

# Shaky Truce Holds In Birmingham, But New Troubles Erupt In South

A precarious truce held while Negro and white leaders in Birmingham, Ala., sought to end the racial crisis there, but elsewhere in the South Thursday integration troubles erupted on numerous fronts.

The threat of renewed massive demonstrations remained in the Deep South steel center, Negro leader Martin Luther King Jr. said, "Things are about worked out but there are still some minute problems to be dealt with."

King said a two-day truce would end at 11 a.m. EDT unless agreement could be reached on a demand for the release of 600 Negroes held in the Birmingham jail.

At Knoxville, Tenn., police arrested more than 75 Negroes demonstrating in front of a segregated downtown movie theater. The arrests came when the Negroes sat down in front of the theater entrance. They were charged with obstructing trade and commerce.

**Mayor Sounds Warning**  
At Raleigh, N.C., Mayor W.G. Enloe said Thursday night that he would not keep the city from becoming "another Birmingham."

The mayor's statement came just before a Negro was forcibly ejected from the Statehouse restaurant Thursday and after demonstrations Wednesday in which 93 Negroes were arrested at segregated downtown restaurants and theaters.

"It's time to act," the mayor said. "Let's not settle this thing by laws or creeds but by being human beings dealing with one another."

At Albany, Ga., scene of massive demonstrations and arrests last year, 14 young Negroes were arrested Thursday for picketing stores owned by white persons. The arrests brought to 49 the number of demonstrators taken into custody in Albany in the past three days.

**Student Revolt Ending**  
At Savannah, Ga., a student rebellion that flared red hot earlier appeared to be ended today. Most of the students at the all-Negro Savannah College were back in class.

The students had stayed away from classes and demonstrated

because the contract of an economics professor who had invited whites to attend his classes was not renewed.

At Greenwood, Miss., two white men were indicted Thursday in the shooting of a young Negro civil rights worker. William Greenlee and Wesley Kersey were indicted for assault and battery in the March 5 wounding of Jimmy Travis.

Travis and two other voter registration workers were fired upon as they drove on a highway near Greenwood. Greenlee and Kersey face arraignment Monday.

**Search Slacks Off For Slaying Suspect**  
ENTERPRISE, Ore. (UPI) — A watch was being kept on Billy Evans' car and cabin today but search for the 44-year-old slaying suspect had tapered off.

Evans has been sought in the hilly, wooded country of northeast Oregon near Florida since Tuesday. Most of the men searching for Evans left the area Thursday night after a cousin, Amos Evans of Enterprise, went into the woods in an effort to track the wanted man. He returned reporting he could find no trace of Evans.

At Astoria, Wash., Sheriff Hugh Curry said he would not return to the area until some lead was found. A few Oregon State police officers remained in the area. Evans is charged in a warrant issued at Astoria with the fatal shooting of Mrs. May Griner, 40, and William M. Gerry, 40, La Grande, Ore., at Mrs. Griner's home just outside Clarkston late Monday night.

**2 Youths Apprehended For Burglary At School**  
Burglary at the Deer Creek School at Dixonville Wednesday night was cleared up Thursday with the apprehension of two youths by a sheriff's deputy.

Arrested was Laurence J. Heidenreich, 18, of Ideyldy Route, Roseburg, and a 16-year-old boy. They are alleged to have taken a clock, small change and some dinner rolls in the cafeteria.

The deputy said they admitted the burglary but denied taking the clock.

**Price Rise Expected On Regular Cigarettes**  
Regular cigarettes were expected to be included next week in a price raise being made by manufacturers.

The McDonald Candy Co. reported the manufacturers' price would be boosted to retailers probably Monday. The effect of the raise on consumers is not yet known.

Last month, king size cigarettes were increased in price.

**Mrs. Lena Denn**  
One of Roseburg's oldest citizens, Mrs. Lena (Wingen) Denn, 90, died Thursday at a Roseburg hospital after a long illness.

Mrs. Denn lived at 2008 NE DiLamond Lake Blvd. She had lived in Camas Valley, Roseburg and Tacoma, Wash., areas the past 65 years.

She came to Camas Valley from St. Clair, Minn., where she was born March 28, 1873. She had attended Minnesota State College and taught school for two years in St. Clair.

She married Henry J. Denn in 1895 in St. Clair and the couple came to Oregon that year, settling on the Denn ranch in Camas Valley. He preceded her in death in 1934.

She was a member of Easter Star, a charter member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church and president of the Douglas County WCTU for a number of years.

Mrs. Denn is reported to have owned the first variety store in Roseburg and was in the grocery business in Roseburg, Camas Valley and Tacoma for a number of years. Mr. and Mrs. Denn imported the first full-blooded white face Hereford bull to Douglas County, it is reported.

She had four sons and one daughter. The sons were J. A. of Tacoma, who died in 1961, Henry A. of San Francisco, Calif., and George E. of Reno, Nev.; nine grandchildren; 13 great-grandchildren; and four sisters, Flossie Gahl of Milwaukee, Wis.; Mrs. Margie Gahl of St. Clair, Mrs. Frances May of St. Clair and Agnes Peska of Mankato, Minn.

The Rosary will be Sunday evening at 7:30 a.m. in Long & Shukle Memorial Chapel. Funeral Mass will be held Monday at 9:30 a.m., with Father Eunan Buckley officiating. Interment will follow in St. Joseph's Cemetery, Roseburg.

**Local Lions See Film On Blind**  
What the blind are capable of doing for themselves was shown in part in motion pictures taken at summer camps for the blind before Roseburg Lions and the Umpqua Hotel. The meeting pointed up White Cane Week, May 12-18.

Mrs. Sam Skenzick, Roseburg, state president of the Oregon Council for the Blind, with the assistance of her husband and son, Steve, who showed the films, gave a narration on the pictures and told of the experiences at the camps.

Pictures showed activities at the camp on the McKenzie River, where the Benedictine priests donated the use of their place two years ago, and last year's camp at the Tressie Glen site out of Portland. Sporting activities participated in by the blind were shown. These included horseshoes, shuffle board, bowling, shooting baskets and other sports.

At the meeting Harvey Peeke called attention to the Lions-sponsored Mother's Day breakfast at Stewart Park, for the public Sunday from 7 a.m. to noon. Proceeds will go towards the Lions sight conservation program.

Edell Bryant, who arranged Thursday's program, said boxes will be put out around town next week for collection of old glasses and jewelry items, which will go to the Good Will Industries, for shipment overseas.

White canes will be sold May 18 on the streets of Roseburg to benefit the blind.

The Lions will be guests of Lady Lions at a pollock dinner at the Knights of Pythias hall May 18 at 6:30 p.m.

**Plea Of Insanity Is Indicated Here**  
John Aaron Caudill Jr., 24, Roseburg, has indicated intentions to show in evidence that he was insane or mentally defective at the time of alleged crimes he is accused of committing. He comes up for a first trial next Tuesday. He will be tried then on a charge of assault to commit rape. The trial is due in the court of Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodruff.

Caudill is accused in Grand Jury indictments with two separate charges of assault with intent to commit rape and two for burglary. The burglary counts stem from his alleged entry of two homes in the early hour of the morning to commit the other crimes as charged.

An affidavit accompanying the motion showing his proposal to show insanity states that at the time of arraignment and entering guilty pleas he did not have sufficient medical information as to whether or not this notice should be given, so did not fit his intentions at the time.

The law requires that in an insanity plea this be made known to the court in advance of trial, usually at the time of pleading.

The affidavit states that since the time of entering a plea he has been under the care of a psychiatrist.

**Attempt Is Made To Revive Sales Tax Bill In Senate**  
SALEM (UPI) — Sharp charges of a "biased legislature" were made in the House today as never-say-die sales tax champions made another unsuccessful attempt to revive a sales tax bill.

But Democrats held the line, and with the help of four Republicans, defeated the move to pull a sales tax bill from committee 26-34. It would have taken 40 votes to get the bill to the House floor.

Rep. Joe Rogers, R-Independence, moved to bring the sales tax bill out.

Rogers' remarks were punctuated by sharp raps of the gavel by Speaker Clarence Barton. Barton called Rogers' motion "useless" since the House twice has killed sales tax moves.

**Hearing Waived On Theft Charge**  
In District Court actions, Richard Hayes, 23, Myrtle Creek, on appearance before District Judge Gerald R. Hayes, waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury. He is charged with larceny of livestock and accused of the theft of a horse owned by Donald Rone of May 4.

Juanita Dianne Whitley, 18, Winston, was bound over to the Douglas County Grand Jury on a charge of forgery. She is accused of signing the name of Margaret Price to a worthless check made out to William V. Cary, who is alleged to have cashed it at the Enco Service Station in Roseburg. The check was for \$30.

Cary, 19, also of Winston, has asked for a preliminary hearing, which has been set for 9:30 a.m. Tuesday before Judge Hayes.

**Youngster Talks With President**  
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Mrs. Ben Bradlee didn't believe her 4-year-old son when he dashed into the White House and announced he had just talked to the President.

But he had. President Kennedy was driving through Georgetown Thursday when he saw little Dino Bradlee, son of Newsweek magazine's Washington chief, Ben Bradlee. The Bradlees used to be neighbors of the Kennedys.

Kennedy had his chauffeur stop and sent an aide to bring Dino over to the car. The President told Dino he was going to tell Caroline to come see him, then waved goodbye and said "I'll see you later."

Asked what he had said to the President, Dino replied "I said nothin'."

**Kroger Stores Hit By Blasts**  
ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI)—Three Kroger stores in the St. Louis area were rocked almost simultaneously late Thursday night by bombs. Two policemen were sent to hospitals.

Capt. Stanley Sieron Jr. said he and Sgt. Leroy Fields were making routine patrols when their car was blown "two feet into the air" when a bomb went off at the entrance to a Kroger store in East St. Louis, Ill.

Fields was taken to a hospital with a possible concussion, and Sieron received a possible neck injury.

Police could not make an immediate estimate of damage. Kroger officials in their headquarters city of Cincinnati, Ohio, expressed "indignation" and said they did not know who were responsible or what the reason was.

It was the second round of bombings at the Kroger stores in the St. Louis area in the past few months. The chain store has been involved in labor disputes with at least two unions.

The other two stores bombed were in the city of St. Louis and St. Louis County. The St. Louis store was one of those rocked last winter.

Windows were broken and some merchandise was spoiled.

**New Water Rates Set In Glendale**  
The Glendale City Council met in special session here to review and amend the city water rate schedule, according to the amount of expected water use.

Family units, along with businesses or organizations not drawing heavily on the city water supply, will pay the basic fee of \$1 per month. Included in the low rate category are insurance offices, the Post Office, lodges, churches, the Glendale Stud Mill, the Standard and Shell Distributor plants, and stores which do not serve food or drinks to the public.

Exempt from the low rate are the Glendale Rexall Drug Store, The Food Bank, The Smokehouse, and the Central Cafe which will pay \$7 per month. Barber and beauty shops will pay \$6 per month; hotels, \$15; laundries, \$25 and services, \$8.

The Slim Picken's Bar and Cafe will pay \$10.50 per month and the Glendale Grade School \$30. All out of town users of city water will pay \$7 per month.

There will be no change in the sewer service charge, according to Ralph Place, mayor.

One special restriction to apply to all users of city water was made when the council voted not to allow any more roof sprinkling at any time, according to Mrs. Gerald Fox, correspondent.
