Romney Leaves GOP Nomination Up To Rockefeller And Goldwater

LANSING, Mich. (UPI) — Gov. George Romney returned to his state capital Tuesday and promptly left the 1964 Republican presidential nomination battle up to Sen. Barry Goldwater and New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller. Romney, home after an eight-day sojourn to Washington and New York, repeated that he is "not a candidate and I do not plan to be a candidate in 1964."

The former industrialist said that Goldwater and Rockefeller are the "top candidates at this point" and he had invited both of them to come to Michigan "to let the state get a look at them."

Amazed At Publicity
Romney said he was "amazed

at the publicity given his recent trip during which evidences of a Romney-for-president boom was growing within GOP ranks. "People have been interpreting things that aren't there," he said. "All I've been doing is refraining from indicating what I'm going to do after this term as governor."

The governor denied reports that he had been listening to encouragement from prominent Republicans, among them former President Eisenhower and former GOP National Chairman Leonard W. Hall.

"I've met Len Hall only twice and have only a casual acquaintanceship with him. And it's been months since I've communicated with Gen. Eisenhower," Romney said.

Asked if he would accept the '64 nomination if it were thrown his way, Romney replied sharply: "That is so remote and unlikely that it would be absolutely presumptuous and foolish on my part to comment on."

Meets With Goldwater
The governor said he met with Goldwater, leader of the GOP's conservative wing, on his trip and expressed "the hope that his situation would not lead to a division in party ranks."

Asked what he meant by Goldwater's "situation," Romney said he was referring to "organizations that are being formed to support his candidacy."

"The most important issue is maintaining unity within the party," said the governor. The governor plans to fly to Washington Thursday for a GOP senatorial committee dinner. He said he was asked to attend the dinner along with other party leaders "as a show of Republican strength."

Dirksen To Ask Travel Curbs

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., said today he would push for approval of House-passed legislation to curb congressional travel abuses — perhaps with some additions of his own.

Dirksen said he would ask for time to appear before the Senate Rules Committee considering the bill tightening restrictions and reporting requirements on lawmakers' travel expenses.

Chairman B. Everett Jordan, D-N.C., of the rules committee promised prompt action. There seemed little doubt that Senate Democratic leaders would join in support of the junket-control effort.

The bill, as passed by the House, would limit foreign travel by lawmakers to members of committees authorized to go abroad, and would place spending of counterpart funds under the same rules applied to U. S. dollars. More detailed public accounting for money spent would be required.

Other congressional news:
Pay: The House was set to vote a \$1.2 billion pay increase for 1.8 million of the nation's servicemen — leaving \$32,000 draftees and enlistees serving their two-year military obligation out. The pay bill was \$46 million below what the administration requested, but amendments were expected to be proposed to narrow the gap to around \$32 million.

Scott: Sen. Hugh Scott, R-Pa., said in a speech prepared for the Senate that "a great leap backward in American prestige has taken place over the past two years" under the Kennedy administration. He said "it will continue unless we face up to the difficult challenge of exercising positive and coherent leadership among equals" in dealing with European allies.

'Moods Of Magic' Is Theme For County Fair This Year

The Douglas County Fair for 1963 will be more impressive than ever. Fair Manager Bert Allenby told members of the Roseburg Kiwanis Club Tuesday noon.

Describing some of the innovations planned for the 1963 exposition, Allenby asserted that the fair must be "bigger and better" as it must either progress or go backward, and there is no intention of letting it degenerate.

He told some of the new departments which will be added in the exhibit building and indicated that demonstrations and exhibitions will be held in connection with many of the exhibit departments.

The open classes of livestock are expected to draw more exhibitors this year, he said, and there will be a substantial change in the garden exhibit area.

Theme of the this year's fair will be "Moods of Magic," Allenby

said, and most fairgoers will have their fill of magic by the time the fair is over.

The manager touched briefly on the interim use of the Fairgrounds facilities by the community, indicating that two-thirds of the time and energies of the staff is spent in efforts not directly connected with the fair. He stated that there are facilities available at the fairgrounds for most any type of event and he encouraged their use. For example, he noted that 13 special events are planned for the fair facilities during the month of May.

Allenby was introduced by Kiwanis Vice President Eldon Caley. Phil Meagher announced the annual Camp Tye cleanup for May 19 and Dennis Rudolph and Herman Hobi appeared as representatives of the Key Club at Tuesday's meeting.

Standley Logging Wins 2 Umpqua Tracts

J. R. Standley and Sons Logging won two of the three tracts of timber sold by the Umpqua National Forest supervisor's office Tuesday in Roseburg.

The company won the Taft Mountain Road Salvage Sale and the Upper Junction Creek Salvage Sale tracts. The first is 45 miles east of Roseburg on 400 acres, containing 940,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$24.80 per thousand and 70,000 feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$10.30.

Appraisal Made
The total of 1,100,000 board feet was appraised at \$24,033. Standley paid \$32.10 for the Douglas fir and pine and the appraised price for the other species groups for a total bid of \$30,895.

Other bidders were O. E. Clayton of Roseburg, Lumber Sales Co. Inc. and Douglas County Lumber Co. of Roseburg, and Paul B. Hull Lumber Co. of Dillard.

The Upper Junction Creek tract is located 46 miles east of Roseburg on 240 acres. The 685,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine

were appraised at \$22.45 and the County Lumber and J. R. Standley. The next Umpqua National Forest sales are scheduled May 27.

Standley paid \$21,262.25, based on a high bid of \$29.05 per thousand for fir and pine and the appraised price for the other species groups. Other bidders were Douglas County Lumber and Lumber Sales Inc.

National Wins
The third tract sold went to National Plywood Inc. of Roseburg. It was the Lookout Mountain Salvage Sale No. 2 about 46 miles east of Roseburg on 245 acres. The tract contains 1,100,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$22.50 per thousand and 160,000 feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$8. The total, 1,170,000 feet was appraised at \$24,398.50.

National paid \$22.85 per thousand for Douglas fir and pine and the appraised price for other species groups. Total bid price was \$24,852. Other bidders were Lumber Sales, O. E. Clayton, Douglas
