

General Dynamics Reveals Payment To N.Y. Law Firm

WASHINGTON (UPI)—General Dynamics Corp. told Senate investigators today that it paid fees totaling \$300,000 to a New York law firm before and since Roswell L. Gilpatrick left the company to become deputy defense secretary.

Roger Harris, vice president and chief counsel for General Dynamics, gave the information to the Senate investigations subcommittee which has been looking into award by the Pentagon on a fat contract for the TFX plane to General Dynamics.

Reports cropped up previously of payments by General Dynamics

to Gilpatrick's former law firm and the deputy secretary issued a statement denying any relation between his previous legal work for General Dynamics and the TFX contract award. Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara backed him up.

The disclosures on the General Dynamics payments to the firm were made as Dynamics officials resumed their defense of their TFX plane, selected over a competing design of the Boeing Co.

Frank W. Davis, president of General Dynamics' Fort Worth division, said his company's version shapes up as faster, cheaper and able to hit more targets than Boeing's.

According to Harris, General Dynamics paid \$128,000 to the law firm in 1958-60 before Gilpatrick left to become the Pentagon's No. 2 civilian official. Payments of \$200,000 were made "largely" for the services of Gilpatrick, a friend of former Army Secretary Frank Pace and then General Dynamics president, Harris said.

Since January, 1961, when Gilpatrick turned the General Dynamics account over to Morris T. Moore, the law firm has been paid fees of \$143,000 and has been billed for fees totaling \$31,000 for the first quarter of the present year, Harris said. Smaller sums were paid for expenses in addition to the fees, he said.

Wheat Program Is Discussed

Procedures and regulations pertaining to participation in the 1964 wheat program were explained to Douglas County producers at a meeting Wednesday in the courthouse.

Provisions of the program were reviewed by Curtis Barker, chairman of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

May 13 is final date for growers of 15 acres or less to sign their intention to vote at county ASCS offices, and May 21 is the referendum day to determine if marketing quotas will be in effect in 1964.

760 Acres Involved

In Douglas County, the program affects 760 allotment acres of wheat. There are 120 farms involved. The county has 105 small allotment operators—that is, growers who have under 15 acres of wheat allotment acreage.

By signing up by May 13 deadline, the small operator chooses to be an allotment grower in 1964 and—if quotas are approved—he and other growers on his farm become eligible to qualify for price supports, certificates and payments for diverting wheat acreage to soil-conserving uses.

Thus, he becomes eligible to vote on whether the program shall go into effect.

As a program participant, Barker explained, the small-allotment farm producer will be eligible for price support based on a national average rate of \$2 per bushel for certificated wheat and \$1.30 for non-certificated wheat. Certificated wheat will be 80 per cent of the normal production of the acreage

Successful Fund Drive Assures Portland Symphony Appearance

The Portland Symphony Orchestra will present a concert in Roseburg probably next October.

The announcement was made today by Avery Thompson, spokesman for the Roseburg Symphony Society. He said a recent campaign to raise \$2,500 to bring the orchestra to Roseburg had been a success.

He said the money was raised easily.

"The Roseburg Symphony Society was gratified with the generous response," he said, "and the Portland Symphony Society had offered congratulations to the local group for its rapid success in raising the money."

Thompson said the final preparations are now only awaiting a contract from the Portland Symphony to be signed by the Roseburg group. He said the date of the concert has tentatively been set for Oct. 18, either at the Roseburg High School gymnasium or at the Douglas County Fairgrounds.

Child Molester Bill Approved

SALEM (UPI)—A bill for commitment and treatment of potential child molesters was approved 11-2 Wednesday night by the Ways and Means Committee.

The action sent the sex offender bill, one of a package of six, to the House floor for action.

The measure has been thoroughly redrafted by the House Judiciary Committee since it was introduced in different form early this session.

It now provides civil trial commitment procedures for someone considered "sexually dangerous," even though he may not be convicted of an offense.

The measure calls for \$136,797 for additional staff at the State Hospital for treatment.

Rep. Ross Morgan, D-Gresham, said the bill has been worked over by attorneys to make sure it contains adequate safeguards for the individual. Morgan said that under the bill commitment will be almost as difficult as a criminal conviction.

He said the measure is based on laws and court cases from 26 states.

Oakland Authorizes Purchase Of Lagoon

The Oakland City Council at this week's meeting passed a resolution authorizing purchase of acreage for a lagoon for the city's new sewer system, correspondent Edith Dunn reports. Voter approval for a \$115,000 sewer system was given at a recent city election.

Lee Treadwell is the seller of the property to be used for the lagoon.

Routine business, including payment of bills, took up the remainder of the session.

Employees Testify In Damages Trial

The civil trial of Patricia Morberg vs. Payless Drug Store, Inc., went into its second day and was scheduled to wind up today in the court of Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

Mrs. Morberg, of Little River Rd., Glendale, is seeking general damages of \$25,000 for "extreme personal indignities," and \$15,000 punitive damages for alleged motivation of "malice and oppression," in connection with an alleged false arrest for shoplifting last Aug. 29.

She was found innocent on trial of the shoplifting charge, following a grand jury indictment. She was accused at that time of having shoplifted two bottles of hair color.

Mrs. Morberg, who operates a store on Little River, alleges that she was stopped by the store's detective Phyllis Fischer, and that she was "maliciously, wrongfully and improperly detained" on the premises of the defendant and restrained of her liberty and freedom for a period of 45 minutes, and that she was subjected to search and that other accusations were made against her.

The principal witness for the defense, who was on the stand Wednesday was Mrs. Fischer, as well as other store employees, who denied the allegations of Mrs. Morberg in her detention and subsequent arrest.

Fifth Missile Firing Success

VANDENBERG AFB, Calif. The fifth straight successful firing of a Minuteman missile from this Pacific Coast missile base was reported Wednesday by the Air Force.

The solid-fuel intercontinental ballistic missile thundered some 3,000 miles down the Pacific range from its 85-foot deep silo shortly before sundown.

The Air Force said the test appeared to be a "complete success," and that the re-entry vehicle impacted in the preselected target area in the Pacific. No specific details were given on accuracy.

It was the first time the launch of a Minuteman had been handled in all phases by a Strategic Air Command team, the Air Force said.
