

Choosing, Not Finding Job Concern Of June Grad

Choosing — not finding — a job will be the concern of the college June graduate this year, Oregon State University placement officers report.

Starting salaries are up and the well-trained graduate was never in greater demand, a job opportunity survey shows. More companies came to the campus this year to interview graduates than ever before. For example, the average OSU engineering senior has taken approximately 8 job interviews this year. The demand is increasing for graduates with advanced degrees.

The school-by-school outlook for June graduates from OSU is as follows:

ENGINEERING: Tremendous need exists for more engineers. Prospective employers are being "turned away" this year because there aren't enough graduates to go around. There are three or four times as many good jobs open as graduates.

Starting salary for this year's engineering graduate will be about \$588, compared to \$572 a year ago. Master's degree graduates will start at about \$645 and doctor's degree graduates at \$875 up. Starting pay has increased 70 per cent in the last 10 years.

EDUCATION: Well-trained teachers are in big demand and will be for years with rapidly increasing school enrollments. Starting salaries for elementary and high school teachers range from \$4400 to \$5800 with the average about \$4800-\$4900. OSU Placement Office had more calls for teachers this year than ever before. Interviewers are "choosy" nevertheless.

Shortage fields in high school teaching include physical science, mathematics, English (particularly for women teachers), Library, Girls physical education.

SCIENCE: Mathematicians are in greatest demand with physicists and chemists close behind. But opportunities in other science fields — botany, zoology, entomology, oceanography, microbiology — are rated "very good" also. Demand for geologists is way up compared to three years ago.

For a bachelor's degree starting pay will run from \$500-\$575 to a master's \$75 to \$100 a month more; for a doctor's degree, anywhere up to \$1000 or more a month.

AGRICULTURE: Well-qualified agriculture graduates will have no trouble finding a good job again this year. Starting pay will range from \$4800 to \$6000. Opportunities are particularly good in sales of agricultural products, food processing, and federal research and marketing work. Demand for graduates stays strong.

HOME ECONOMICS: Plenty of positions are available in business, teaching and extension work for economics — if they are willing to go where the positions are. Starting pay ranges from \$4800 to \$6000.

Demand is up for women in retail merchandising. Recruiters are looking for top students to go into their executive training programs.

BUSINESS AND TECHNOLOGY: Accounting majors are still in highest demand; strong need too for sales personnel. Top personnel and production graduates are picked off for administrative trainee positions. Starting salary: \$400 to \$600 with the average \$475 and a monthly increase of \$10 to \$15 over last year. Some 10 per cent more recruiters came earlier to make job offers.

It isn't unusual for a secretarial science major to average \$375. Industry is "talking" more to the secretarial science graduate about the possibility of advancing into office management positions. Business education grads benefit from the advancing teacher salaries.

HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES: Opportunities available in a wide range of state and federal jobs involving "work with people." Many have been placed in social work, foreign relations

and on-the-job internships in teaching at three-quarters pay. Starting pay from \$4500 to \$5500. Graduate work attracts a considerable number of humanities and social sciences bachelor's degree holders.

FORESTRY: More jobs open than men to fill them despite the depressed lumber market. Average starting salary is about \$3200. More graduates will go into public forest agency jobs this year than a year ago. Outlook in private industry is brightening some.

PHARMACY: Opportunities for employment appear about equal to the number of graduates this year. Starting pay, depending upon experience and location, ranges from \$550 to \$650 a month with \$500 average. There are more openings for hospital pharmacists, wholesale pharmacists, and manufacturers representatives than there are students choosing these positions. Opportunities in graduate school are being bypassed because of financial attraction to go to work rather than go on for advanced training.

The group will attend a pre-camp rally at Medford on May 10-11.

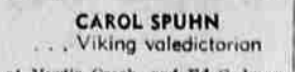
Myrtle Creek High Names Valedictorian, Salutatorian

The valedictorian and salutatorian were announced this week for Myrtle Creek High School by Myrl R. Barkhurst, principal.

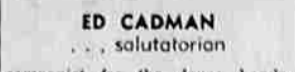
They are Carol Spuhn, who will give the valedictorian address at the graduation ceremonies June 3
