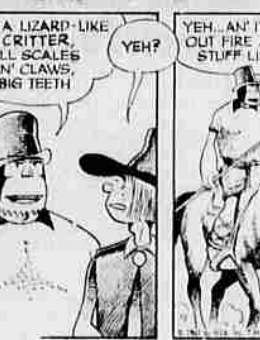

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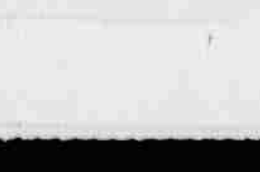

Patio Sink Helpful In Summer

The summer exodus from parlor to patio gains popularity every year. But the most important ingredient to summer fun is often left behind.

Available water supplies regularly remain in the home as the family begins to enjoy outdoor living. This means trekking back and forth between house and patio with the coffee pot, dirty dishes, cooking utensils, empty lemonade pitchers and damp cloths for wiping patio tables.

For many families only half enjoying the cook-out, a patio sink with hot and cold water will be a pleasant convenience besides being practical at clean-up time, the Plumbing-Heating-Cooling Information Bureau points out.

A good outdoor water supply can make garden and lawn care tasks lighter, too. Soize thought should be given hose connections. One is not sufficient. It's a good idea to have one on each side of the house. With this arrangement, most lawn and garden areas can be reached with a standard 75-foot length of hose. It also eliminates the necessity for dragging hose across shrubs and through flower beds.

Another good water-use idea involves providing hot and cold water in the garage. This makes it a good place for the do-it-yourselfer to clean gardening tools and dirtied hands. It's also a perfect spot for washing the family car or the family pup.

With hot and cold water piped to the patio or garage, it is an easy matter to add a drinking fountain for frequently quenching the thirst of hard-playing children and reducing the number of "troop movements" into the house.
