Seattle Edged In Playoff Finale, 4-3

SAN FRANCISCO, (UPI) — Shortly after the San Francisco Seals defeated the Seattle Totems 4-3 in overtime Monday night for the Western Hockey League's playoff crown, a booster club member shouted in the winners' dressing room:

"Remember the victory parade begins Tuesday at 11 a.m."

"Can't we watch it on television?" asked one of the skaters.

Which just about summed up how both sides felt at the end of a hockey season that finally ended three days short of seven months.

One of the tired Seals was center Orland Kurtenbach who banged the winning goal through netminder Al Miller at 4:09 of the first sudden-death period to galvanize a crowd of 12,404.

"I think it was only my fourth goal in 17 games and I was afraid I had run out of them," Kurtenbach said. "Believe me, this has been the most exhausting season of my life."

San Francisco kept the pressure on the Totems most of the night, forcing Miller to come up with 43 stops while seal netminder Jim McLeod made 27.

Coach Keith Allen of the totopped Totems sat quietly in his own team's dressing room at the cow palace and murmured, "We have no alibi. But I wonder how we would have made out if we didn't have to play the entire series away from home."

The Seals share for winning the Lester Patrick Trophy came to about \$1,400 per man in a best-of-seven series that saw them trailing Seattle three games to one before they caught fire.

The Totems, who finished even with the Seals at 25 goals scored apiece in the final playoff, took home about \$1,100 per skater.

Bob Sabourin gave the Totems a 2-0 lead with a brace of tallies within 37 seconds during the second period.

But before the second period ended, San Francisco pulled even on tallies by Duke Edmundson and Moe Mantha. Danny Belisle gave San Francisco a 3-2 advantage early in the third period, but Jim Powers tied it by scoring a minute and 10 seconds later.

As the sudden death period swept past the three-minute mark, Kurtenbach kept the puck in Seattle ice by intercepting it from defenseman Jim Hay. Then he shot home the clincher after it was set up by Larry McNabb and Belisle.

It was the fourth overtime contest of the series and three of them were won by San Francisco.

Late Rallies Net PCL Wins For Denver, Oklahoma City

Ninth-inning rallies propelled Denver and Oklahoma City to Pacific Coast League victories Monday while Tacoma lengthened its Northern Division lead at the expense of Hawaii.

Thirty-five-year-old outfielder Al Heist, who played for Houston in the National League last year, socked a grand-slam homer in the ninth of pace Oklahoma City to a comeback 9-5 victory over the Seattle Rainiers. The win moved the 89ers into the first place in the Southern Division.

The Denver Bears, in last place

one week ago, came from behind with two runs in the ninth to defeat the San Diego Padres 7-6 and climb into third place in the tight Southern Division.

A throwing error by new San Diego centerfielder Barry Shetrone allowed Denver's winning run to score. Three singles had scored one run in the inning and Shetrone tried to throw out a runner at third base after the third single but the ball sailed into the Padres' dugout.

Veteran Gordon Windhorn, whose baseball sojourns have carried him from Triple-A ball to the major leagues and back again, hit a two-run homer for San Diego in the eighth to give the Padres a 6-3 lead.

Denver bonus baby Dan Schneider, behind 6-5 going into the top of the ninth, was replaced by Dick Iehm who got credit for the victory.

Tacoma outfielder Bob Perry, who hit .268 for the Giants last season, belted a two-run homer in the fourth to spark his team's 5-3 win over Hawaii. Ron Herbel won his third game for the Giants, going the route and allowing seven hits. He retired the last 10 Islanders in order.

The victory gave Tacoma a 14-7 record and a 1½-game edge over Portland and Seattle who are tied for second.

Heist's blast touched off a six-run ninth for the 89ers. It was hit off another oldtimer, George Spencer, 36-year-old reliever for Seattle. He absorbed his third loss against one win.

The Rainiers had taken a 4-3 lead in the eighth on Jim Rivera's solo homer. The 89ers' uprising in the ninth later was touched off by a double error by Rae Slider, Seattle shortstop. With two out and a runner on first, he bobbled a ground ball and then threw it into right field, allowing runners to move to second and third.

Hal Smith followed with a double. A walk loaded the bases and Heist hit his homer.

Rain caused postponement of the Dallas-Fort Worth at Portland game.

Middleweight Fight Tops Week's Action

NEW YORK (UPI)—Young Joe DeNucci, excellent boxer-puncher from Newton, Mass., makes his bid for recognition as a middleweight contender Saturday night in a nationally televised fight with Puerto Rican Jose Gonzales at the Boston Arena.

Their 10-round stands out on the week's boxing schedule. Each is 23 years old and an aggressive fighter.

Because of his speed, skill and punch, DeNucci is favored at 2-1 to beat slugger Gonzales although Jose is ranked 10th among world 160-pound contenders by the World Boxing Association and DeNucci is unrated.

Giulio Rinaldi of Italy defends his European light heavyweight title against Germany's Erich Schoepner at Rome on Friday.

Also on Friday, light heavyweight Von Clay of Philadelphia fights Gustav Scholz of Germany at Berlin.
