

Three Tracts Of Blowdown Timber In Southern Part Of County Sold

Three tracts of Umpqua National Forest blowdown timber were sold at above the appraised prices in sales at the supervisor's office in Roseburg Monday.

The Big Blow Salvage Sale on 24 acres 10 miles east of Tiller sold to D. R. Johnson Lumber Co. of Riddle for \$30,962. The tract contains 1,200,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$10.80, 200,000 board feet of white fir and other species appraised at \$5.85. The winning bidder offered \$21.50 for the fir and pine and \$5.90 for

the white fir and other species.

Others Listed

Other bidders were Jeffries Timber Corp. of Canyonville, KOGAP Manufacturing Co. of Medford, Herbert Lumber Co. of Riddle and National Plywood Inc. of Roseburg.

Winner of the Upper Jackson Creek Salvage Sale on 90 acres 25 miles northeast of Tiller was Jeffries, which paid \$10,837 for the 480,000 board feet appraised at \$8,589.50.

The 290,000 feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$22 sold for \$29.75, the

60,000 feet of sugar pine and other pine species appraised at \$14.40 sold for the price and the 130,000 feet of western hemlock and other species went at the appraised \$10.35.

Other bidders were Hoot Owl Logging of Central Point, Herbert, Paul B. Hult Lumber Co. of Dilgard and KOGAP.

Firm Wins Tract

The Stone Freida Salvage Sale on 15 acres 11 miles south of Tiller was sold to House Bros. Logging of Shady Cove. It contains 180,000 board feet appraised at \$4,863. House paid \$8,461, based on \$37.25 per thousand for 170,000 feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$27.85 and 10,000 feet of white fir and other species appraised at and sold at \$12.85.

Other bidders were Jeffries, True-cut Studs Inc. of Rogue River, Gerald D. McKenzie of Ashland, Everett Cushman of Shady Cove, Herbert Lumber and National Plywood.

More Umpqua National Forest sales are scheduled today and on May 27.

Heart Attack Claims Famed German Missilery Scientist

EL MONTE, Calif. (UPI)—Dr. Theodore von Karman, 81, honored as the scientist responsible for the modern missile triumphs, died today at Aachen, Germany, officials of Aerojet General announced here.

Death was attributed to a heart attack and complications of pneumonia.

Karman, famed aerodynamicist, was director of the Guggenheim Aeronautical Laboratory at California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, Calif., from 1920-1949. He was chairman of NATO's advisory group for aeronautical research and development at the time of his death and spent much of his time in Europe on this project.

Dan A. Kimball, president of Aerojet General, described Von Karman as a "scientist's scientist and an engineer's engineer."

Kimball said the aerodynamicist "fathered the transition from winged flight to jet propulsion and pioneered new methods in the study of fluid mechanics and hydrodynamics."

Kimball said during a laboratory dedication ceremony two years ago that the works of Einstein and Von Karman were what "assured our security in the 20 years since Pearl Harbor."

Von Karman was born in Budapest, Hungary, May 11, 1881. He studied both in Budapest and Germany where he earned many honorary degrees.

He served as director of the Aeronautical Institute at the University of Aachen from 1912-1929. After moving to the United States Von Karman founded Aerojet Engineering Corp. now Aerojet General, in 1942. He made his home in Pasadena.

American Climbers Plan New Assault On Everest Peak

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI)—Two Americans and 12 Nepalese Sherpa guides today attempted another conquest of Mt. Everest, the world's highest peak.

The team set out from an advance base camp Monday, refreshed by several days of rest following participation in the first successful American summit assault May 1.

The men were part of a 19-man American scientific expedition deployed on the Himalayan mountain slopes in an unprecedented team assault on the roof of the world.

The latest summit team was believed trying to climb the 29,028-foot mountain from the western ridge. Previous assaults have all been made through the south pass.

Another team was believed trying to climb a sister peak, 28,890-foot Lhotse, the world's fourth highest mountain.

The expedition also planned to scale 25,850-foot Nuptse, for a record "triple crown."

There was no immediate indication when the second Everest team might reach the summit.

The names of the two expedition members who conquered Mt. Everest May 1 have not been disclosed. One was an American and the other a Sherpa.

Two Traffic Lanes Closed On Highway

The northbound lanes of Interstate Highway 5 from Creswell to Cottage Grove were closed to traffic at 2 p.m. Monday, the Roseburg office of the state Highway Department reported.

Officials said this will enable the contractor to prepare his work for paving of road shoulders on this section.

The southbound lanes will be used for two-way traffic until the job is completed. It will take from five to six weeks to complete the entire length of the project which extends from Goshen to Cottage Grove.

Tri-City School Cost Estimates Due

Supt. Al Neet told the Myrtle Creek School Board Monday that architect John Briscoe would attend the June 12 meeting to discuss figures and the estimated costs of making the Tri-City Grade School building into a high school.

The proposal would move the junior high students to the present high school building, the Tri-City elementary students would go to school at Myrtle Creek and the high school students would be moved to the Tri-City building.

The board voted to pay bills amounting to \$13,136.45, including \$3,500 for fencing the football field and \$3,442 for property insurance, reports correspondent Lorraine Birenbaum.

Two resignations, both by high school mathematics teachers, were accepted. The two resigning are Gerald Chadburn and James Foster. An eighth grade mathematics teacher had resigned earlier.

Vacancies exist at Myrtle Creek now in the math and foreign languages departments. Also a new position has been created for special studies and industrial arts in the high school.

Robert Taylor was elected chairman of the board for the coming year and Dr. William Bayliss was elected vice chairman, William Wirth is the outgoing chairman. The next board meeting will be June 12.

British Businessman, Soviet Scientist Plead Guilty To Spy Charge In Moscow

MOSCOW (UPI)—A British businessman and a Soviet scientist pleaded guilty today to charges of spying for the United States and Britain.

Seven American and six British diplomats were named in the indictment read at the opening session of the trial of British Greyville Wynne and Russian Oleg Penkovsky, whom the Soviets denounced as a traitor who loved to dance the twist. Conviction could result in the death penalty.

Television cameras recorded the tense scene as the defendants admitted spying against the Soviet Union before a packed courtroom in the U.S.S.R. Supreme Court Building.

Under questioning, Penkovsky testified that he passed secrets to the wife of one British diplomat and also to the latter's children. He told the court he gave the children fake yellow candy containing four films of stolen secrets.

Wynne, 42, a dapper arranger of trade exhibitions, was seized in Budapest six months ago and held incommunicado in a Moscow prison. He was accused of being the chief contact man for an Anglo-American spy ring.

Penkovsky, 43, a tall, gray-haired former scientific coordinator, was accused of selling the Kremlin's scientific and defense secrets to Wynne for use by British intelligence and the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency. The Soviet press called him a "money hungry traitor who loved to dance the Charleston and twist."

The Soviet scientist pleaded guilty to all charges against him in

the lengthy indictment which accused the two men of funneling Soviet secrets to the spy ring during 1961 and 1962.

Wynne, speaking calmly and facing the court, said "I plead guilty to the exception of those points which I shall name in my statement."

The U.S. Embassy refused to comment immediately on the allegations against present and former staff members. A British Embassy spokesman dismissed as "absurd and wholly without foundation" the charges leveled against British diplomats.

Five-Day 'Kick The Habit' Plan Set At 'Y' Monday For Smokers

Smokers who want to "kick the habit" will have their chance next week under a special Five-Day Plan to be conducted here by a physician-clergyman team in the YMCA lounge.

The plan consists of regular evening group therapy sessions and a daily personal control program for home or at work. It has had a successful two-year trial run in a number of East Coast communities and was recently described in a national magazine as "Divorcing Lady Nicotine."

Leaders Named

Conducting the program locally will be Dr. Lewis Hart of the Roseburg Medical-Dental Clinic and Pastor A. P. Ritz of the local Seventh-day Adventist Church. Group therapy sessions will be held without charge starting at 7:30 each evening, beginning Monday evening, May 13, in the YMCA lounge.

Already successfully held in many eastern cities of the United States, the Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking features such topics as the psychological and physical aspects of the habit, how craving can be lessened, how will power can be strengthened, the physical-effects of smoking, the organization of a "buddy system" and many other techniques designed to break the habit within a five-day period.

Film Planned

One feature will be a film "One in 20,000," depicting in full color a lung cancer operation, to be shown Monday night, the first evening of the therapy session. This group is limited to the first fifty persons who register with the YMCA secretary, because of limited facilities.

of the Seventh-day Adventist denomination, the Five-Day Plan was originated by J. Wayne McFarland, M.D., and Elman J. Folkenbert, clergyman, both of South Lancaster, Massachusetts. As many as 550 smokers have enrolled in the plan at one time.
