director incumbent Frank White received 62 votes; Clyde DeWitt received 37 votes to win five-year Gardiner district directorship over James Adamo, with 56 votes.

Reedsport Elementary — Rural school budget approved, 81-30; rural school director Frank White received 97 votes; incumbent W. A. Karcher received 108 votes for five-year directorship of Reedsport district.

Yoncalla — \$156,218 in school budget approved, 210-159; rural school budget approved 192-171; Frank White received 268 votes for rural school director; Loyd Means won five-year school term with 123 votes, while other candidates received the following: Lois Feucht, a write-in, 107; Eugene Wood, 104; Arthur B. Kopp, 40.

Oakland — Rural school budget turned down 56-88; Ralph Spencer elected to five-year term with 85 votes over Clyde Manning, with 43; Frank Vasche, unopposed, received 126 votes for one-year term.

Sutherlin — \$433,167 outside 6 per cent limitation turned down, 365-214; rural school budget rejected, 270-316; Joseph Denley received 295 votes to win the two-year school district directorship, while his opponent, Robert Mock received 255; Rodney L. Leatherwood received 342 votes to win five-year term over Ivan D. Eggleston, 37 votes, and Marvin Steinbach, 185 votes.

Camas Valley — \$51,300 outside 6 per cent approved, 49-31; rural school budget approved 54-27, \$5,000 a year levy for three years to install a new sewer system approved, 57-24; Ervin Knebel, unopposed, received 71 votes for five-year district directorship.

Glendale — \$161,600 outside limitation approved, 153-69; \$5,000 a year levy for five years approved, 169-54, for new school buses as needed; rural school budget approved, 140-88; Glenn Gilmore, with 176 votes, and Mrs. Robert Thompson with 146, elected to two

Hatfield Raps Conference On Tax Bill

SALEM (UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield warned Monday against "a desperation move" by the House and Senate to reach agreement on a tax program through a conference committee.

He termed this "a real danger." The governor told his news conference that a conference committee was a "horrible legislative procedure" that should be avoided.

Hatfield called upon the chairman of the Senate Tax Committee to invite the House Tax Committee to "sit down and look at the differences" in the "calmness of joint committee action."

"I would hope there could be a joint House-Senate meeting to really hammer out a final tax plan. This would be preferable to a conference committee at a desk or in the hallways in the last week of the session."

The governor said he had never seen an "adequate tax plan come out of a conference committee."

Hatfield said he understood the Senate would modify the House-approved tax plan, and feared it would go to a conference committee because the House would not agree with the Senate amendments.

He said if a tax program were referred to the people and rejected, he would have only two choices:

—1—To call a special session.

—2—To cut back and eliminate state services.

The governor said the House tax program was "not as adequate" as his proposal, and that while "it had some reforms, it certainly is not my program."

He said he did not believe the House proposal would discourage industry.

He said a proposal to finance part of higher education's building needs out of current revenues, and the balance by bonds, was "a patchwork attempt," and said a straight bonding program would be preferable because the building program was needed.

When asked how he viewed the success of the requests he made of the legislature in January, Hatfield commented "the game is still on." He added his batting average was "not so hot" so far.

Scientists Plan First Television Signals To Satellite Today

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—America today successfully orbited a new Telstar communications satellite that may beam the first live intercontinental television pictures of a manned flight into space next week.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced at 9:21 a.m. PDT that the 175-pound Telstar-2 "is in orbit" and that "signals are being received fine."

Scientists planned to transmit the first television signals to the new moonlet at 5:30 p.m. PDT today. The transmission was expected to consist of a video test pattern to determine how well the complex satellite could do its job.

The near-perfect shot also raised hopes that Telstar-2 may transmit to Europe live television pictures of the space flight of U.S. Astronaut L. Gordon Cooper Jr., now set for next Tuesday.

These television signals would be sent by land line from Cape Canaveral to Andover, Maine, and flashed from there to the satellite speeding across the Atlantic between North America and Europe.

If all goes well, Telstar-2 will amplify the pictures and beam them back to ground stations in England and France where they will be transmitted into the homes of millions of viewers on the European continent.

Telstar-2 is the third U.S. television-relay satellite. The first, Telstar-1, was launched in July, 1962, and is now dormant. The second, Nasa's Relay, was fired in orbit last Dec. 13.

Caribbean War Threat Dissipates

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI)—Government workers called a general strike today as the immediate threat of war with Haiti dissipated. The country remained on a war footing but appeared satisfied to let the Organization of American States mediate the dispute.

The Government Workers Federation took advantage of the lull in war talk to call their long-threatened strike in protest against massive firings which the government of President Juan Bosch claims are necessary to restore the country's failing economic health.

The government sought to brand the strike illegal, but union leaders predicted it would be at least 80 per cent successful. The strike date was moved ahead 48 hours to today because of union anger over Bosch's angry attacks on the projected walkout.

As the war threat eased, Haiti allowed five political refugees who had been harbored in the Chilean Embassy to leave the country aboard a plane for New York. Also on the plane was the Haitian foreign minister who was flying to New York to press his country's demand for a United Nations Security Council hearing on complaints of aggression against the Dominican Republic.

Haitian President Francois Duvalier Monday demanded an immediate session of the United Nations Security Council to consider charges of "planned aggression" by the Dominican Republic.

The Security Council deferred action of its own pending the outcome of OAS peace-keeping measures.

Don Kruse Wins School Board Post

Residents of Roseburg School District 4 Monday approved the district's operating budget for the coming year by a 720-461 margin and elected Donald Kruse to the school board.

Kruse, a Garden Valley farmer, will take office July 1, replacing former chairman Art Lamka. Lamka did not seek re-election. Kruse defeated second-place candidate

Mrs. JoAnn Molschenbacher 485-401. Lloyd Bailey received 203 votes.

The vote in the budget election was on \$1,527,997.09 outside the 6 per cent limitation. The over-all amount to be raised by taxes is \$2,307,650.56. This includes \$175,000 for a serial levy approved by the voters in March.

The vote on the rural school district tax levy by District 4 residents was 734 in favor, 439 against.

U.S. To Evacuate Families In Haiti

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States will begin evacuating Wednesday the dependents of all civilian and military American personnel in Haiti, it was disclosed today.

Officials said 220 American women and children have been ordered to be ready to leave at once and all other Americans also are being encouraged to leave the country.

About 1,200 U.S. citizens are estimated to be in the turbulent Caribbean country, which is threatened by increasing internal disorder.

The evacuation operation, to be carried out by units of U.S. military forces in the Caribbean, will leave slightly less than 1,000 U.S. citizens there.

While the other Americans have not yet been ordered out, Ambassador Raymond Thurston and top U.S. officials are "encouraging" all to get out who can. State Department spokesmen said.

U.S. naval units have been standing off Haiti for several days virtually from the start of the crisis between Haiti and the Dominican Republic, in event the lives of Americans in Port-au-Prince and elsewhere appeared in danger.

About 2,000 Marines are said to be aboard some of the ships.

Injuries Claim Glendale Girl

Dinah Lee, 18, Glendale, died in a hospital at Hillsboro Monday from injuries suffered in a two-car accident Sunday between Forest Grove and Gales Creek, the United Press reports.

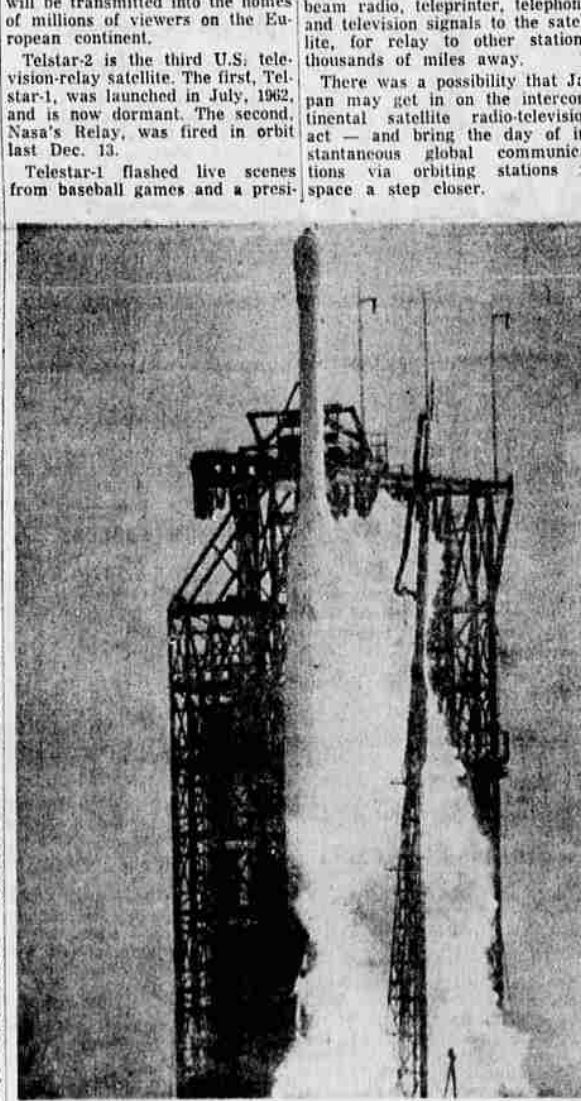
She was a student at Pacific University. Five other persons injured in the head-on collision of two cars were reported in "fairly good" condition from Tualatin Community Hospital in Hillsboro.

Miss Lee was the daughter of Robert Lee, English teacher and wrestling coach at Glendale, and Mrs. Lee, an elementary teacher in the school system there. Her parents went to Hillsboro on hearing of the accident.

Miss Lee was one of five students and a counselor at Pacific University returning from an outing at the coast. She earlier had been reported as in a critical condition.

New Constitution For Oregon Wins Approval In Dramatic House Vote

SALEM (UPI)—A new constitution for Oregon, approved in a dramatic House vote Monday, headed today for the final fence it must clear to reach the people. The Oregon Senate.

Its champion in the upper chamber, Sen. Walter Pearson, D-Portland, said he is "hopeful" of its passage.

But Senate President Ben Musa, D-The Dalles, called it premature and ill-advised and said he will vote against it.

Gov. Mark Hatfield said it "could be this session's greatest legacy," and added, "I hope the Senate senses its opportunity."

The document cleared the House with one vote to spare, 41-39, after three hours of debate in a tense atmosphere of expectancy Monday. It needed a two-thirds majority.

It needs yes votes from 20 of the 30 senators to go on to the people next May.

Signs are its fate in the more conservative Senate will hang by one or two votes.

Sen. Thomas Mahoney, D-Portland, predicted it will get only 16 votes on the Senate floor.

Pearson, chairman of the Senate Committee on Constitutional Revision, said he hopes the Senate will "let the people decide."

Pearson said he hopes his committee, and the Senate, will accept the house-passed measure as is, to avoid the need to iron out differences later.

Musa has the power to send the document to another committee instead of Pearson's to kill it. But Musa said "all things being equal" it would go to the Constitutional Revision Committee, which has been working on it all session along with the House committee.

"I'll vote against it and let it go at that," Musa said. "There will be no arm twisting."

The House was attentive, and audiences filling the galleries listened intently, during three hours of debate.

Rep. John Dellenback, R-Medford, chairman of the House Constitutional Revision Committee, challenged members to show the "same real vision and courage" to step into the future as were shown by the drafters of Oregon's present constitution 106 years ago.

Reading from records of 1857, Dellenback said drafters then recognized their constitution would some day be replaced by "a better one."

"Oregon's present constitution is a house in which Oregon has lived for 106 years, which has been repaired and patched 111 times," he said. "Now let us hold on to the construction and design that are good, but make the changes that the changing times make necessary."

The new constitution, less than half the length of the present one, sheds the obsolete, transfers many details to the statutes, modernizes language, clears up ambiguities, and "takes care of inadequacies," Dellenback said.

Debate centered on the last—the substantive changes it would make—and particularly on the executive branch of government.

There the new document provides for a single elective statewide executive officer in place of the present five. It removes the limit on the number of terms a governor may serve, and provides for grouping of some 140 agencies, boards and commissions into 29 departments with heads appointed by the governor.

A companion article provides for a "watch dog" secretary of state, to be a check on all three branches of government. He would have only post-audit and investigative duties, and no administrative functions.

Rep. Jake Bennett, D-Portland, called the plan for reorganizing the life tenure for the governor, a step toward dictatorship, rule by political machine.

"We should not do anything that might weaken or destroy what for years has been good government in Oregon," he said.

Dellenback replied the intent of the new document is to make the executive, legislative and judicial
