Bobby Lane Slates Retirement After 15 Years Of NFL Warfare

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Bobby Lane, one of the National Football League's greatest quarterbacks, has decided to quit and devote full time to his family and business.

Lane, a 15-year veteran of NFL warfare, made his disclosure in a letter to Pittsburgh Steeler Coach Buddy Parker after a season which saw him set career records in four passing categories.

The Steelers disclosed Lane's retirement plans Monday.

The 36-year-old Lane, who now lives at Lubbock, Tex., was an all-America football player at the University of Texas.

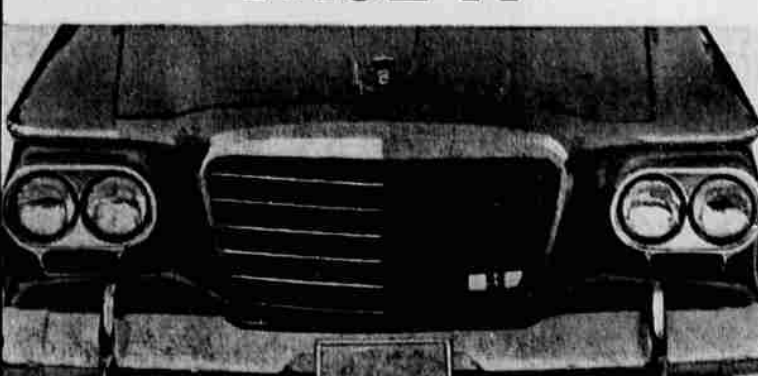
He began his professional football career with the Chicago Bears in 1948 but was traded quickly to the old New York Bulldogs.

From there he went to Detroit for seven seasons and played his last five campaigns with the Steelers.

Lane holds NFL marks for most touchdowns passes (196), most passes attempted (3,700), most passes completed (1,814) and most yards gained passing (26,778).

Parker, who said he received the letter "three or four weeks ago," had advised Lane to retire at the close of last season. He said at the time, "I think Bobby has played long enough. His arm is not as strong as it

Yanks Crush Tigers, 10-34 To Grab Share Of AL Lead

The New York Yankees are back on top again and frankly, who did you expect, the Washington Senators?

If you had paid strict attention, you would have known weeks ago everything was going to be okay with the Yanks.

When some alarmists suggested this could be one of their off-years, Manager Ralph Houk said not a chance. When questions were raised about Whitey Ford's arm, the Yankee manager said, "I don't worry. And when anyone asked when Mickey Mantle would start hitting, Houk always said soon."

It looks as if he was right on all counts.

Technically, the Yankees are tied for first place in the American League today with the Kansas City Athletics but the A's had better hurry up and get a picture of that because that situation is subject to change on short notice.

Yanks Crush Tigers

Baring their muscles for the first time in weeks, the Yankees rattled off 15 hits and ran up their highest run total of the season Monday night in crushing the Detroit Tigers, 10-3.

The Tigers ended Ford's string of scoreless innings at 20 when they got to him for three runs in the fourth inning but the veteran southpaw still registered his third straight victory even though Jim Bouton relieved him in the seventh.

Mantle enjoyed a perfect night by driving in three runs on three hits in as many times at bat. With the Yanks leading 4-3, he slashed a two-run homer off loser Hank Aguirre (3-3) in the seventh to make the score 6-3.

Tom Tresh, who also collected three hits, then unloaded a three-run homer off reliever Paul Foytack in the eighth to cap a four-run rally. Bobby Richardson also had three hits and drove in two runs.

In the only other American League games scheduled, the Chicago White Sox beat Kansas City, 5-1, and the Los Angeles Angels snapped a four-game losing streak with a 5-4 victory over the

Minnesota Twins.

Only one game was played in the National League, with the Pittsburgh Pirates downing the Los Angeles Dodgers, 7-4.

Gary Peters of the White Sox, given his first major league start, made the most of it by limiting the A's to four hits and belting a home run himself.

Peters tired after eight innings, however, and Jim Brosnan, picked up 24 hours earlier from the Reds, relieved him in the ninth and set down the A's in order, striking out two of the three batters he faced.

Southpaw Ted Bowsfield suffered his fourth defeat against one victory, yielding 10 of the White Sox' 13 hits, including homers by Peters and Mike Hersberger.

Albie Pearson drove in four of the Angels' five runs against the Twins by connecting for a pair of doubles, both times with the bases loaded.

Pearson's second double came off Bill Pleis with one out in the ninth and broke up the ball game after Zoile Veralles had singled home Bob Allison in the top of the inning to put Minnesota ahead, 4-3. Dan Orinski was credited with his first victory and Ray Moore charged with his first defeat.

Sharon Barney, Florence, competing under the banner of the Roseburg Junior Rifle Club, turned in the high individual score for the girls. Miss Barney's winning total was a 352.

A team representing the host club won the girls team trophy with a 1,295 score. Competing on the winning squad were: Miss Barney, 362; Pat Keizer, 311; Pat

Haney, 291; and Susan Flury, 331.

In the sub-junior (13 and under) competition, the team representing the Eugene YMCA Rifle Club carted home first place honors. Team members included Stan Lynch, 294; Steve Cooper, 211; Doug Gonyea, 236; and Ken Beeson, 292. Winning team score was a 1,033.

Roseburg's sub-juniors were second with a 994 total. Shooters on the Roseburg sub-junior team were Gavin Brown, 215; Dick Bailey, 267; Tom Wimberley, 213; and Dean Bognar, 299.

A total of 66 junior and sub-junior riflemen competed for honors in the meet. The scores will be sent to the NRA headquarters in Washington, D.C., where they will be compared to other scores from sectional matches throughout the nation. National winners will be determined by the scores from the sectional matches and will be announced at a later date.

Approximately 60 sectional tournaments were held throughout the nation, with Roseburg and La-Grande hosting the two Oregon meets.

Grelle Upsets Beatty In Pan-American Games

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI) — Former Oregon ace Jim Grelle upset famed Jim Beatty in the 1,500-meter run in the Pan American Games in meet record time of 3:43.5.

Grelle scored the surprise victory by outkicking his rival in the final 100 yards of their metric mile duel.

Beatty's clocking was 3:43.6. The old Pan American record was 3:49.1 set by Dwylo Burleson, also an ex-Oregon star, in 1959 in a race in which Grelle was second.

FBI Investigating Threatening Calls Received By Boxer

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — The Federal Bureau of Investigation checked today into a threatening phone call which heavyweight boxer Willie Pastrano said he received shortly before a Las Vegas bout last Saturday.

Pastrano, a native of New Orleans who now lives in Miami, said an old acquaintance in New Orleans threatened to hurt or kill his wife and children if he went through with and won his fight against Wayne Thornton. He won the bout.

The boxer called attorney Sam Monk Zeldin here and Zeldin had police arrest Vincent Bonomo, 27, a former preliminary boxer, in connection with the alleged threat.

Zeldin said Pastrano was very upset about the call. Pastrano rallied in the last rounds to defeat Thornton at Las Vegas. A return match is being scheduled.

An FBI spokesman said an investigation was being made to determine "if there is a violation of a federal law."

Zeldin said he did not know why Pastrano was threatened. "Someone must have made a pretty good bet," he said.

Pastrano and Zeldin are long-time friends. The attorney quoted Pastrano as saying he knew Bonomo but had not seen him in about three years.

Uniform Interpretation Of Balk Rule Stressed By Commissioner

NEW YORK (UPI) — Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick will inform league presidents Warren Giles and Joe Cronin today that he feels the balk rule should be called the same way in both the National and American Leagues.

This does not necessarily mean Frick is in favor of easing the rule. On the contrary, he has already said, "I am in favor of enforcing the rules."

So far this season National League umpires have called 96 balks while American League umpires have called only eight.

"I feel there should be a uniform interpretation of the balk rule by both leagues," Frick said.

"When we are finished with our meeting today, I expect that the same instructions will be sent to all umpires in both leagues," he added. "We all have to operate by the same rule."

Frick does not have the power to change the rule, nor does Giles or Cronin. The only way a change could be made is by baseball's official rules committee, which is not scheduled to meet until the winter.

Frick's chief concern now is that a uniform rule be applied when the two leagues meet in the annual All-Star Game on July 9 at Cleveland and when they meet again in the World Series this October.
